Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of the New Unitary Constitution.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the Elders of the Church and are chosen from those members of the Church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The Minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery. The names of those who served as trustees during the year are shown on page 1.

Organisational Structure

The Kirk Session is chaired by the Minister, whom failing, the Interim Moderator. Certain responsibilities are delegated to our various committees, namely worship, finance, property, mission, outreach, fundraising, safeguarding, as appropriate. The Kirk Session meets at least 6 times a year and is also responsible for spiritual affairs within the Church.

Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Activities and Performance

2025 started on a positive note, the new green shoots of worship, mission & outreach, highlighted in our 2024 Annual Report did indeed grow and flourish. Taking the words of Proverbs 16:3 to heart, as a worshipping community, seeking to serve our parish and beyond, we did indeed prayerfully commit our work and witness to the Lord.

In the unfolding of the year, new people came along to worship with us and by the end of the year were contributing to our "planning session" which took the form of a lunch after worship, in the month of November. It was a joy to see them engage in our church family and feel able to express their views and offer good ideas in relation to us fulfilling our goals, which are focused on the Five marks of Mission. An interesting point coming out of this observation is that whilst on paper, the membership roll of 140 (at the end of December 2024) in the course of 2025 increased by one through a Profession of Faith and fell by ten through the death of communicant members, resulting in a roll of 131 at the end of 2025, however, in truth our church attendance increased through the new folks coming along but because they did not have certificates of transference and were not added to the roll in 2025 they were not included in the numbers. It is hoped, that as a result of their weekly attendance at worship and clearly demonstrated commitment to our goals, they will be added through resolution of the Kirk Session to our roll membership at the start of 2026. This seems to highlight the point that numbers on paper do not always give a true reflection of the level of commitment that exists in person. In 2025 we did indeed fulfil the marks of mission, which aim to draw others into the church family. even though on paper the numbers did not reveal this truth.

In addition, other new folks drew alongside us through their involvement with our mission and outreach work. In November 2024 we started the Toastie Tuesday, freely offering a warm space, warm toastie and the warmth of friendship to those who often feel isolated. I am delighted to report that by November 2025 – we celebrated its first anniversary giving thanks for the positive impact this outreach venture has had. We wondered if we would have enough helpers to make it work and ended up with no less than twelve people on the rota. One lady saw us in the supermarket buying the food we required and was so moved by our work that she came along the very next week and is now very much part of our Team. Although there is a regular core group who attend the Toastie Tuesday weekly, there are always new faces coming along. Pastoral support is also offered. It has been a steep learning curve for us but we have not only fully complied with all health & safety and food hygiene regulations, we have served the community and seen new offshoots emerge in the form of a Toastie Thursday for school children, a Toddlers Toastie at Christmas and a Breakfast with Sants for families. Whether it be at our Craft Stall at the Community Gala Day in May or the Denny Winter celebration in December, the Messy Church or in the presentation of a Bible to all Primary Seven Pupils each year, an appropriately aged book with a biblical message is freely given to all who come along. All of this outreach has continued to strengthen our ties with the Primary school and wider community and allowed the minister to work in partnership with the Primary School Community Learning Development Officer.

Contact with our members is maintained through parish visiting, a regular magazine and weekly service reflections sent out to the housebound. Regular intimations keep folks informed and all policies, in relation to our practice and procedures, are displayed in the halls and in the church vestibule. Our United Services continued in 2025, not only at Holy Week and Easter but on five other occasions during the year. The objective is to increase our working relationship with neighbouring congregations.

The above key achievements in relation to our work and witness are made possible through the time, talents, possessions and prayers that our members willingly offer. A sincere word of thanks is extended to each and every one of them.

It is, however, only right to note that in relation to our performance in 2025, we had many challenges to face. It is demanding asking a roll of 140 people, in a small community, to raise a general income in the region of £70,000. We have always met what has been asked of us and give thanks for the generosity of those who support us, but ever rising costs, especially in relation to property expenditure, make it harder and harder. At the end of 2025 damage to a panel in the church ceiling cost us over £4,000 when we were almost running on fumes. It is stressful knowing that you are only one major property crisis away from despair. The resilience of our Trustees and members is commendable.

The Mission Plan has been equally challenging and for many years has been going round and round in circles. It has cost those involved in the discussions a lot of time and frustration but, once again, their faithfulness and trust in God needs to be acknowledged. It is hoped that 2026 will be the year in which the way forward is found.

The above challenges and frustrations in our performance, which are very much part of our church journey, are borne graciously by our Trustees who work tirelessly, with some of them travelling quite a distance, on a weekly basis, to fulfil their role. Once again thanks are extended to them all.

