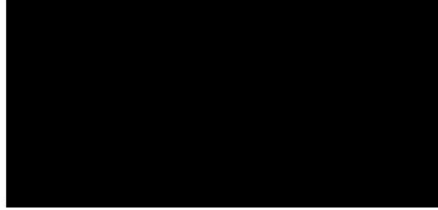

Trustees' Annual Report

Year ended 31 December 2024

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deed of Constitution (Unitary Form). Previously the Church was administered under a traditional Deed of Constitution which required a Kirk Session and a Congregational Board. On 21st May 2015, the new Deed of Constitution (Unitary Form) was signed by the Principal Clerk of the Church of Scotland and on that date the Congregational Board was disbanded.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The Kirk Session are the charity trustees. Previously members of the Kirk Session and the Congregational Board were the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery.

The Kirk Session is responsible for all material as well as spiritual matters working through six teams: Finance, Property, Pastoral, Hospitality, Outreach and Ministry. The members of the teams are drawn from the eldership, former members of the Congregational Board and other members of the congregation with the necessary gifts and skills.

Organisational Structure

The Kirk Session is chaired by the minister and meets four times in a year, with additional meetings as required.

Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

The vision of the congregation of Thurso St Peter's and St Andrew's is to serve God in His church and, through Him, the community. Public worship on Sunday is the key activity of the church, with morning services being held and live streamed and evening services held once a month. Organisations within and affiliated to the congregation include the Sunday School, Ladies Bible Study, Bible Study / Fellowship Groups, and midweek Prayer Meeting. The church provides a twice weekly Community Warm Space, a weekly Mother & Toddler group and periodically runs courses for those interested in finding out about the Christian faith (Alpha and Youth Alpha course).

Achievements and Performance

Church membership at the end of the year was 108. There are a further 100 adherents. Six baptisms, eight weddings and sixty-nine funerals were conducted by the Minister during the year.

Church Sunday worship was conducted all year, with services being livestreamed to the Church Facebook page and evening services being reintroduced once a month. Weekly prayer meetings and bible studies, as well as fellowship groups, were held. A Warm Space re-started in the autumn to support those in the local community impacted by fuel poverty etc. In addition, Home Start Caithness are using our church to provide a location for people looking after young children to meet in a safe environment with toys to play with and staff to offer help and offer advice.

Financial Review

The attached financial statement shows an excess of payments over receipts of £21,273 for the year to 31 December 2024, compared with an excess of receipts over payments of £302 in the previous year 2023. Total receipts for the year amounted to £51,939 (2023 £55,613). The principal recurrent source of income is offerings / donations amounting to £50,520 in the period (2023 £49,984).

Total payments amounted to £73,212 (2023 £55,311).

Overall, there was an excess of payments over receipts of £7,694 on unrestricted fund for the period. This position was in part caused by ongoing issues with the Church utilities bills leading to an overpayment for 2024. It is assessed that the overpayment explains £4,615 of the unrestricted loss. Resolution of the overpayment position will benefit the 2025 financial year.

There was also an excess of payments over receipts of £13,579 on restricted funds. This position was expected and planned reflected the utilisation of the funds held by the General Trustees in a Consolidated Fabric Fund. and are available to the Congregation for fabric purposes. The fabric expenditure included the installation of a new gas boiler in the church building.

Reserves Policy

It is the Trustees' policy to rebuild appropriate reserves. This is medium to long term aspiration. The short-term objective is to balance total receipts with total payments.

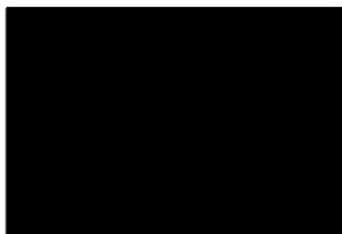
At 31st December 2024 the total reserves amounted to £33,540, of which £27,671 were unrestricted and £5,869 restricted.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The members of the Kirk Session must prepare financial statements which give sufficient detail to enable an appreciation of the transactions of the Church during the financial year. The members of the Kirk Session are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which, on request, must reflect the financial position of the Church at that time. This must be done to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 as amended by the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Amendment Regulations 2010 and the Regulations Anent Congregational Finance approved by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2012. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and must take reasonable steps for the prevention and/or detection of fraud and other irregularities.

