Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 December 2024

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2024. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The Charity's objects are to provide facilities for the inhabitants of the Belfast/Lisburn region without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, age, race, abilities, or political or religious opinions, including facilities for children's play and recreation, family and community events, meetings, classes and other forms of recreation and leisure-time occupation, with the object of improving the conditions of life for the said inhabitants.

Public benefit

The trustees have read and had regard to the Northern Ireland Charity Commission's statutory guidance on Public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

In 2024, we continued to strengthen and expand our services, enhancing the experiences available to families and young people. Our soft play facilities were upgraded with the addition of new sensory play equipment, and we further invested in The Last Level party and gaming room to create a more engaging and enjoyable environment; we also created a new welcoming sit in area in the ice cream parlour.

Roar and Explore offers free educational activities every Monday to Thursday, accessible to all children on site. These sessions include arts and crafts (Colin's Crafts), cooking and baking (Ellie's Eats), storytelling, singing and dancing (Rami's Rhymes), and sensory play (Tilly's Twists). Activities run five days per week, with five sessions each day, serving an average of ten children per session. This equates to approximately 12,000 children benefiting from these educational opportunities throughout 2024.

Each weekday morning, we provide a discounted toddler entry rate alongside free toast and juice for all children. This initiative ensures children have a nutritious start to the day while encouraging parents to bring them out for social interaction and play. There were around 7,000 children visits benefiting from this provision.

Recognising that childminding can be isolating, we offer a heavily discounted entry rate for childminders. Currently, approximately 120 childminders are registered, many of whom are regular users. This scheme allows children in their care to play safely and develop social skills, while childminders have the chance to connect with peers. During 2024, this initiative facilitated approximately 3,000 children's visits.

We also provide a 2-for-1 discount for Perks card holders, primarily benefiting those in Blue Light services, which was used approximately 934 times. Free birthday passes were offered to 788 children.

Discounted entry rates are available for nurseries, schools, and clubs, with 120 visits recorded in 2024. Children attending through these groups also received free toast and juice, benefiting around 2,400 children. Additionally, we support local community groups and clubs by providing free parties, including play, juice, a hot meal, and dessert, reaching 300. Over 500 additional free passes were also distributed to community groups, clubs, and fundraising initiatives.

In addition to our permanent and long running book exchange scheme, in 2024 we ran a Winter Coat and Halloween Costume scheme. Both of which were a huge success, with hundreds of items exchanged. These programs allowed the community to donate items they no longer needed, or new items, which were then made freely available to those who could benefit from them. These initiatives will be added as a new annual schemes.

We further supported local sports organisations by providing high-quality football kits and free entry passes, benefiting clubs including Lamh Dhearg GAA, Rossa, Andersonstown Community Football Club, Dunmurry Youth Football Club, and St Johns GAC Fundamentals.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year ended 31 December 2024 and Balance Sheet as at that date are shown in the attached financial statements.

Income from charitable activities for the year to 31 December 2024 is £681,230 (2023: £626,254) which is up £54,976 on the previous year. Total expenditure for the year is £663,828 (2023: £624,406) which is up £39,422 on the previous year. Net profit for the year was £17,402 compared to £7,566 for the previous year.

The Statement of Financial Position remains healthy with Net Assets of £147,341 of which all relates to unrestricted funds.

Reserves policy

The Board of Trustees has established a policy whereby the Unrestricted Funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets for charity use ('the free reserves') held by the Company should be between 3 and 6 months of the resources expended. At this level, the Trustees feel that they would be able to continue the current activities of the company. In the event of a significant drop in funding, it would obviously be necessary to consider how the funding would be replaced or activities changed.

FUTURE PLANS

The charity will continue to deliver and improve its range of services to the local community. In 2025, we plan to expand by opening a second soft play facility, specifically designed to support children and families in the Falls Road area.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The company is governed by a Board of Trustees which operates as detailed in the company's governing document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association. The Board meets between six and eight times per year. The subcommittee, the audit committee, meet on a quarterly basis and the other committees meet as necessary. A chief executive is appointed by the board to administer the day to day operations of the company and its subsidiaries.

To facilitate effective operations the Group chief executive, Mr Seamus O'Prey has delegated authority approved by the trustees for operational matters such as finance, employment and the delivery of its charitable objectives.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Due to the nature of the charity's work the trustees seek to ensure that these needs are appropriately reflected through the diversity of the trustee body. To enhance the potential pool, trustees are requested to provide a list of their skills (and update it each year) and in the event of particular skills lacking or being lost due to retirement, individuals are approached to offer themselves for election.

