MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

I. INTRODUCTIONS

Attendance

Apologies

Minutes from the 2023 AGM

Circulated prior to the meeting. It was noted that there was a mistake in the minutes in that [REDACTED] was proposed as Secretary by [REDACTED], not as Chair. With this correction the minutes were proposed by Les Hatton and seconded by [REDACTED]. The minutes were accepted by a majority vote.

II. REPORTS

Annual Totals

[REDACTED] presented the annual ringing totals for 2023 which were circulated prior to the meeting, accompanied by some slides. New species for the TRG list in 2023 were Ptarmigan and Blyth's Reed Warbler. The usual suspects were in the top ten species ringed, with

Bearded Tit numbers down from the last reporting period. [REDACTED] noted that Siskin numbers were at an all time low in 2023. [REDACTED] noted that Storm Petrels were absent from the species totals this year and that there was definitely a keenness among group members to go for this species, particularly at Fife Ness. Barred Warbler appears on the list as a single bird and a 10 year high, but [REDACTED] clarified that this is because only a single Barred Warbler has previously been ringed and over 10 years ago. [REDACTED] also clarified that that the bird listed as "hybrid" was in fact a Feral Pigeon, for which no code currently exists in DemOn; [REDACTED] has approached BTO to ask if this can be added. [REDACTED] thanked [REDACTED] for her work as Schedules Officer and for the presentation and preparation of the report.

Secretary's Report

[REDACTED] presented the Secretary's Report as circulated prior to the meeting. Membership of the group has declined slightly from the last AGM, currently standing at 111. Two of the publications presented in the report were Short-eared Owl studies lead-authored by [REDACTED], who wished to pass on his thanks to the group for financial and fieldwork assistance for the project. [REDACTED] mentioned a conversation with [REDACTED] at BTO, who stated that TRG is currently the largest and longest established ringing group in the UK. There was some discussion about when exactly the group was formed, and whether that was before Lothian RG, with 1968 being the agreed year TRG was formed. [REDACTED] noted that Anthony had only been in the role of a year and thanked him for his efforts and for the report

Treasurer's Report

[REDACTED] presented the Treasurer's Report as circulated prior to the meeting, with a correction that the dates the report covers are 1st January to 31st December 2023. [REDACTED] thanks the previous Treasurer [REDACTED] for continued assistance and notes that [REDACTED] is still recognised as the Treasurer for the purposes of Gift Aid. Due to the late submission of the accounts last year, no investments can be made with the money previously held in the Shawbrooks savings account.

III. BUSINESS

Approval of accounts

The accounts have been approved by independent examiner [REDACTED]. One clarification to the Treasurer's Report was suggested by [REDACTED], to remove the subscripts that £10,000 is in a savings account, as it could be misinterpreted that there is still a savings account. With this amendment the accounts presented in the Treasurer's Report were proposed for acceptance by [REDACTED] and seconded by [REDACTED]. The accounts were approved by a majority vote.

Setting of subscription amounts 2024-2025

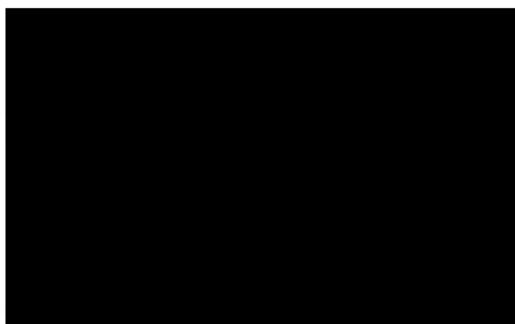
There will be no increase in subscription fee in the year 2024-2025, but there will be an increase in 2025-2026. [REDACTED] proposed that those present at the AGM give the Committee the authority to set the subscription fee rates for 2025-2026, and this was seconded by [REDACTED].

Nomination of Independent Examiner

██████████ has served as our independent examiner for the last two years. ██████████ proposes that ██████████ continue to be the Independent Examiner, seconded by ██████████. This was approved by a majority vote.

Election of committee members

The following members of the 2023-2024 committee all agreed to stand for re-election:



██████████ proposed that the above be put to a vote as a group. This passed by a majority vote and the above were duly elected.

IV. CONCLUSION

Any other competent business

██████████ noted that TRG will be hosting the annual Scottish Ringers Conference in 2024, and made a plea to members to donate prizes for the raffle.

██████████ will be stepping down from the role of Ring Administrator (though remaining on the committee as an elected member). The role of Ring Administrator will temporarily pass to ██████████ and ██████████ pending a decision by the Committee. ██████████ will alert members to this change in an email update.

██████████ made a point about the annual cost of rings and about members who are in arrears. ██████████ and ██████████ assured her that they are chasing membership payments and have made good progress so far, with only 5 full members yet to pay their 2023-2024 subscription.

██████████ asked about the possibility of the group investigating satellite tagging of Ring Ouzel, and the Committee agree to discuss this with ██████████ at a later date.

Derek Robertson proposed a vote of thanks to the Committee for organising the AGM.

