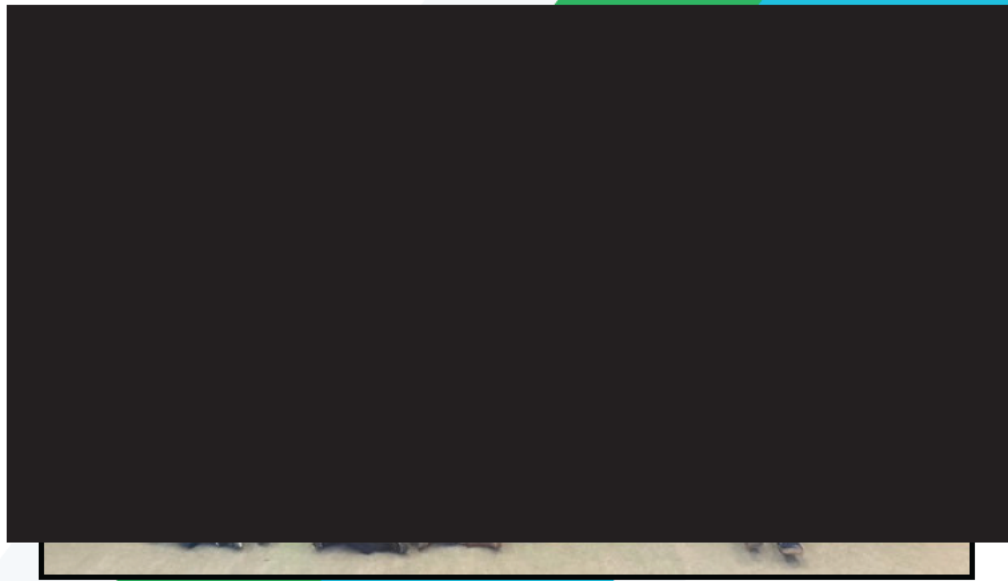

Tonight is all about celebrating the successes of our young people over the past year.