We end the year 2025 believing that He who began a good work in us will carry it on to completion.

Financial Review

We express our thanks to everyone who has supported us throughout the year, whether through donations, helping to run fundraising events or attending these events. Our church has ever increasing financial costs which need to be met on an ongoing regular basis, with most items of expenditure continuing to demand an increased level of outgoing. In 2025 we again worked hard at increasing our income from fundraising with considerable success. All our costs continued to be met in full and timeously. However, due to having to catch up by several thousand pounds on the gas bill which accumulated while our meter wasn't functioning for the last few months of 2024, and some unexpected repairs to the church ceiling we finished the year with expenditure exceeding income by £9820. Of our General Account income of the year approximately 58% was from Gift Aid and reclaimed tax, 8% from Free Will Offerings and 5% from Open Plate, the remainder coming from other donations, fundraising and premises lets.

We continue to be in a journey with an uncertain outcome, and as we proceed, we thank everyone for their continued support of the work of Jesus Christ and ask every member and supporter to prayerfully consider their contribution, both financial and practical, to enable us to meet the future for our Church with strength and positivity.

Reserves Policy

It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately five months expenditure including designated funds.

The members of the Kirk Session must prepare financial statements which give sufficient detail to enable an appreciation of the transactions of the Church during the financial year. The members of the Kirk Session are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, which, on request, must reflect the financial position of the Church at that time. This must be done to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) regulations 2006 and the Regulations Anent Congregational Finance approved by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2007. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and must take reasonable steps for the prevention and/or detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Dunipace Parish Church of Scotland