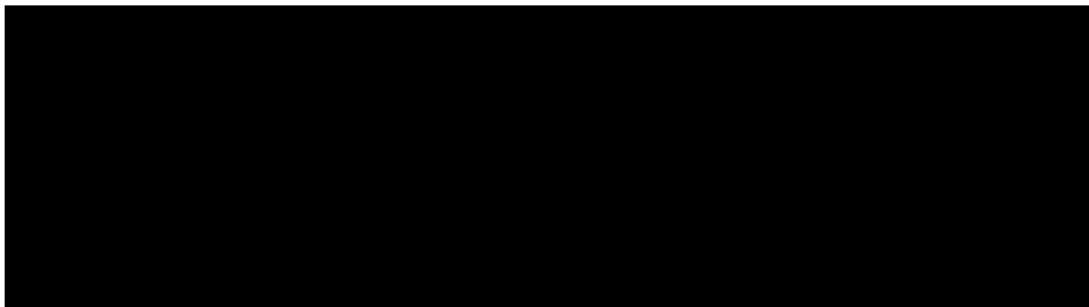

- Table 1 shows the breakdown in membership by grade and permit type. It represents membership counts only, not payments received as part of subscriptions and therefore may differ from the Treasurer's Report. Differences in the figures produced here and in the accounts will be due to late or outstanding membership fee payments, or recently joined members.
- Overall membership has increased from that reported in the last Secretary's Report (2023-2024), from 111 members to 120 members as of the end of February 2024. This is due to a net increase in the number of new full and student members joining the group.
- The relative proportion of members holding each permit type has not changed substantially from last financial year, with the largest part of the group holding C permits (36%). There has been a slight increase in the number of T permit holders to 29%, and a decrease in the number of members holding no permit at all.

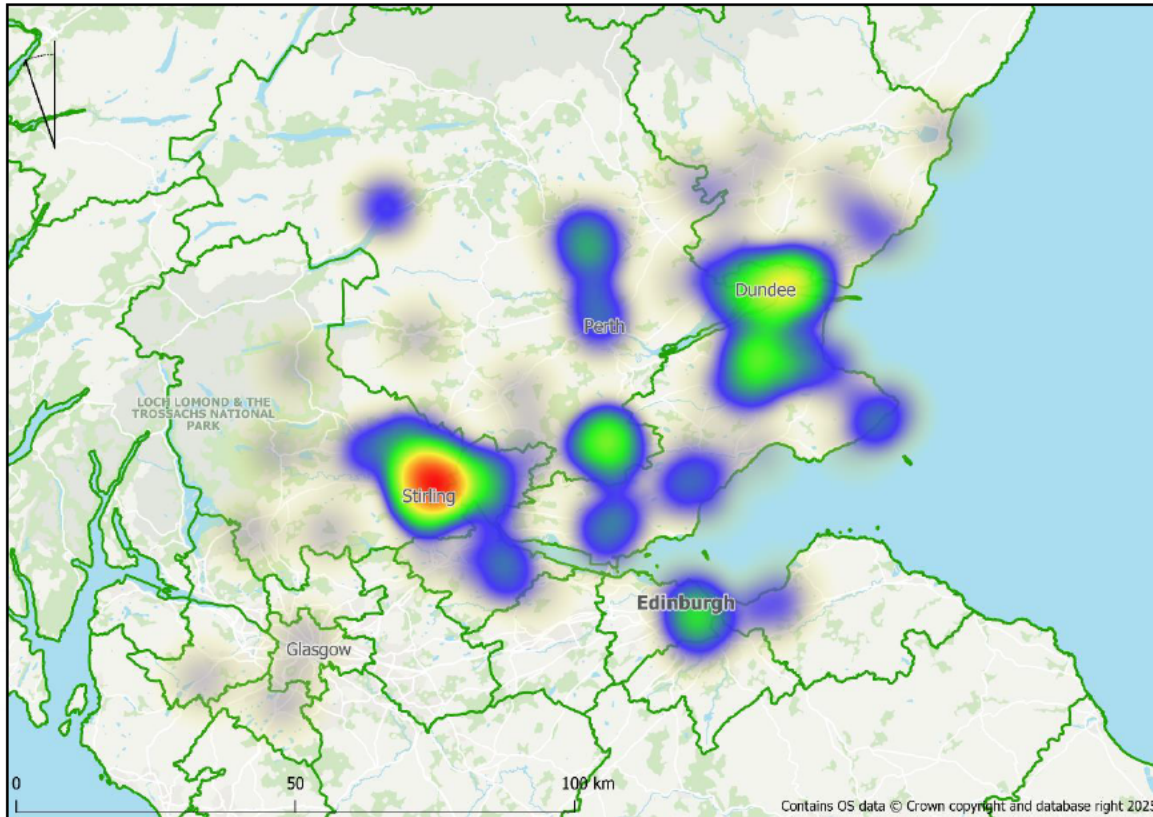


Figure 1: Map of distribution of members of Tay RG in 2023-2024.

- Figure 1 shows the distribution of ringers within the group in central Scotland, based on addresses provided at joining. It does not show the locations of ringing sites throughout the group's area of operations. Red indicates the highest concentration of members, whereas blue indicates low concentrations of members.

- Ringling Training Weekend** – Held on the 26th to 28th of July 2024 at various sites including the Tay Reedbeds and Dundee. Several members had permit upgrades as a result of

attendance and there were plenty of trainees present, including from other ringing groups in Scotland.

- **Scottish Ringers Conference** – Held on 8th to 10th November 2024 at the Carrbridge Hotel.
- **Group projects** – Examples of projects ongoing within the Group in 2024-2025 include: MOTUS Rock Pipit tracking; migrant passerine GLS tracking; Dipper ringing training; colour-ringing of various species; RAS and CES; seabird ringing at Inchcolm. Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Tay Ringing Group

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2024 which are set out on pages 1 to 3.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the 2006 Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the 2006 Accounts Regulations. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

Independent examiner's statement

In the course of my examination, no matter has come to my attention

1. which gives me reasonable cause to believe that in any material respect the requirements:

- to keep accounting records in accordance with Section 44(1) (a) of the 2005 Act and Regulation 4 of the 2006 Accounts Regulations
- to prepare accounts which accord with the accounting records and comply with Regulation 9 of the 2006 Accounts Regulations

have not been met, or

2. to which, in my opinion, attention should be drawn in order to enable a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached.