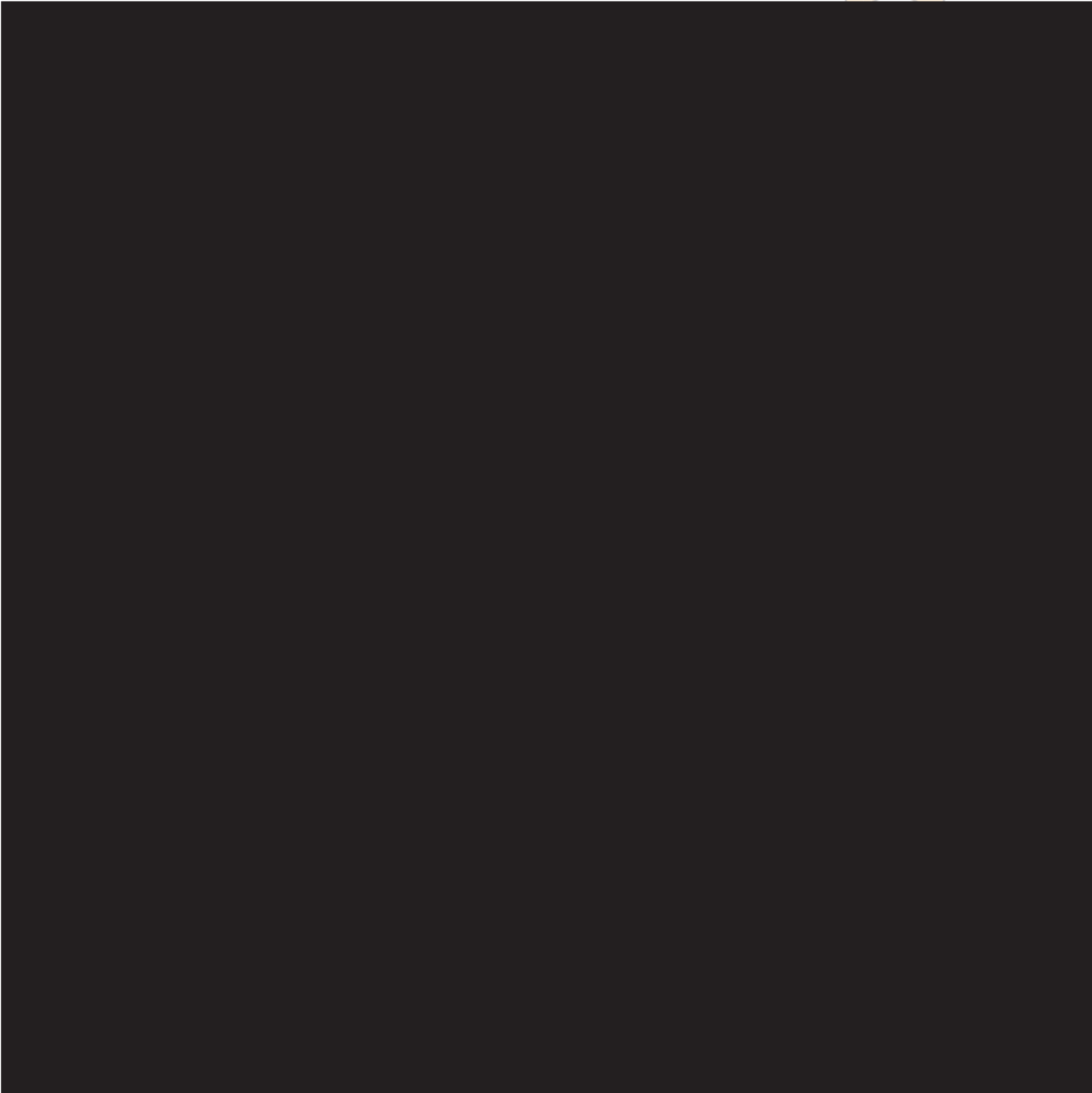

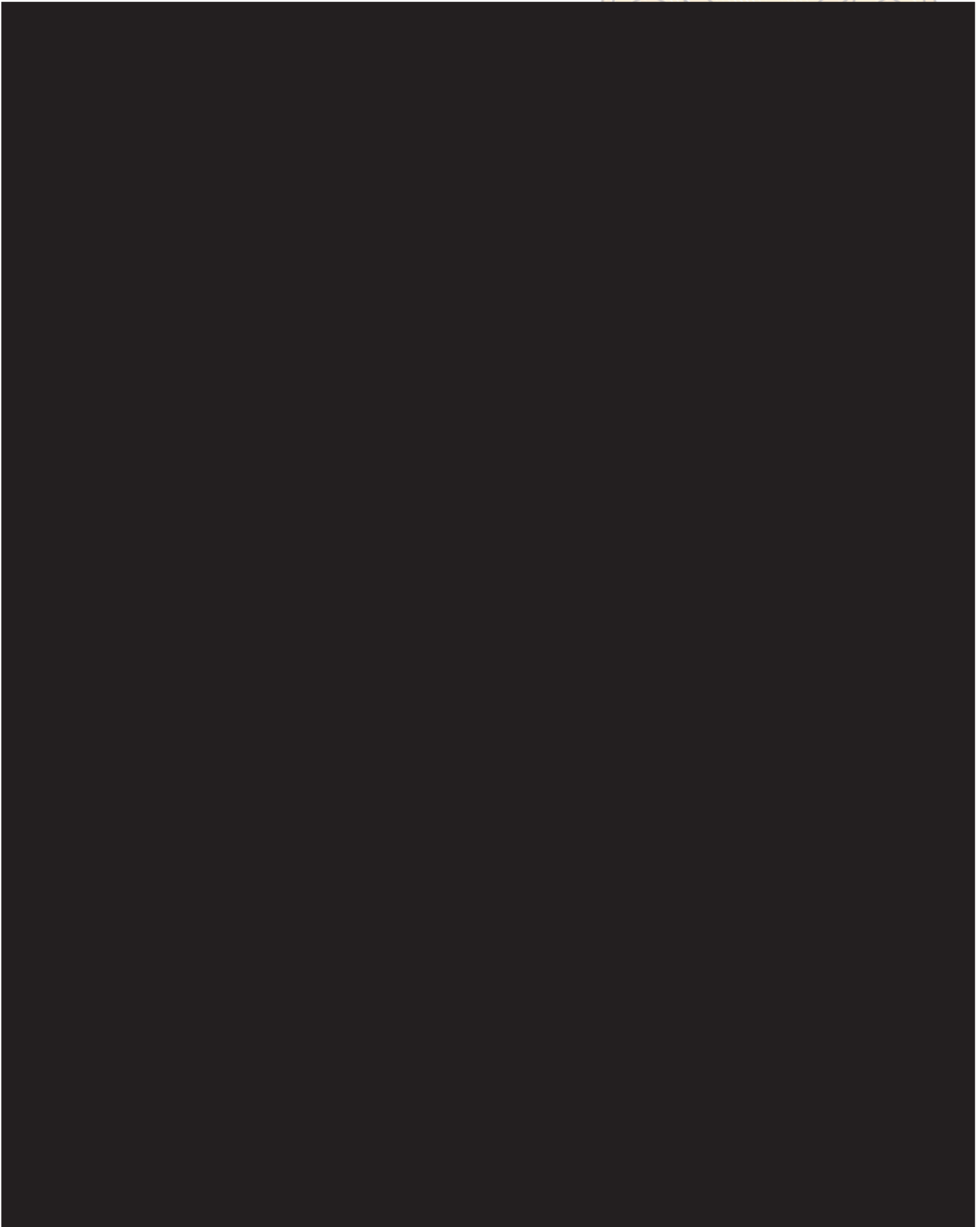
We look forward to more camps planned for all sections over the summer months.

