Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 December 2024

1 Principal accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards in the United Kingdom and the Charities Act (Northern Ireland) 2008. A summary of the more important accounting policies, which have been applied consistently, is set out below.

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the Historical Cost Convention, as amended to record quoted investments at their market value, at the balance sheet date. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in July 2014, the Charities Act and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Restricted Funds

Restricted funds are accounted for in accordance with the particular terms of trust arising from the express or implied wishes of the donors in so far as these are intended to be binding on the charity. Where such wishes are not intended to be binding, they are taken into account and recognised in appropriately designated funds.

Unrestricted Free Reserves

Free Reserves represent amount which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for any other purpose. Such funds may be held in order to finance working capital or capital expenditure.

Incoming Resources

Voluntary income or capital is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to it, its financial value can be quantified with reasonable certainty and there is reasonable certainty of its ultimate receipt. Entitlement to legacies is considered established when the charity has been notified of a distribution to be made by the executors. Income received in advance of due performance under a contract is accounted for as deferred income until earned. Grants for activities are recognised as income when the related conditions for legal entitlement have been met. All other income is accounted for on an accrual basis.

Resources Expended

All resources expended are accounted for on an accrual basis. Charitable activities include costs of services and grants, support costs and depreciation on related assets. Costs of generating funds similarly include fundraising activities. Non –staff costs not attributed to one category of activity are allocated or apportioned pro-rata to the staffing of the relevant service. Finance, HR and administrative staff costs are directly attributable to individual activities by objective. Governance costs are those associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Tangible fixed assets

Fixtures and Fittings have been depreciated using a rate of 15% on a reducing balance basis.

Trustees' report for the year ended 31 December 2023

The Elders of Armagh Baptist Church, as Charity Trustees, present the following report on the work of the church for the year ended 31 December 2023.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies and comply with the trust deed and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements with Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015).

Structure, governance and management

The charity has Trustees as detailed out in the charity constitution. The church is recognised as a charity under the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland as at the date of registration being the 8 July 2020.

Where appropriate, Trustees are appointed following a selection process undertaken by the members of the church. The Trustees will hold their positions on a 5-year cycle until such times as they resign, retire or are removed.

Trustee's records are updated on the charity commission website to represent these changes.

Organisation

The Trustees who have served during the year are detailed on page 3. The Trustees are expected to play several key roles in the running of the charity.

The principal function of the Church is to support the advancement of the Christian religion by promoting through the work of the Church the mission of the Gospel, pastoral, social and evangelistic. All the functions of the Church relate to the advancement of religion through holding regular worship and communicating and caring for worshippers of all ages especially the sick, elderly and others in our local community.

Public Benefit

The charity trustees have complied with their duties in line with the Commission's Public Benefit statutory guidance. Regular worship and reaching out into the community as well as other activities both social and fundraising have been carried out throughout the year to fulfil our statement of public benefit. The premises are regularly used by various organisations within the church.

Statement of Public Benefit

The direct benefits which flow from our purpose include attendance at meetings convened for the teaching of Scripture, for fellowship, for the breaking of bread, as well as involvement in prayer meetings and evangelism. This is evidenced in personal growth in faith of those who attend the church, comfort to the bereaved and to the sick and elderly members of the church who receive encouragement through visitation and prayer. The provision of religious education for children and young people. Financial support for the departments of the Association of Baptist Churches in Ireland and for missionaries sent out from our church locally and to other parts of the world through like-minded organisations.

These benefits are demonstrated through feedback from regular attendees at the various church services, interest in missions shown by prayer and financial support given, and the ongoing regular attendance of members at worship services. The number of DVDs issued on a weekly basis to those unable to attend a service and statistical reports of the number of downloads of services via the Internet.

The Trustees are satisfied that carrying out the purpose of our charity will not cause harm to any individual attending the church, or to any other members of the wider community. The charity's beneficiaries are church members and adherents, and anyone who chooses to attend the church services which are open to the general public. Any trustee who is a pastor, is an employee of Armagh Baptist Church. Their salary and any incurred expenses are incidental and necessary to enable Armagh Baptist Church to provide the pastoral support required to fulfil our stated purpose.

Aims and Objectives

Armagh Baptist Church conducts regular services for public worship, prayer, Bible study, preaching and teaching for all age groups, and provides pastoral care to the sick and elderly of the church through visitation and prayer. Other activities of the church include Sunday School, Parent & Toddler Groups, Children's Meetings, Youth Meetings, Women's Meetings, Men's Events & Friendship Hour, together with regular outreach events to the wider community, in schools and residential care homes.

31 December 2023 Report

The Elders of Armagh Baptist Church, as Charity Trustees, present the following report on the work of the church for the year 2023.