In so far as the trustees are aware:



Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Roar and Explore Dairy Farm Ltd (the 'charitable company') for the year ended 31 December 2024 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'.

In our opinion the financial statements:



1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery	- 10% on cost
Fixtures and fittings	- 10% on cost

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Report of the Trustees FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The Charity's objects are to provide facilities for the inhabitants of the Belfast/Lisburn region without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, age, race, abilities, or political or religious opinions, including facilities for children's play and recreation, family and community events, meetings, classes and other forms of recreation and leisure-time occupation, with the object of improving the conditions of life for the said inhabitants.

Public benefit

The trustees have read and had regard to the Northern Ireland Charity Commission's statutory guidance on Public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

In the year, we further developed our social enterprise. We updated the soft play playframe and the facilities of Last Level party and gaming room. We also converted a vacant space at the same premises to become a Morellis Ice Cream sit in parlour and safe space, to compliment the new local Colin Park initiative.

Roar and Explore provide free educational activities every Monday to Thursday, which are available to all children on the premises. These activities are learning through arts and crafts (Colin's crafts), learning through cooking and baking (Ellie's Eats), learning through stories, singing and dancing (Rami's Rhymes) and learning through sensory play (Tilly's Twists). These sessions run 5 days per week, 5 sessions per day, with an average of 10 kids per session. This equates to approximately 12,000 children benefiting from these educational activities from January to December 2023.

Every morning we provide a discounted toddler morning entry rate and free toast and juice for all the children. This ensures the children are provided with something to eat and drink plus it encourages their parents to bring them out of the house to socialize and play with other children of a similar age. Approximately 6000 children benefited from this.

We offer a heavily discounted child minder entry rate, as we know that being a childminder can be quite a lonely form of work. We have 125 childminders registered on this scheme, of which many are extremely regular users. It gives them an opportunity to get out of the house, in a safe environment for the kids in their care to play, whilst they socialise and meet up with likeminded people. There were approximately 5000 children visits from this scheme, giving them the opportunity to mix and develop social skills with other children whilst learning through play; plus getting valuable exercise.

We also offer discount 2 for 1 discount for Perks card holders (primarily for Blue light services) which was availed of approximately 1400 times, free birthday passes to birthday children from which 712 children benefited and free entry for staff children which was used 300 times.

We provide a heavily discounted entry rate for nurseries, schools, and clubs. This was availed of 115 times. The children that come with these nurseries, schools and clubs are also provided with free toast and juice, from which over 2300 children benefited.

We also provide free parties (play, juice, hot meal and dessert) through various competitions and in support of local community groups and clubs. 250 benefited from this; in addition to over 500 free passes which were also provided to local community groups, clubs and fundraisers.

We supported a number of local sports clubs, providing them with high quality football kits and free passes - including Andersonstown Community Football Club, Lisburn Distillery Football Club and St Johns GAC.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year ended 31 December 2023 and Balance Sheet as at that date are shown in the attached financial statements.

Income from charitable activities for the year to 31 December 2023 is £626,254 (2022: £537,479) which is up £88,775 on the previous year. The charity gratefully received a grant from its parent company of £5,718. Total expenditure for the year is £624,406 (2022:£559,361) which is up £65,045 on the previous year. Net profit for the year was £7,566 compared to net loss of £6,444 for the previous year.

The Statement of Financial Position remains healthy with Net Assets of £129,939 of ,which all relates to unrestricted funds.

Reserves policy

The Board of Trustees has established a policy whereby the Unrestricted Funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets for charity use ('the free reserves') held by the Company should be between 3 and 6 months of the resources expended. At this level, the Trustees feel that they would be able to continue the current activities of the company. In the event of a significant drop in funding, it would obviously be necessary to consider how the funding would be replaced or activities changed.

FUTURE PLANS

The charity plans to continue to offer its various services to the people in the locality. During 2024, it is our intention to develop a splat ball park aimed at local teenagers and young adults in the area.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The company is governed by a Board of Trustees which operates as detailed in the company's governing document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association. The Board meets between six and eight times per year. The subcommittee, the audit committee, meet on a quarterly basis and the other committees meet as necessary. A chief executive is appointed by the board to administer the day to day operations of the company and its subsidiaries.