Basis of independent examiner's statement

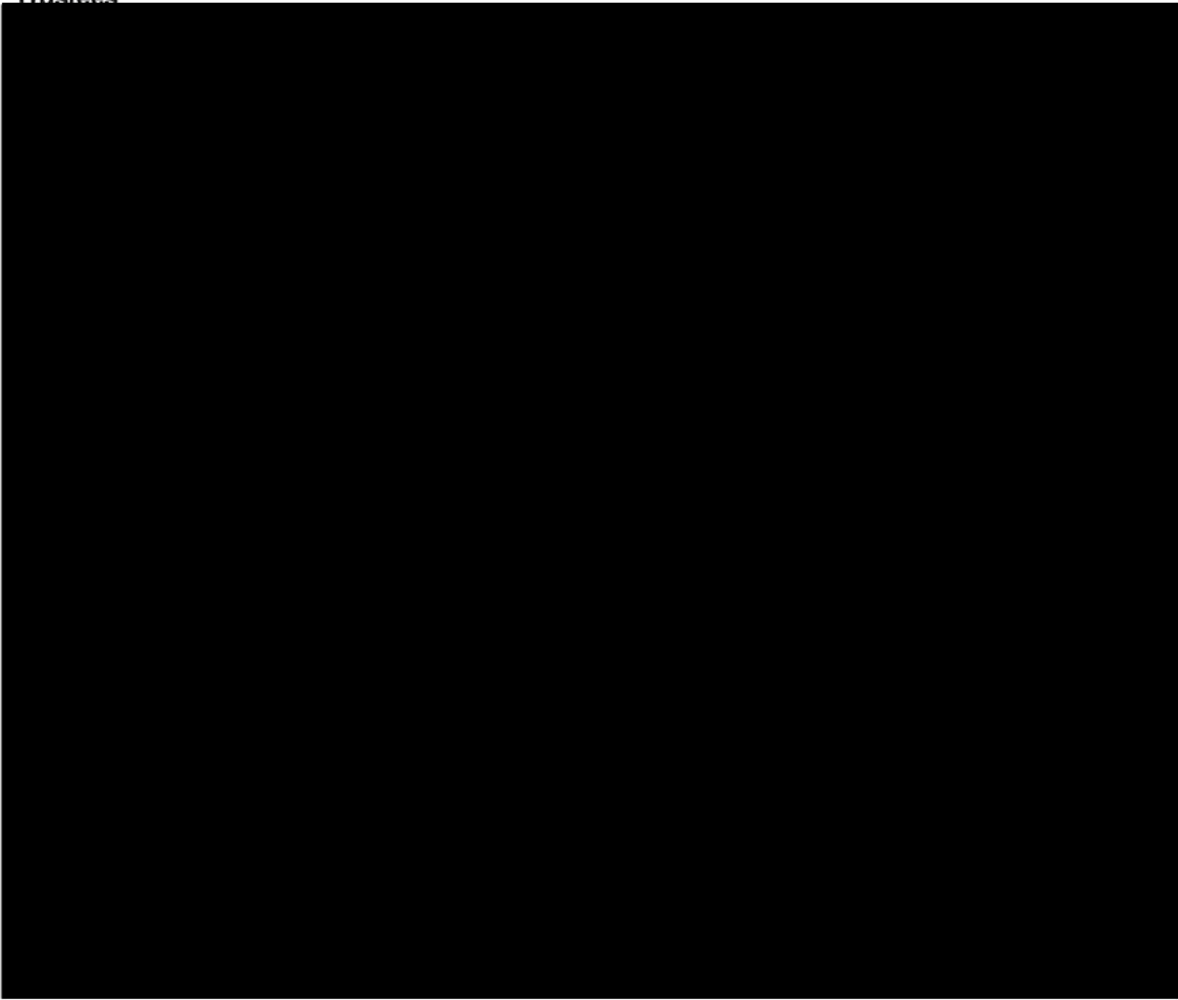

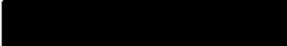

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of the New Unitary Constitution.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The Minister, who is the Moderator of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery. Members of the congregation are invited to nominate individuals who are believed to have the skills and commitment to contribute to the management affairs of the Church to become Trustees. All Elders serve as Trustees for as long as they remain active Elders. Members of the congregation co-opted onto committees serve as long as they have something to contribute to the work of a committee and can be re-appointed. All appointments are reported at the Stated Annual Meeting.

The Unitary Constitution is more flexible in drawing upon the gifts and skills of those who are not Elders on the Kirk Session, thus allowing wider members of the congregation and indeed folks from the local community to serve as co-opted members of our committees.

The increasing frailty of several Trustees resulted in nine retiring in 2024 as a result of serious illness. Their loss in some way was compensated for through the flexibility of the Unitary Constitution which allows us to draw upon the gifts and skills of those who are not on the Kirk Session. It is encouraging to note that we do have an increasing number of members who although unwilling to take on the role of a Trustee do contribute to the work of the congregation and its efforts at fulfilling our missional goals. This is greatly appreciated and acknowledged..

Organisational Structure

The Board of Trustees is moderated by the Minister and meets at least five times in a year. Certain responsibilities are delegated to the Finance Committee, the Property Committee, the Mission & Outreach Committee and the Social Events Committee as appropriate. The Board of Trustees (Kirk Session) is responsible for spiritual and temporal affairs within the church.

Whilst hybrid meetings continue to be an option, by the end of 2024, it was becoming clear that the move towards in person meetings was increasingly being requested. The social interaction and ability to more fully engage in the discussions has resulted in greater involvement in the decisions that are being taken.

Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Our key objective is to promote the Christian values we uphold through our work and witness which is freely available to all. This objective continues to be shaped, in practice, through the five marks of mission: to proclaim the good news of the kingdom; to teach, baptise and nurture new believers; to respond to human need by loving service; to seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation; to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth. Our missional endeavour is still to make these marks of mission meaningful in our worship and real in our outreach to the parish and beyond.

Trustees' Annual Report (cont)

Year ended 31 December 2024

In 2024, the green shoots of our work and witness, which had been struggling to emerge from the dark soil of Covid-19 and the strangling chaos of cluster conversations around the Mission Plan, were finally spouting upwards and outwards. This was seen in renewed forms of outreach, such as the Christian Craft Activities, offered freely to families at the Community Gala, which touched the lives of a huge number, bonding us closer to the local community – as did the Market Stalls at our Christmas Fayre in the church halls, allowing us to engage with many of the small artisan businesses in our community, who left us at the end of the day, pleading for a Spring Fayre in 2025, teaching us that "Working together benefits us all." Our community outreach ties, were further strengthened through greater involvement with the local Primary School, who not only asked for the let of our halls to help them provide more activities for the pupils but also through the number of school services being held in the church increasing. Beyond the traditional Christmas Service, Easter Service and Sumer Service, the School Commencement Service and Harvest Service, also took place in the Church with the Minister leading them all. The community also responded well to our "Light Up Christmas Event in our Church Community Garden and the Family Christingle Service in the Church, thereafter.

2024 also saw us host the Carron Division Christmas Service for Rainbows & Brownies across the area, the church was packed to capacity. Our Messy Church also allows us to engage with the community. Even though the numbers attending are not as high as in the past, new faces come along and pastoral links are being forged which are followed up.

