1st Portsmouth Guides Report for Friends of Guiding AGM 27.3.2013

We've enjoyed a busy year with the girls - we currently have 12. We've carried on doing lots of Unit Meeting Activities and a Kneaz Raps! Skillsbuilder. Everyone took part in the Lorne walk with the Rangers, completing the Portsmouth Art Trail. The girls were involved in the Remembrance Day Parade as well as in the church service that followed. Some girls came to the District Christmas Craft event, decorating buns, making cards etc. While others attended the County Thinking Day celebration at Carrisack making Mexican God's eyes, rain sticks and hearing about chocolate - the special chocolate disc produced for the event certainly went down well!

Camp at Benone saw the girls decorating pillow cases, cooking in a hylton, doing wet felting, orienteering and enjoying an afternoon of surfing. We've also ended outside in Trillick as part of the Backwoods Cooking badge and explored our Personal Travel as part of that interest badge. Food does seem to have been a strong feature in the last 12 months as we also made gingerbread houses and more Christmas cakes and the summer term finished with a sausage sizzle on the beach.

The Guides celebrated 80 years of the Treford Guide by completing the Acorn Challenge - drawing their family tree, doing some yoga that the Rangers organised, making microwave mug cakes and learning the Promise in British sign language.

The girls enjoyed doing the Pegasus Challenge that the Rangers developed - dressing up as mummies, playing a madusa game and hiding objects as Trojan horses as well as racing marble powered Acornball!

The girls have just completed the Ulster Scots Challenge badge, learning some new words, making heart shaped Celtic knots, cooking Scotch broth, Caledonian cream, Kase Murrig's porridge and Scottishian buns, singing some traditional songs and designing their family shield.

As our contribution to the art exhibition members covered polystyrene eggs with raised letters. If you were able to attend the coffee evening we hope you agree that they are quite impressive!

We had 4 girls join their Gold award this year (before they moved up to Rangers). We also have a member who enjoyed the ICJ experience and is a member of the youth steering group. Anghy.