To facilitate effective operations the Group chief executive, Mr Seamus O'Prey has delegated authority approved by the trustees for operational matters such as finance, employment and the delivery of its charitable objectives.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Due to the nature of the charity's work the trustees seek to ensure that these needs are appropriately reflected through the diversity of the trustee body. To enhance the potential pool, trustees are requested to provide a list of their skills (and update it each year) and in the event of particular skills lacking or being lost due to retirement, individuals are approached to offer themselves for election.







1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery	- 10% on cost
Fixtures and fittings	- 10% on cost

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The Charity's objects are to provide facilities for the inhabitants of the Belfast/Lisburn region without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, age, race, abilities, or political or religious opinions, including facilities for children's play and recreation, family and community events, meetings, classes and other forms of recreation and leisure-time occupation, with the object of improving the conditions of life for the said inhabitants.

Public benefit

The trustees have read and had regard to the Northern Ireland Charity Commission's statutory guidance on Public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

In the year, we further developed our social enterprise. We updated the soft play playframe and the facilities of Last Level party and gaming room. We also converted a vacant space at the same premises to become a Morellis Ice Cream sit in parlour and safe space, to compliment the new local Colin Park initiative.

Roar and Explore provide free educational activities every Monday to Thursday, which are available to all children on the premises. These activities are learning through arts and crafts (Colin's crafts), learning through cooking and baking (Ellie's Eats), learning through stories, singing and dancing (Rami's Rhymes) and learning through sensory play (Tilly's Twists). These sessions run 5 days per week, 5 sessions per day, with an average of 10 kids per session. This equates to approximately 12,000 children benefiting from these educational activities from January to December 2023.

Every morning we provide a discounted toddler morning entry rate and free toast and juice for all the children. This ensures the children are provided with something to eat and drink plus it encourages their parents to bring them out of the house to socialize and play with other children of a similar age. Approximately 6000 children benefited from this.

We offer a heavily discounted child minder entry rate, as we know that being a childminder can be quite a lonely form of work. We have 125 childminders registered on this scheme, of which many are extremely regular users. It gives them an opportunity to get out of the house, in a safe environment for the kids in their care to play, whilst they socialise and meet up with likeminded people. There were approximately 5000 children visits from this scheme, giving them the opportunity to mix and develop social skills with other children whilst learning through play; plus getting valuable exercise.

We also offer discount 2 for 1 discount for Perks card holders (primarily for Blue light services) which was availed of approximately 1400 times, free birthday passes to birthday children from which 712 children benefited and free entry for staff children which was used 300 times.

We provide a heavily discounted entry rate for nurseries, schools, and clubs. This was availed of 115 times. The children that come with these nurseries, schools and clubs are also provided with free toast and juice, from which over 2300 children benefited.

We also provide free parties (play, juice, hot meal and dessert) through various competitions and in support of local community groups and clubs. 250 benefited from this; in addition to over 500 free passes which were also provided to local community groups, clubs and fundraisers.

We supported a number of local sports clubs, providing them with high quality football kits and free passes - including Andersonstown Community Football Club, Lisburn Distillery Football Club and St Johns GAC.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year ended 31 December 2023 and Balance Sheet as at that date are shown in the attached financial statements.

Income from charitable activities for the year to 31 December 2023 is £626,254 (2022: £537,479) which is up £88,775 on the previous year. The charity gratefully received a grant from its parent company of £5,718. Total expenditure for the year is £624,406 (2022:£559,361) which is up £65,045 on the previous year. Net profit for the year was £7,566 compared to net loss of £6,444 for the previous year.

The Statement of Financial Position remains healthy with Net Assets of £129,939 of ,which all relates to unrestricted funds.

Reserves policy

The Board of Trustees has established a policy whereby the Unrestricted Funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets for charity use ('the free reserves') held by the Company should be between 3 and 6 months of the resources expended. At this level, the Trustees feel that they would be able to continue the current activities of the company. In the event of a significant drop in funding, it would obviously be necessary to consider how the funding would be replaced or activities changed.

FUTURE PLANS

The charity plans to continue to offer its various services to the people in the locality. During 2024, it is our intention to develop a splat ball park aimed at local teenagers and young adults in the area.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The company is governed by a Board of Trustees which operates as detailed in the company's governing document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association. The Board meets between six and eight times per year. The subcommittee, the audit committee, meet on a quarterly basis and the other committees meet as necessary. A chief executive is appointed by the board to administer the day to day operations of the company and its subsidiaries.

