Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of the Church of Scotland's Model Deed of Constitution.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

Members of the Kirk Session and the Congregational Board are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery. The Congregational Board is appointed from within the congregation and members of the congregation are invited to nominate individuals who are believed to have the skills and commitment to contribute to the management affairs of the Church, to become members of the Board. Board Members are then appointed at the Stated Annual Meeting and serve for a period of three years after which they must seek re-election at the next Stated Annual Meeting.

Organisational Structure

The Chair of the Congregational Board is elected by Board members and the Board meets five times in a year. The Kirk Session which meets six times a year is responsible for spiritual affairs within the church.

Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Achievements and Performance

Dunscore Church roll at the present time stands at 138 with the average weekly attendance each Sunday being 25.

We live-stream our services each week and normally 3/4 people use this facility. We also record our services on YouTube which attracts 20-40 people each week.

Once a month we hold an 'All Together Now' act of worship which aims to be family friendly. This service, which members of a team of 5 plan and lead, normally has an attendance of 20-30.

We continue with our Kids in Kirk, once a month, where children attending are led in child friendly worship by two of our church members. Typically from 1 to 5 children attend.

In the summer, two of our younger church members organised and led a holiday club which attracted between 4-10 children.

We continue to enjoy several special services such as the joint services with our linked congregation of St Ninians, in Moniaive, a Holocaust memorial service, an early morning Easter service a Harvest service and a Remembrance service. Many of these attract attendance from non-regulars. Our orchestra service of lessons and carols just before Christmas can have as many as 70-100 present. Christingle is another such service that we see as outreach in nature along with Carols in the Pub. Several church members are very actively involved in organising and delivering services to our local care home and participate in The World Day of Prayer.

We are fortunate to have a retired minister as well as a church member who has completed the Introduction to Designing and Leading Worship course and so are well served to cover services when Mark, our minister, is on holiday. Our Minister writes an article for the local community magazine which is produced three times a year. Facebook is also used regularly to promote church activities

Church services are always followed by refreshments and the majority of people stay to enjoy this time of fellowship.

A new event for our church community 'La Posada' was championed this year by one of our members and we hope to make this an annual event. 'La Posada' occurs during advent and involves those who wish to participate being asked to welcome figures representing the Holy Family into their home and give some hospitality to those bringing the figures. These hosts later are invited by another participating family where they pass the figures on and receive hospitality. The journey was photographed and posted on Facebook. This was very successful and meaningful to those who participated.

The 'Connect' Bible Study group numbers 8-12 and is led by members of the group.

Our twinning with the Ndola Church in Zambia continues although making contact can be sporadic. The Eco-group consists of 12 or so members who continue to litter pick in the area and to highlight ecological matters by lobbying parliament and supporting Eco-congregation Scotland. We also host an exceptional freecycle service.

The 'Heritage Centre' within Dunscore Church is open on Sunday afternoons between April and October and contains memorabilia relating to Jane Haining, the church and village. Our expert on Jane Haining delivers many talks to Guilds and Rurals locally throughout the year.

We often host groups from Hungary and this year we welcomed a large group of theology students who were visiting sites of interest relating to Jane Haining.

Fundraising is an important part of Church life both socially and economically. We benefit from our plant, bric-a-brac and book sale and our teas are legendary and well supported. We host the occasional concert and local groups such as the amateur dramatic and Fairtrade groups regularly use our church building.

Our Church is represented in many community events such as the Gala and pub quizzes and we feel this is an important part of our Church Mission.

Financial Review

This year Dunscore Church accounts show an increase in the total fund value. This was largely the result of a legacy which has boosted our reserves as well as gaining interest in our savings account. Without the effect of such one-off payments the receipts figure still shows a small surplus over payments demonstrating the solid commitment of the members and the sound decisions of the Congregational Board.

With the need to carry out major repairs to the Church in the foreseeable future, it is imperative that we have the financial means to meet the costs involved. The reserves should go some way towards this goal, supplemented by fundraising and hopefully also by grant assistance.