We had the joy of baptising 7 believers in April, and we added 10 new members following our May Members' Forum, bringing our membership back to the level it was at before COVID, and before we sent out eleven of our members to form Keady Baptist Church. We reached 138 members before sending out Mark & Emma Rooney to Canada, and we lost one member through death, when Rae Gordon passed away in December. So, we ended the year with 135 members.

The funeral of Elsie Turbitt was held in Armagh Baptist Church on Friday 20th January 2023. Elsie had been attending for about six years, since her mother Edith McMahon passed away.

We had the joy of conducting three weddings in our church this year: Leah Knox to Adam Nesbitt on Wednesday 7th June, Abigail Reaney to David George on Friday 9th June, and Cherith Watson to David Beck on Thursday 20th July. Again, we nearly lost count of the number of babies that were born to young married couples in our congregation!

Ian Grant completed his 14th year as pastor of the church on 1st May 2023, before taking up the role of President of the Association of Baptist Churches in Ireland on Sunday 7th May at a handover service from Pastor Mark Patterson held in Moira Baptist Church. He has been kept busy throughout the year since. He will hand over the role to Edwin Ewart on 11th May 2024.

With Mark Rooney emigrating to Canada on 14th August 2023, it was important that a new Assistant was appointed as quickly as possible. The church met and agreed to appoint one of their own deacons, Graham Dougan, as Pastoral Assistant for one year from 1st August 2023. We also agreed to ask Andrew Moorcroft (IBC student assistant) to continue to preach monthly, and to help with the youth work on a Friday night weekly also. This arrangement has been working well throughout the year. We also record thanks to the men of the ABC Preaching Group who have preached at various times throughout the year. Mark Rooney is starting a one-year Interim Pastorate in Hawkwood Baptist Church, Calgary, Canada on 1st January 2024. We continue to pray for Mark, Emma, and their daughter Willow.

As well as ministry and visitation, Ian and Graham have continued to speak at assemblies in three primary schools, and at meetings in Fairlawns, Hockley, and Lisanally Day Care Centre, along with others. We also brought the Amazing Journey into several schools in the area.

Our missionary interest continued throughout the year, guided by the missions committee, again enabling us to give £27,567 to the work of various mission agencies at home and abroad. Our church website, Facebook page and YouTube channels continue to host videos of our church services, enabling a wider audience to get a taste of what goes on within the walls of our church building.

Our *Towards 2030* vision has guided our outreach efforts in local, focussed and world mission through the year. Perhaps the biggest effort in terms of outreach this year could be summed up in two ways: Follow the Star, when 100 volunteers turned our building into a Bethlehem village experience for two nights just a week or so before Christmas, and over 700 people came through our doors and were reminded in various ways of the true meaning of the Christmas story.

Our outreach to Crossmaglen was a new venture this year, which resulted in ten meetings being held in the Community Centre in the Square, and every home in the town being visited twice with Gospel literature. A new 'Crossmaglen Baptist Outreach' Facebook page enables us to reach people with news of how Armagh, Keady, and Newry Baptist Churches are trying to work together in the area. About a dozen people from a five-mile radius of Crossmaglen have been attending the meetings. We hope to build on this in 2024.

We record thanks to God for his faithfulness throughout another year of ministry.

Statement Trustees' Responsibilities

Independent examiner's report to the trustees of Armagh Baptist Church for the year ended 31 December 2023

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2023, which are set out on pages 9 to 16.

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 December 2023

1 Principal accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards in the United Kingdom and the Charities Act (Northern Ireland) 2008. A summary of the more important accounting policies, which have been applied consistently, is set out below.

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the Historical Cost Convention, as amended to record quoted investments at their market value, at the balance sheet date. Resources Expended

Non –staff costs not attributed to one category of activity are allocated or apportioned pro-rata to the staffing of the relevant service. Finance, HR and administrative staff costs are directly attributable to individual activities by objective. Governance costs are those associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

The Elders of Armagh Baptist Church, as Charity Trustees, present the following report on the work of the church for the year ended 31 December 2023.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies and comply with the trust deed and the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their financial statements with Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015).

Structure, governance and management

The charity has Trustees as detailed out in the charity constitution. The church is recognised as a charity under the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland as at the date of registration being the 8 July 2020.

Where appropriate, Trustees are appointed following a selection process undertaken by the members of the church. The Trustees will hold their positions on a 5-year cycle until such times as they resign, retire or are removed.

Organisation

The Trustees who have served during the year are detailed on page 3. The Trustees are expected to play several key roles in the running of the charity.

The principal function of the Church is to support the advancement of the Christian religion by promoting through the work of the Church the mission of the Gospel, pastoral, social and evangelistic. All the functions of the Church relate to the advancement of religion through holding regular worship and communicating and caring for worshippers of all ages especially the sick, elderly and others in our local community.