To facilitate effective operations the Group chief executive, Mr Seamus O'Prey has delegated authority approved by the trustees for operational matters such as finance, employment and the delivery of its charitable objectives.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Due to the nature of the charity's work the trustees seek to ensure that these needs are appropriately reflected through the diversity of the trustee body. To enhance the potential pool, trustees are requested to provide a list of their skills (and update it each year) and in the event of particular skills lacking or being lost due to retirement, individuals are approached to offer themselves for election.



Opinion



Objectives and aims

The Charity's objects are to provide facilities for the inhabitants of the Belfast/Lisburn region without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, age, race, abilities, or political or religious opinions, including facilities for children's play and recreation, family and community events, meetings, classes and other forms of recreation and leisure-time occupation, with the object of improving the conditions of life for the said inhabitants.

Public benefit

The trustees have read and had regard to the Northern Ireland Charity Commission's statutory guidance on Public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Roar and Explore provide free educational activities every Monday to Thursday, which are available to all children on the premises. These activities are learning through arts and crafts (Colin's crafts), learning through cooking and baking (Ellie's Eats), learning through stories, singing and dancing (Rami's Rhymes) and learning through sensory play (Tilly's Twists). These sessions run 5 days per week, 5 sessions per day, with an average of 10 kids per session. This equates to approximately 12,000 children benefiting from these educational activities from January to December 2022.

Every morning we provide a discounted toddler morning entry rate and free toast and juice for all the children. This ensures the children are provided with something to eat and drink plus it encourages their parents to bring them out of the house to socialize and play with other children of a similar age. Approximately 5500 children benefited from this.

We offer a heavily discounted child minder entry rate, as we know that being a childminder can be quite a lonely form of work. We currently have 142 childminders registered on this scheme, of which many are extremely regular users. It gives them an opportunity to get out of the house, in a safe environment for the kids in their care to play, whilst they socialise and meet up with like-minded people. 4700 children benefited from this.

We also offered 2 for 1 discount for Perks card holders which was availed of approximately 1300 times, free birthday passes to birthday children from which 541 children benefited and free entry for staff children.

We provide discounted entry rates for nurseries, schools, and clubs. The children that come with these nurseries, schools and clubs are also provided with free toast and juice, from which over 1500 children benefited.

We also provide free parties (play, juice, hot meal and dessert) through various competitions and in support of local community groups and clubs. 250 benefited from this; in addition to over 300 free passes which were also provided to local community groups, clubs and fundraisers.

We supported a number of local sports clubs, providing them with high quality football kits and free passes - including Andersonstown Community Football Club: Glendowan FC and St Johns GAC.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year ended 31 December 2022 and Balance Sheet as at that date are shown in the attached financial statements.

Income from charitable activities for the year to 31 December 2022 is £537,479 (2021: £320,410) which is up £217,069 on the previous year. The impact of the Coronavirus pandemic and the various governmental regulations in relation to social distancing, closures etc thankfully lessened in the 2022 year. The charity gratefully received Covid government support during this year of £10,000 (2021: £120,399), together with a grant from its parent company of £5,438. Total expenditure for the year is £559,361 (2021:£394,973) which is up £164,388 on the previous year. Net loss for the year was £6,444 compared to net surplus of £45,836 for the previous year.

The Statement of Financial Position remains healthy with Net Assets in excess of £122,373 of ,which all relates to unrestricted funds.

Reserves policy

The Board of Trustees has established a policy whereby the Unrestricted Funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets for charity use ('the free reserves') held by the Company should be between 3 and 6 months of the resources expended. At this level, the Trustees feel that they would be able to continue the current activities of the company. In the event of a significant drop in funding, it would obviously be necessary to consider how the funding would be replaced or activities changed.

FUTURE PLANS

The charity plans to continue to offer its various services to the people in the locality. During 2023, it is our intention to develop a sit -in ice cream parlour and safe space at its premises to compliment the new local Colin Park initiative.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The company is governed by a Board of Trustees which operates as detailed in the company's governing document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association. The Board meets between six and eight times per year. The subcommittee, the audit committee, meet on a quarterly basis and the other committees meet as necessary. A chief executive is appointed by the board to administer the day to day operations of the company and its subsidiaries.



