On 3rd Oct 2012, the former Whalsay History Group – an unincorporated association – changed its legal form to the Incorporated Organisation Whalsay Heritage and Community Centre SCIO.

The Trust was set up and recognised as a Scottish charity with effect from 03 October 2012. The Trust is administered in accordance with the terms of the Trust Deed.

Trustee recruitment and appointment

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the financial period

Annual Objectives

- (i) Delivered a full seasonal display (May–October 2025) on *Whalsay fishermen's jerseys* through the ages, featuring both dress and working garments.
- (ii) Retained and supported the display of *hosiery by Valda Grieve*, wife of poet Hugh MacDiarmid, in conjunction with the *Outwith* exhibition at Lerwick Museum.
- (iii) Developed a new historical display on the *Whalsay Bruce family*, including a timeline, contextual history, and archival photographs.
- (iv) Updated the semi-permanent *Fishing* display with additional interpretation and photographs.

Output

- Two new displays completed, plus an updated Fishing display.
- Accompanying interpretive leaflets produced for visitors.
- All installation and preparation hours contributed by Heritage Centre volunteers.
- Visitors and school groups welcomed throughout the open season.

Outcomes

- Increased public awareness of Whalsay's cultural and maritime heritage, including integration with local school learning.
- Visitors gained new insight into the working lives of island fishermen through the study of traditional dress.
- Enhanced understanding of Whalsay's social history through the Bruce family timeline and historic photographs dating from the late 19th century.

Its Impact

- Strengthened local tourism and contributed to the preservation of cultural heritage.
- Supported intergenerational knowledge transfer between older residents and younger audiences.
- Reinforced the role of the Heritage Centre as a key community institution and highlighted the historical significance of the Bruce Laids in Whalsay's development

Achievements

- A total of 844 visitors attended during the open period, representing a steady increase across the season and including many from overseas.
- Received consistently positive feedback from visitors, schools, and local media.

Financial review

Brief statement of the charity's policy on reserves

On 01 April 2025, the restricted phase2 account opening balance was **£51,244.08**. This fund was used during 2025 for repairs to Units 6 and 7 along the East Range, which began on 28 March 2023. During the financial year 01/04/2025 to 31/3/2026 a total of **£15,000.00** was transferred from the Treasurers account to the Phase2 account. Total Income Phase2 account **£88.00**. Granite and window repairs total spend was **£8343.50**. Closing Balance 31/3/2026 was **£57,988.58**. This year's profit on Unrestricted Treasurers account was **£21,395.26**. This year's revenue spending was **£9285.34** and had a closing balance **of £ 27,125.44** on **31 March 2026**. The Trustees consider this amount to be appropriate to allow them to respond to revenue spending, should there be a shortfall in any generated income.

An expected total capital spend of upwards of **£50K** will be required, of which **£8343.50** for window and structural repairs to granite was spent this year, on units 6 & 7 along the East Range. The **Restricted Fund** plus balance from **Unrestricted** will be used for funding future repairs to Units 6 & 7. Future internal refurbishment to Units 6 & 7 during next financial year will take place.

On the 16th of November 2025 the AGM was held, and existing office bearers were re-appointed for another year by agreement of the twelve members present.

In 2013 Whalsay Heritage and Community Centre scio was awarded a three-star rating from Historic Environment Scotland after inspection of the premises. Historic Environment Scotland signage has now been put in place from ferry terminal to premises for tourist guidance when visiting.

The Whalsay Heritage and Community Centre scio is open four days per week – in normal times - during the summer season May to October. It is voluntarily staffed by WHACC members during these periods. It is also open during times when visiting yachts and unannounced bus tours arrive at the island. Visitors are issued with a visitor's guide to Whalsay and the visitor book in the premises always reflects views which continually shows a positive response.

The Whalsay Heritage and Community Centre scio continues to be a tourist information point where information about Whalsay including local attractions and walks and information leaflets from every part of Shetland is available in the form of handouts from other tourist organisations.