Public Benefit

The charity trustees have complied with their duties in line with the Commission's Public Benefit statutory guidance. Regular worship and reaching out into the community as well as other activities both social and fundraising have been carried out throughout the year to fulfil our statement of public benefit. The premises are regularly used by various organisations within the church.

Statement of Public Benefit

The direct benefits which flow from our purpose include attendance at meetings convened for the teaching of Scripture, for fellowship, for the breaking of bread, as well as involvement in prayer meetings and evangelism. This is evidenced in personal growth in faith of those who attend the church, comfort to the bereaved and to the sick and elderly members of the church who receive encouragement through visitation and prayer. The provision of religious education for children and young people. Financial support for the departments of the Association of Baptist Churches in Ireland and for missionaries sent out from our church locally and to other parts of the world through like-minded organisations.

These benefits are demonstrated through feedback from regular attendees at the various church services, interest in missions shown by prayer and financial support given, and the ongoing regular attendance of members at worship services. The number of DVDs issued on a weekly basis to those unable to attend a service and statistical reports of the number of downloads of services via the Internet.

The Trustees are satisfied that carrying out the purpose of our charity will not cause harm to any individual attending the church, or to any other members of the wider community. The charity's beneficiaries are church members and adherents, and anyone who chooses to attend the church services which are open to the general public. Any trustee who is a pastor, is an employee of Armagh Baptist Church. Their salary and any incurred expenses are incidental and necessary to enable Armagh Baptist Church to provide the pastoral support required to fulfil our stated purpose.

Aims and Objectives

Armagh Baptist Church conducts regular services for public worship, prayer, Bible study, preaching and teaching for all age groups, and provides pastoral care to the sick and elderly of the church through visitation and prayer. Other activities of the church include Sunday School, Parent & Toddler Groups, Children's Meetings, Youth Meetings, Women's Meetings, Men's Events & Friendship Hour, together with regular outreach events to the wider community, in schools and residential care homes.

31 December 2023 Report

The Elders of Armagh Baptist Church, as Charity Trustees, present the following report on the work of the church for the year 2023.

We had the joy of baptising 7 believers in April, and we added 10 new members following our May Members' Forum, bringing our membership back to the level it was at before COVID, and before we sent out eleven of our members to form Keady Baptist Church. We reached 138 members before sending out Mark & Emma Rooney to Canada, and we lost one member through death, when Rae Gordon passed away in December. So, we ended the year with 135 members.

The funeral of Elsie Turbitt was held in Armagh Baptist Church on Friday 20th January 2023. Elsie had been attending for about six years, since her mother Edith McMahon passed away.

We had the joy of conducting three weddings in our church this year: Leah Knox to Adam Nesbitt on Wednesday 7th June, Abigail Reaney to David George on Friday 9th June, and Cherith Watson to David Beck on Thursday 20th July. Again, we nearly lost count of the number of babies that were born to young married couples in our congregation!

Ian Grant completed his 14th year as pastor of the church on 1st May 2023, before taking up the role of President of the Association of Baptist Churches in Ireland on Sunday 7th May at a handover service from Pastor Mark Patterson held in Moira Baptist Church. He has been kept busy throughout the year since. He will hand over the role to Edwin Ewart on 11th May 2024.

With Mark Rooney emigrating to Canada on 14th August 2023, it was important that a new Assistant was appointed as quickly as possible. The church met and agreed to appoint one of their own deacons, Graham Dougan, as Pastoral Assistant for one year from 1st August 2023. We also agreed to ask Andrew Moorcroft (IBC student assistant) to continue to preach monthly, and to help with the youth work on a Friday night weekly also. This arrangement has been working well throughout the year. We also record thanks to the men of the ABC Preaching Group who have preached at various times throughout the year. Mark Rooney is starting a one-year Interim Pastorate in Hawkwood Baptist Church, Calgary, Canada on 1st January 2024. We continue to pray for Mark, Emma, and their daughter Willow.

As well as ministry and visitation, Ian and Graham have continued to speak at assemblies in three primary schools, and at meetings in Fairlawns, Hockley, and Lisanally Day Care Centre, along with others. We also brought the Amazing Journey into several schools in the area.

Our missionary interest continued throughout the year, guided by the missions committee, again enabling us to give £27,567 to the work of various mission agencies at home and abroad. Our church website, Facebook page and YouTube channels continue to host videos of our church services, enabling a wider audience to get a taste of what goes on within the walls of our church building.