Carnoustie Scout Group Report

2024/25 has been another extremely busy and active year for Carnoustie Scout Group with all our sections offering high quality and varied activities, skills, challenges, events and of course residential experiences. It is great to see such a diverse range of activities provided by our innovative leadership teams.

It is with great pride that I see the great number of chief scout challenges being presented at our awards ceremony this year as a result of the determination and hard work by both our young people and the leadership team.

Our numbers this year have decreased to around 140 young people and this is noticeable with vacancies in both Squirrels and Beavers.

The Scout Group currently comprises the Squirrel Colonies running over 3 evenings on a Monday, Wednesday and Thursday which includes our satellite at the Boyack Centre, 2 Beaver Colonies meeting on a Monday and Tuesday, 2 Cub Packs meeting on a Tuesday and Thursday evenings, 2 Scout Troops on a Thursday and Friday and our Explorer Unit on a Friday. As we are able to offer a wider range of outdoor activities especially camping.

My highlights from the past year has been the Ireland Adventure 24 to the beautiful setting of Crawfordsburn in County Down. We had 36 members of the group attend LanzaJam 25 in Lanzarote. We had Cubs, Scouts and Explorers in the Dundee Gang Show. Our Squirrels and Beavers did well in the Arbroath Music Festivals.

All sections have been offered a selection of camps over the past year and it is great to see so many of the Zodiac Awards presented this evening. All of this is only possible thanks to our team of dedicated and committed volunteer leaders, section assistants and helpers. Thanks go to our volunteer leaders who have stood down over the year – namely [REDACTED] from Beavers and Stewart Bisgrove from Explorers. Their commitment and time over the years is appreciated by all.

We currently have the following leadership team – Squirrel Team - 10, Beaver Team - 3, Cub Team - 4, Scout Team – 7 and Explorer Team 2 plus a further 17 section assistants. We continue to have great support from parents willing to help out on occasion. As always, we are continually on the lookout for anyone able and willing to help in whatever way particularly as part of the leadership team. It's great to see so many leaders receiving their long service awards this year.

Thanks also goes to our group Chair [REDACTED] who has continued to oversee the Trustee Board and is standing down this year. Special thanks goes to our treasure [REDACTED] Thanks also to [REDACTED] our very efficient group secretary who will also be standing down this year. Thanks to [REDACTED] for coordinating the hall bookings. Thanks also go to our well organised Scout Pos [REDACTED] who successfully achieved a huge increase in fundraising income this year and trialled other forms of income raising.



We continue to have a strong relationship with Monifieth Scout Group and this has continued both in the in our outdoor meetings with mutual use of leader's talents. I am also Group Lead Volunteer for the Monifieth Scout Group at present so this ensure close working between the two groups. We have a full line programme lined up for the forthcoming summer.

