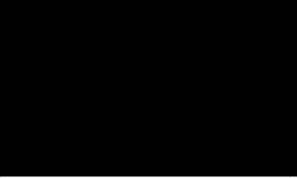

Report of the Trustees

The Trustees are pleased to present their report together with the financial statements of the church for the year ended 31 December 2024.

Status of Charity and Governing Document

Castletown and Community Free Church of Scotland formally known as Olig, Watten and Bower Free Church of Scotland, is established by Constitution. The Charity name was formally changed on the 13th August 2014. The church is a Scottish Charity (No.SC001754).

Aims and Affiliation

Castletown and Community Free Church of Scotland is a congregation of the national Free Church of Scotland working towards the common aims set out above. It is a Presbyterian church adhering in its worship and doctrine to the position of the Church of Scotland at the Reformation. The Free Church of Scotland has an explanatory document which explains the origins of the Church and which gives the historical background to the Church coming into being 1843 and lists documents in which is embodied the constitution of the Church. The document is available on request from the Free Church of Scotland, 15 North Bank St., The Mound, Edinburgh, EH1 2LS.

The Free Church of Scotland currently has over 100 congregations in Scotland, as well as one in London and four in North America, and sister Churches founded by mission work in India, Peru and South Africa. The Church also has a seminary in the heart of Edinburgh for the training of Ministers and other Christian Workers and sustains an extensive Missionary programme relative to the size of the church. The principal activity of the Church is the conduct of public worship and associated matters in the context of local congregations.

Dating from 1843 but with its roots in the Reformation, it owes its distinctive title to its historical struggle to remain 'free' from state interference in its internal affairs. It has close and active relations with many other Reformed churches of Jesus Christ throughout the world and stands firmly in the traditions which accept the Bible in its entirety as the Word of God and, therefore, derives its forms of teaching, worship, ministry and government from it. The main emphasis of our worship is the preaching of the gospel - the good news of a free and sovereign salvation through Jesus Christ alone.

The congregation is authorised by the Church to have a minister paid from central funds of the Church.

The Church building and the Minister's Manse are the property of the congregation and are held under the Church's model trust deed.

Trustees and Office Bearers

The Church is Presbyterian in government and its day to day running is undertaken by the Elders (the Kirk Session) and the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee specific function relates to the material and financial business of the congregation, whereas Elders are charged with the general and spiritual oversight of the Congregation.

Appointment of Charity Trustees

The Kirk session exercises its discretion in determining the most appropriate method of electing new Trustees (Elders and Deacons). Any election process must involve the communicant membership of the congregation. There is no fixed term of Trusteeship. Prior to their appointment, new Trustees would have served the church for some time in various roles and would be familiar with the church's values, its aims and objectives as well as its day-to-day operations. As part of their induction programme, new Trustees are required to understand their statutory responsibilities as well as their responsibility as elder or deacon.

Achievements and Performance

During the year, the church met regularly for worship and carried out various activities in pursuit of the above stated aims.

Financial review

Principal sources of funding

The church receives its funding from church members by way of weekly offerings and Gift Aid donations.

Result for the year

The financial statements for the year are set out in pages 6 to 8. The Receipts and Payments account on page 6 reflects a net Surplus of £911 (2023 Deficit £463).

Grant Making Policy

The church makes grants from its tithed gift income to individuals and organisations that are generally known to the Trustees and the church. The beneficiaries are involved in activities or ministries compatible with the church's objectives,

Statement on Risk

The Trustees assess the major risks to which the charity is exposed on an ongoing basis and have established procedures to mitigate those that are identified as a result of these reviews.

Trustees' Responsibilities

Under legislation relating to charities in Scotland, the Trustees are required to prepare financial statements

for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the church's affairs and of its incoming

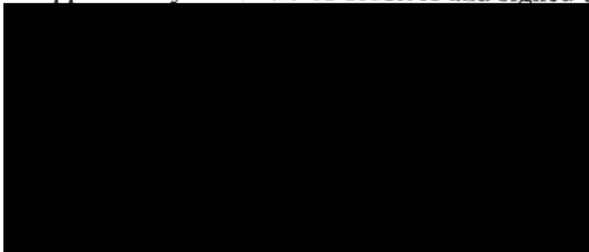
resources and application of resources, including its surplus or deficit for that year, and which have been properly prepared from and are in agreement with the accounting records of the church and comply with relevant disclosure requirements.

In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- A) Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- B) Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- C) Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the church will continue its activities.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting record which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the church's financial position and enable the Trustees to ensure that the financial statements comply with the requirements of Section 44 to 48 of The Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Account (Scotland) Regulations 2006 flowing there from. The Trustees also have general responsibility for taking such steps as are reasonably open to them to safeguard the church's assets and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

Report of the Independent Examiner to the Trustees

For the year ended 31 December 2024

I report on the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2024, which are set out on pages 6 to 8.

Respective responsibilities of the trustees and the independent examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the financial statements as required under section 44(1)(c) of the Act, and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of the Independent Examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the financial statements presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the financial statements, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence which would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the financial statements.

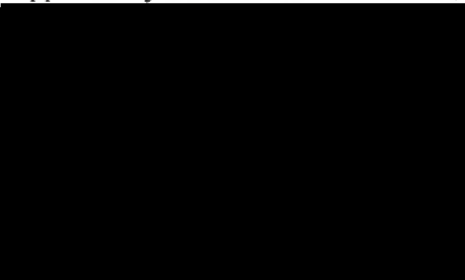

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the year ended 31 December 2024

1 Accounting Policies.

Basis of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared on a cash basis.

Church Income

All voluntary income and bank interest and income tax recoveries on Gift Aid is accounted for when received.

Tangible fixed assets

The manse was built in 1992 and informally valued by a member of the Committee at £85,000, based on its construction costs. The churches and the hall have not been valued in view of the limited market available.

Unrestricted funds comprise income received for the object of the church without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Restricted funds comprise income which has been received for the objects of the church and specified for a restricted purpose within these objects by the donor.

2 Ministers' Stipend

The Stipend is paid from The Free Church of Scotland in Edinburgh, the congregation is required, each year to send to Edinburgh enough funds to meet the stipend.

3 Trustee Remuneration and Related Party Transactions

No trustee, other than [REDACTED], received any remuneration or reimbursement of expenses during the year (2023: Nil). No trustee or a person related to a trustee had any personal interest in any contract or transaction entered into by the charity during the year.