1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery	- 10% on cost
Fixtures and fittings	- 10% on cost

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The Charity's objects are to provide facilities for the inhabitants of the Belfast/Lisburn region without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, age, race, abilities, or political or religious opinions, including facilities for children's play and recreation, family and community events, meetings, classes and other forms of recreation and leisure-time occupation, with the object of improving the conditions of life for the said inhabitants.

Public benefit

The trustees have read and had regard to the Northern Ireland Charity Commission's statutory guidance on Public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Roar and Explore provide free educational activities every Monday to Thursday, which are available to all children on the premises. These activities are learning through arts and crafts (Colin's crafts), learning through cooking and baking (Ellie's Eats), learning through stories, singing and dancing (Rami's Rhymes) and learning through sensory play (Tilly's Twists). These sessions run 5 days per week, 5 sessions per day, with an average of 10 kids per session. This equates to approximately 12,000 children benefiting from these educational activities from January to December 2022.

Every morning we provide a discounted toddler morning entry rate and free toast and juice for all the children. This ensures the children are provided with something to eat and drink plus it encourages their parents to bring them out of the house to socialize and play with other children of a similar age. Approximately 5500 children benefited from this.

We offer a heavily discounted child minder entry rate, as we know that being a childminder can be quite a lonely form of work. We currently have 142 childminders registered on this scheme, of which many are extremely regular users. It gives them an opportunity to get out of the house, in a safe environment for the kids in their care to play, whilst they socialise and meet up with like-minded people. 4700 children benefited from this.

We also offered 2 for 1 discount for Perks card holders which was availed of approximately 1300 times, free birthday passes to birthday children from which 541 children benefited and free entry for staff children.

We provide discounted entry rates for nurseries, schools, and clubs. The children that come with these nurseries, schools and clubs are also provided with free toast and juice, from which over 1500 children benefited.

We also provide free parties (play, juice, hot meal and dessert) through various competitions and in support of local community groups and clubs. 250 benefited from this; in addition to over 300 free passes which were also provided to local community groups, clubs and fundraisers.

We supported a number of local sports clubs, providing them with high quality football kits and free passes - including Andersonstown Community Football Club: Glendowan FC and St Johns GAC.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year ended 31 December 2022 and Balance Sheet as at that date are shown in the attached financial statements.

Income from charitable activities for the year to 31 December 2022 is £537,479 (2021: £320,410) which is up £217,069 on the previous year. The impact of the Coronavirus pandemic and the various governmental regulations in relation to social distancing, closures etc thankfully lessened in the 2022 year. The charity gratefully received Covid government support during this year of £10,000 (2021: £120,399), together with a grant from its parent company of £5,438. Total expenditure for the year is £559,361 (2021: £394,973) which is up £164,388 on the previous year. Net loss for the year was £6,444 compared to net surplus of £45,836 for the previous year.

The Statement of Financial Position remains healthy with Net Assets in excess of £122,373 of which all relates to unrestricted funds.

Reserves policy

The Board of Trustees has established a policy whereby the Unrestricted Funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets for charity use ('the free reserves') held by the Company should be between 3 and 6 months of the resources expended. At this level, the Trustees feel that they would be able to continue the current activities of the company. In the event of a significant drop in funding, it would obviously be necessary to consider how the funding would be replaced or activities changed.

FUTURE PLANS

The charity plans to continue to offer its various services to the people in the locality. During 2023, it is our intention to develop a sit-in ice cream parlour and safe space at its premises to compliment the new local Colin Park initiative.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The company is governed by a Board of Trustees which operates as detailed in the company's governing document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association. The Board meets between six and eight times per year. The subcommittee, the audit committee, meet on a quarterly basis and the other committees meet as necessary. A chief executive is appointed by the board to administer the day to day operations of the company and its subsidiaries.

To facilitate effective operations the Group chief executive, Mr Seamus O'Prey has delegated authority approved by the trustees for operational matters such as finance, employment and the delivery of its charitable objectives.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Due to the nature of the charity's work the trustees seek to ensure that these needs are appropriately reflected through the diversity of the trustee body. To enhance the potential pool, trustees are requested to provide a list of their skills (and update it each year) and in the event of particular skills lacking or being lost due to retirement, individuals are approached to offer themselves for election.




