Our hall is also a hub for local groups such as Drymen Under 5's playgroup, Cubs/Scout, Local Art Club, History Club and the local Senior Citizens Association. There is an upstairs studio that accommodates a selection of fitness classes.

The Trustees submit their report and accounts for the year ended 31 October 2024.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Drymen Village Hall Committee is an unincorporated association set up under a trust deed dated 22 August 1967.

The Trustees are ex-officio appointments as specified in the Trust Deed. The Trustees have delegated the running of the Hall to the Drymen Village Hall Committee.

Drymen Village Hall Committee members are recruited by seeking appropriately experienced volunteers from the organisations having a regular annual let of the Hall. The members are appointed by the organisations and approved at the Annual General Meeting of the Committee.

The Trustees and the current members of the Drymen Village Hall Committee are listed on page 1.

No remuneration or expenses were paid to any Trustees or Committee members. As a result of a number of grants during the year the Committee started to employ a Hall Coordinator and also a temporary Open Doors Project Session Coordinator

Objectives and activities

The principal activity of the Drymen Village Hall Committee is to manage the Drymen Village Hall for the benefit of the residents of Drymen and the surrounding area, and for any bona fide charitable organisation wishing to hold a fund-raising event.

This objective is achieved by letting the Hall to various local organisations for artistic, sporting, educational and entertainment activities and for any other uses of benefit to the local community.

Achievements and performance

The Hall has returned to being one of the most highly utilised assets in the community with the number of users returning to close to the pre Covid pandemic levels. Committee meetings have taken place online.

The legal status of the trustees and trust document are to be reviewed for a more transparent and communal format.

Financial Review

Income has been received from hall lettings of £8,647 (2023 £8,509). Added to this is income from events, donations, bank interest and unrestricted grants of £21,859 (2023 £1,143). There were unrestricted expenses of £31,178 (2023 £9,392). This resulted in a deficit for the year on unrestricted funds of £672 (2023 surplus on unrestricted funds £260). The restricted fund movements are detailed in a Note to the Accounts.

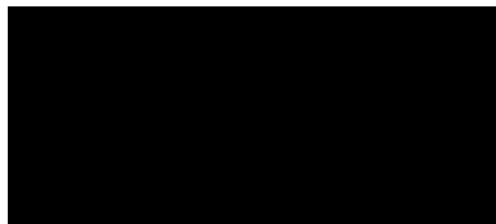
Trustee responsibilities

**REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT EXAMINER
TO THE MEMBERS OF DRYMEN VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE**

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 October 2024 set out on pages 3 and 4.

Respective responsibilities of committee and reporting accountant

As described on page 2, the Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investments (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. The Trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1)(d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under Section 44(1)(c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeks explanations from the Trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

Independent examiner's statement

In the course of my examination, no matter has come to my attention

1. which gives me reasonable cause to believe that in any material respect the requirements:
 - to keep accounting records in accordance with Section 44(1)(a) of the 2005 Act and Regulation 4 of the Accounts Regulations and
 - to prepare accounts which accord with the accounting records and comply with Regulation 9 of the 2006 Regulations have not been met, or
2. to which in my opinion, attention should be drawn in order to enable a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached.