Social and community outreach events flourished in 2024. These included, an Arts Exhibition displaying the creative talents of many members, Afternoon Teas, A Burns Banter, Community Quiz Night, Bo'ness Belles Concert and Fellowship Meals. In relation to Mission & Outreach the quarterly afternoon Communion Service in the Local Sheltered Housing Complex, along with Home Communion and an ever-rising number of pastoral visits, opened new doors into the community. Regular newsletters and the use of social media allowed us to scatter the seeds of our faith more widely. In November we opened our Toastie Tuesday, freely offering a warm space, warm toastie and the warmth of fellowship to help combat social isolation. This has been a huge success bringing in people of all ages, including many school children and child minders from our parish and beyond. We have put a lot of resources into this outreach venture, which includes the dedicated time of those setting up the halls, preparing the food and serving, and the generosity of those who have given financially to kick start the mission and secure the equipment required. Hall usage is on the rise too, with Rainbows, Toddlers Groups, Brownies, Yoga classes, the Kids Kirk, and many requests for various other hall lets throughout the year.

In 2024, eight Long Service Certificates were presented, seven to Elders serving more than 30 years each and one to our organist for as many years of service too. Nurturing our links with neighbouring churches was strengthened through our increasing number of United Services within our "Cluster Area" and also drawing in our Ecumenical neighbours too. We supported several charities on a united basis which included a "Marmalade Mission" to raise extra funds for the World Day of Prayer. Showing that even those with what others consider "little" can go a long way, demonstrating the caring and sharing side of our congregation who strive to promote the Good News and make a difference in our parish and beyond.

Trustees' Annual Report (cont)

Year ended 31 December 2024

Green shoots of financial growth were strengthened through positive responses from church members who willingly rose "to the financial challenges" enabling us to end the year on a firmer footing. The Giving to Grow special appeal raised £2655 and our £100 Challenge raised a further £2350. All property requirements were met but the loss of our tenant in the church flat meant we would go into 2025 with no regular rental income from the Flat. Our hope is to have the flat re-let as soon as possible. We have always managed to "make ends meet" even though it gets harder and harder. As 2024 ended on a positive note we ventured into 2025 praying the ever-rising costs would not break the financial shoots that are doing their best to thrive.

2024 was definitely a year in which we were constantly springing into action. The fruitfulness of the year's work and witness was made possible through the undiminished commitment of very faithful office bearers, the support of the congregation and community. To whom our heartfelt thanks are extended.

Financial Review

We express our thanks to everyone who has supported us throughout the year, whether through donations, helping to run fundraising events or attending these events. Our church has ever-increasing financial costs which need to be met on an ongoing regular basis, with heating costs in particular demanding a higher slice of our income due the rising cost of gas. In 2024 we worked hard at increasing our income from fundraising with considerable success. All our costs continued to be met in full and timeously, and we finished the year with an excess of income over expenditure of £9273. However it has to be noted that, due to a problem with the gas smart meter, our bills had been inaccurate for the last 2 or 3 months of 2024 so we had underpaid by probably around £2000. Hopefully the problem with the meter has been resolved and our bills are back on track.

Of our General Account income for the year, approximately 57% was from Gift Aid and reclaimed tax, 7% from Free Will offerings, 3% from Open Plate and the remainder from other donations, fundraising and premises lets.

As we continue on this journey of monumental change, we thank everyone for their continued support of the work of Jesus Christ and ask every member and supporter to prayerfully consider their involvement, both practical and financial, to enable us to navigate the way forward for our Church with strength and positivity.

Reserves Policy

It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately five months expenditure including designated funds.

The members of the Kirk Session must prepare financial statements which give sufficient detail to enable an appreciation of the transactions of the Church during the financial year. The members of the Kirk Session are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, which, on request, must reflect the financial position of the Church at that time. This must be done to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) regulations 2006 and the Regulations Anent Congregational Finance approved by there General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2007. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and must take reasonable steps for the prevention and / or detection of fraud and other irregularities.

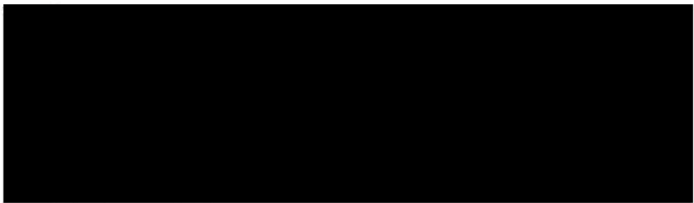
Basis of independent examiner's statement

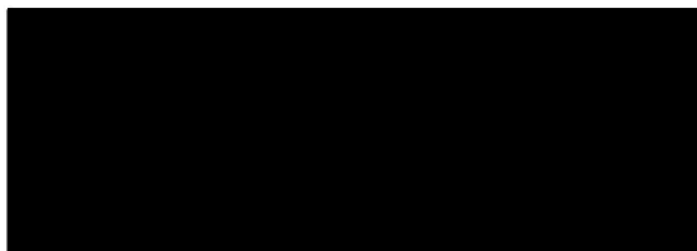