Overall the accounts for the year ended 31 December 2025 show that Dunscore Church is in a satisfactory financial position.

Reserves Policy

It is the Trustees' policy to hold sufficient reserves to cover anticipated expenditure for six months. At the year-end Dunscore Church held unrestricted cash funds of £108,350. This figure represents more than twelve months of expenditure in 2025.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The members of the Kirk Session / Congregational Board must prepare financial statements which give sufficient detail to enable an appreciation of the transactions of the Church during the financial year. The members of the Kirk Session / Congregational Board are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which, on request, must reflect the financial position of the Church at that time. This must be done to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 and the Regulations anent Congregational Finance approved by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2007. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and must take reasonable steps for the prevention and/or detection of fraud and other irregularities.

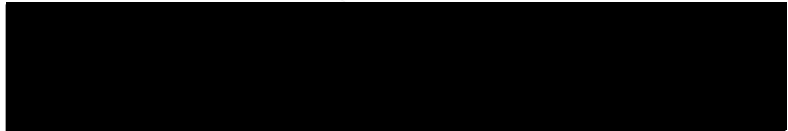

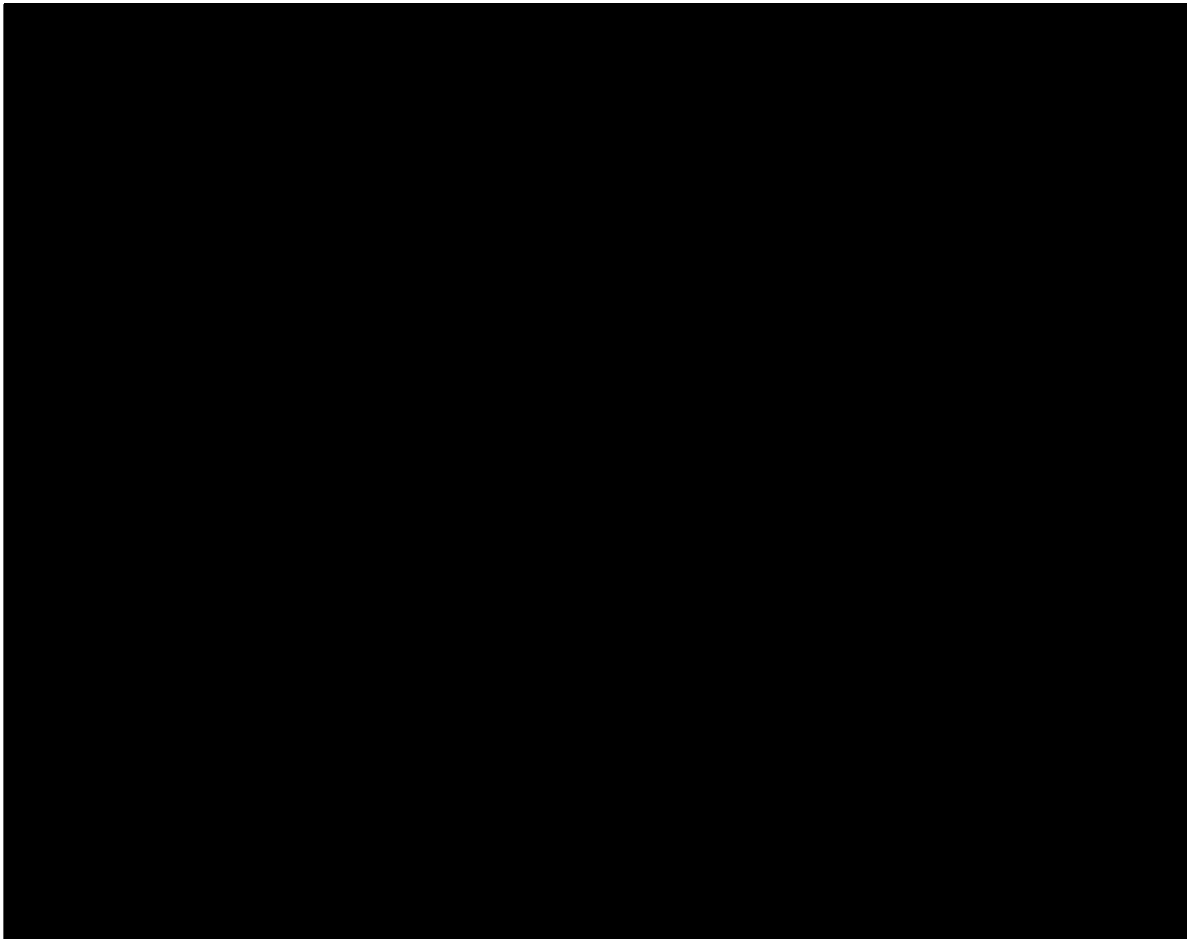
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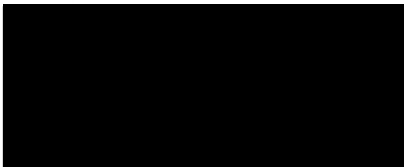