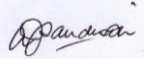

Phase 2 Account - The Phase2 Group was set up as a sub-group of the then Whalsay History Group in 2009. The main purpose being in the first instance to raise funds for a feasibility study to look at the possibility of restoring more of the B listed buildings around the area adjacent to the then History Group premises (now Whalsay Heritage & Community Centre SCIO premises). These buildings were B Listed in 1971.

Being part of the Symbister Junior High School, the Midden Court area and its environs has great potential as a building suited to community use and the Phase2 Group continues to explore ways of taking this forward.

This year £15K was transferred from the general fund to the Phase 2 Account for repairs to Units 6 & 7. This year has seen restoration of granite around door and windows of Unit 7.

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the financial period

Annual Objectives

- (i) For the season May to October 2024, it was decided to take up the offer of a previous display which looked at the production of woven cloth as a means of paying rent around the time of 16th century. This display looked closely at the final part of the cloth production which involved a period of suspension in seawater to soften the cloth. Part of the display was cloth which had been produced as an experiment to see if the process could be replicated by suspending in seawater.
A full display featuring this whole process called Toevacoddy will be put in place.
- (ii) A concurrent display featuring the hosiery of Valda Grieve, wife of poet Hugh MacDiarmid who spent 8 years in Whalsay in the 1930's.
- (iii) The semi-permanent fishing display to be updated with additional information and photographs.

Output

Two new displays and the updated Fishing display with additional accompanying leaflets. All set up hours contributed by Heritage Centre volunteers. Visitors and school groups hosted during open period.

Outcomes

Increased public awareness of local heritage with school incorporation. Visitors gained new knowledge of historical aspects of Whalsay.

Its Impact

Contribution to local tourism and preservation of cultural heritage. Intergenerational knowledge transfer from old to young. Positioning the Heritage Centre as a local institution and strengthening Whalsay's cultural identity.

Achievements

A flow of visitors, totalling 674, was maintained throughout the opening period with many coming from faraway places. There was much positive feedback from, visitors, schools and local media.

Financial review

Brief statement of the charity's policy on reserves

On **31 March 2025**, the restricted phase2 account closing balance was **£51,244.08**. This fund was used during 2024 for repairs to Units 6 and 7 along the East Range, which began on 28 March 2023. During the financial year 01/04/2024 to 31/3/2025 a total of **£20,212.84** was transferred from the Treasurers account to the Phase2 account. Total Income Phase2 account **£216.49**. Roof repair spending **£6,670.50**.

This year's profit on Unrestricted Treasurers account was **£14,258.07**. This year's revenue spending was **£35,096.65** and had a closing balance of **£ 20,730.18** on **31 March 2025**. The Trustees consider this amount to be appropriate to allow them to respond to revenue spending, should there be a shortfall in any generated income.

An expected total capital spend of upwards of **£50K** will be required, of which **£6,670.50** for roof and structural repairs was spent this year, on units 6 & 7 along the East Range. The balance will be covered with donations granted from Symbister Estate. The **Restricted Fund** plus balance from **Unrestricted** will be used for funding the repairs to Units 6 & 7.

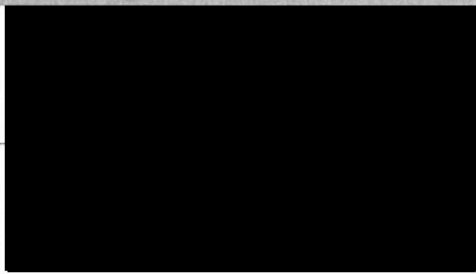
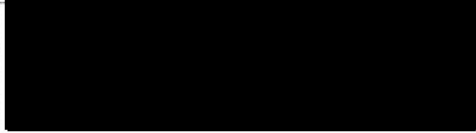

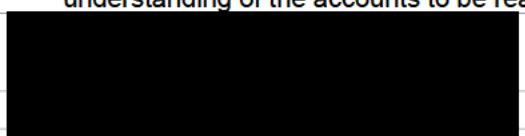

Nature and purpose of funds

During this period 2024/25, £20,000 for roof repairs, plus £212.84 for Glassware sales was transferred into Phase 2 Account from from Unrestricted Treasurers General account.