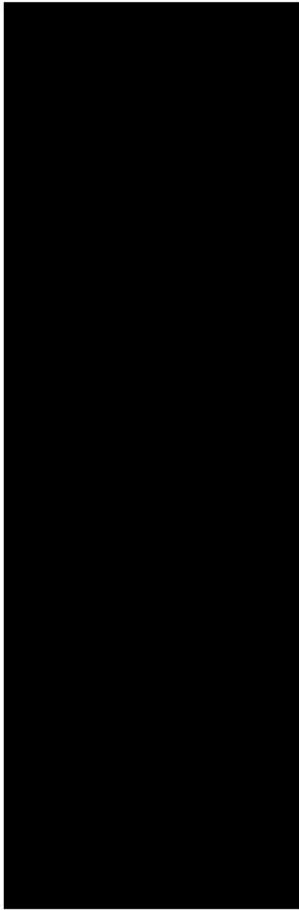

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Thurso St Peter's and St Andrew's Church

We report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31ST December 2024 which are set out on pages 8 to 12.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is our responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to our attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

Our examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently we do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

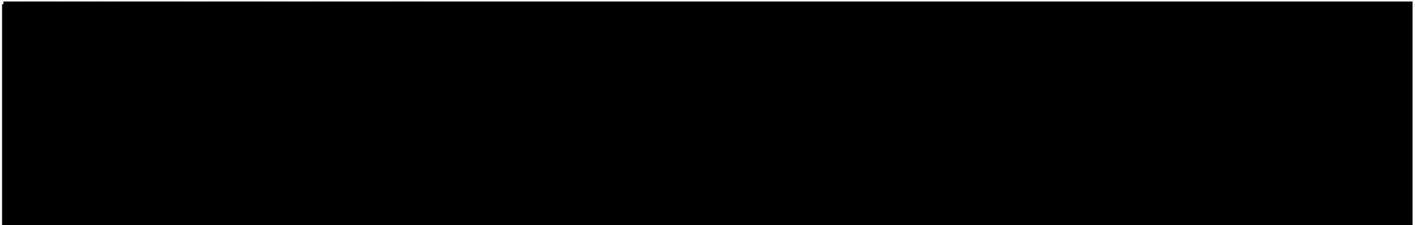

Purposes of Designated Funds

Fabric Fund: The Congregation's policy for fabric expenditure is that normal repairs and maintenance are met from the General account whilst major fabric work is defrayed from this fund.

Purposes of Restricted Funds

Church Trust Fund: For many years, the interest earned from the bank deposit representing this fund was transferred to the Fabric Fund. However, having taken appropriate advice part of this fund was used to finance the renovation and extension at the Manse.

Consolidated Fabric Fund: During 2020, the Church Manse was sold and a replacement manse purchased. The surplus funds are held by the General Trustees in a Consolidated Fabric Fund and are available to the Congregation to fund fabric expenditure.

5 Consolidated Fabric Fund

During 2020, the Church manse was sold and a replacement manse purchased. The surplus funds generated are held by the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland and invested in the Consolidated Fabric Fund on behalf of the Congregation. During the year a total of £14,252 was utilised, with Kirk Session and Presbytery approval, for fabric purposes including the replacement of the church boiler.

At 31st December 2024 the remaining funds held by the General Trustees amounted to £3,230.

6 Minister's Stipend

All Church of Scotland congregations contribute to the National Stipend Fund which bears the costs of all ministers' stipends and employer's contributions for national insurance, pension and housing and loan fund. Ministers' stipends are paid in accordance with the national stipend scale, which is related to years of service. For 2024 the minimum stipend was £31,642 and the maximum stipend (in the fifth and subsequent years of service) £38,884.

7 Collections for Third Parties

A total of £673 was collected at Christmas services towards the Caithness FM Toy Appeal. These funds are not included in the 2024 accounts.