As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Achievements and Performance

The number of parishioners on our Roll for 2024 is 138. Morning services are attended by an average of 25 people, watched on-line live by 0-3 and an average of 20 watch the recording. Due to the leaders of Messy Church moving to another area, we have replaced these monthly services with one called "All Together Now" which is aimed at all ages. This has been well received and we continue to refine these services with suggestions from the congregation. Kids in Kirk is also held once a month where two adults lead a session for children outwith the sanctuary. We enjoy communion three to four times a year and are trying different formats. Over and above our regular Sunday services, there is a monthly evening service, a Conventicle, a Holocaust memorial event, an early-morning Easter service as well as Remembrance Day and Christingle services. Fellowship and refreshments are very popular after all services. Our

Connect bible study programme attracts between 8-15 people. Three of the four teams who provide short church services at the local care home are formed and organised by members of Dunscore Church.

Two of our church members wrote a short book commemorating the 200 years since the current church building was built and this is on sale in the Heritage Room which is open every Sunday between Easter and October.

We try to keep our church and our Christianity present in the community with an excellent and up-to-date website, Facebook presence and with very active email communication. Our church building is used for fund-raising and informative events including armchair travel evenings, a Following Death forum and concerts. The local Amateur Dramatic group uses the church for practice and production purposes and the Fairtrade group hold meetings and a very busy Big Brew event in the church each year.

Other popular fundraising initiatives are the annual plant-sale with bric-a-brac and books, a presence at the local Gala day and an open garden and afternoon tea at the manse.

Our Church Family is well respected and represented within all other organisations in the village.

Financial Review

The Dunscore Church year started financially with a surprise reduction in amount paid to us by Church of Scotland for glebe rent. This decrease was an amount which equated approximately to our normal annual fundraising total. This unwelcome news came shortly before it emerged that the replacement of the Manse roof was required.

The cost of the works to the Manse roof, approximately £30,000, to be shared with our sister congregation, Glencairn and Moniaive Church, focussed our congregational board on targeted fundraising. This situation also triggered an application for a grant from Church of Scotland which happily resulted in a 100% recovery of the roof replacement cost.

This welcome contribution, along with the generous donations from the members and supporters, has enabled Dunscore Church to end the year with a surplus of receipts over payments.

We were also fortunate this year to be recipients of a legacy which was placed in our 95 day account, thus giving Dunscore Church a cushion against future expenditure within a background of falling membership and the continued responsibility for maintenance and repair of Church and Manse buildings. For additional transparency, this 95 day account has now been placed along with the other unrestricted bank accounts.

In summary, the annual accounts for 2024 show that Dunscore Church has the resilience to withstand unexpected financial challenges and consequently has ended the year in a satisfactory financial position.

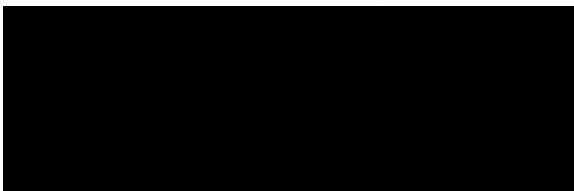