Our *Towards 2030* vision has guided our outreach efforts in local, focussed and world mission through the year. Perhaps the biggest effort in terms of outreach this year could be summed up in two ways: Follow the Star, when 100 volunteers turned our building into a Bethlehem village experience for two nights just a week or so before Christmas, and over 700 people came through our doors and were reminded in various ways of the true meaning of the Christmas story.

Our outreach to Crossmaglen was a new venture this year, which resulted in ten meetings being held in the Community Centre in the Square, and every home in the town being visited twice with Gospel literature. A new 'Crossmaglen Baptist Outreach' Facebook page enables us to reach people with news of how Armagh, Keady, and Newry Baptist Churches are trying to work together in the area. About a dozen people from a five-mile radius of Crossmaglen have been attending the meetings. We hope to build on this in 2024.

We record thanks to God for his faithfulness throughout another year of ministry.

31 December 2022 Report

The Elders of Armagh Baptist Church, as Charity Trustees, present the following report on the work of the church for the year 2022.

We added 4 new members in the Spring of this year, but with one family moving house to Portadown that left us with 128 members in Armagh at the end of 2022. We didn't have any baptisms this year, and we didn't have any funerals in the church either, but two young people who grew up in the church got married in the summer, and we had quite a number of babies born to families in our fellowship too.

Ian Grant is now in his 14th year as Pastor. He was joined by Mark Rooney as Assistant Pastor in June, and Andrew Moorcroft joined us on a student placement from the Irish Baptist College in October. Together they have been faithful in visiting members and adherents of the church throughout the year.

Ian and Mark continue to speak at assemblies in three local schools on a monthly basis. We also hosted an evangelism team of students from the Irish Baptist College for a week in October, helping us to visit the houses around our church building and to bring *The Amazing Journey* into 4 local primary schools, ably presented by James Robinson, a former member of our church, now working for Baptist Youth.

We had visits from representatives of a number of missionary organisations during the year, giving us the opportunity to receive information about their work in N.I. and further afield. Again, we supported some of them financially, raising around £25,000 for the work of various missions at home and abroad. We also gave £13,000 to help churches in Ukraine and Poland reach out to refugees who had been displaced following the outbreak of war between Russia and Ukraine in February. Following some initial training we are now recognised as a 'Safe Place' enabling us to respond practically to help those who find themselves victims of domestic abuse. We have also joined the 'Welcome Church' network and hope to be in a position to welcome asylum seekers whenever they are placed in Armagh in the future.

Our church website, together with our Facebook page and Youtube channel continue to host videos of our church services, enabling a wider audience to get a taste of all that goes on within our church.

Following 2 years of disruption due to the COVID-19 pandemic it is good to be able to report that everything is now back to normal in Armagh Baptist Church. Even though we planted Keady Baptist Church in September 2021, our Sunday morning congregation still almost fills our church building. It's good to know that almost 100 people are meeting on Sunday mornings over in Keady and as a church they continue to go from strength to strength. They were accepted into membership of the Association of Baptist Churches in Ireland in May 2022 and were welcomed at the Churches Council in November.





Ian Grant is now in his 14th year as Pastor. He was joined by Mark Rooney as Assistant Pastor in June, and Andrew Moorcroft joined us on a student placement from the Irish Baptist College in October. Together they have been faithful in visiting members and adherents of the church throughout the year.

Ian and Mark continue to speak at assemblies in three local schools on a monthly basis. We also hosted an evangelism team of students from the Irish Baptist College for a week in October, helping us to visit the houses around our church building and to bring *The Amazing Journey* into 4 local primary schools, ably presented by James Robinson, a former member of our church, now working for Baptist Youth.

We had visits from representatives of a number of missionary organisations during the year, giving us the opportunity to receive information about their work in N.I. and further afield. Again, we supported some of them financially, raising around £25,000 for the work of various missions at home and abroad. We also gave £13,000 to help churches in Ukraine and Poland reach out to refugees who had been displaced following the outbreak of war between Russia and Ukraine in February. Following some initial training we are now recognised as a 'Safe Place' enabling us to respond practically to help those who find themselves victims of domestic abuse. We have also joined the 'Welcome Church' network and hope to be in a position to welcome asylum seekers whenever they are placed in Armagh in the future.

Our church website, together with our Facebook page and Youtube channel continue to host videos of our church services, enabling a wider audience to get a taste of all that goes on within our church.

Following 2 years of disruption due to the COVID-19 pandemic it is good to be able to report that everything is now back to normal in Armagh Baptist Church. Even though we planted Keady Baptist Church in September 2021, our Sunday morning congregation still almost fills our church building. It's good to know that almost 100 people are meeting on Sunday mornings over in Keady and as a church they continue to go from strength to strength. They were accepted into membership of the Association of Baptist Churches in Ireland in May 2022 and were welcomed at the Churches Council in November.