Speaking to the youth it is clear that they simply look forward to the residential experiences whether in the scout hall or at a camp site. 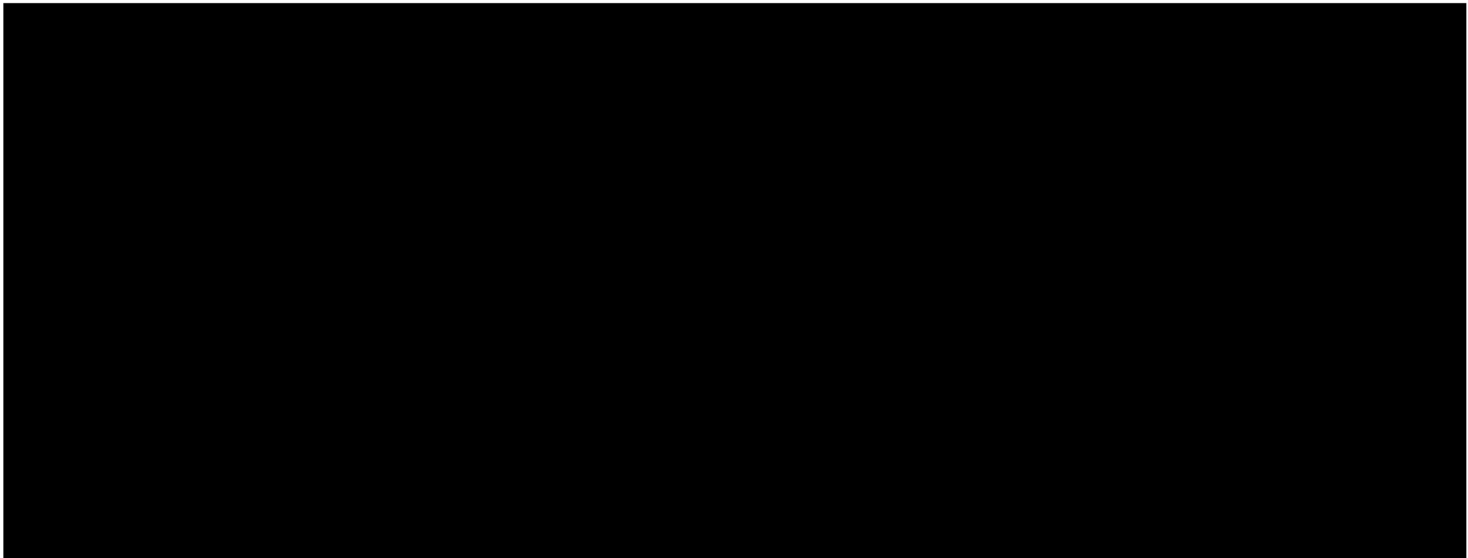

My Experience at Blair Atholl - by Evelyn Bisgrove

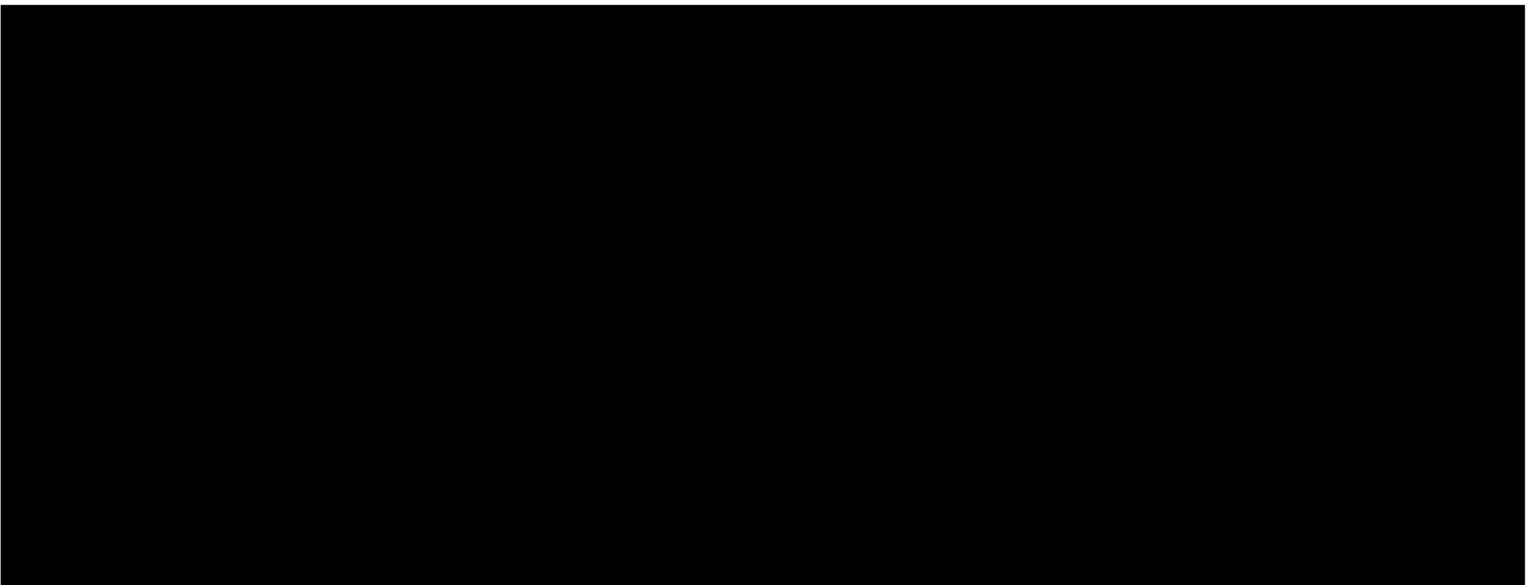

My favourite part of Blair Atholl was meeting new people from different cultures. Some came with communication issues, some were completely different cultures, but all sharing the love for adventure and scouting.



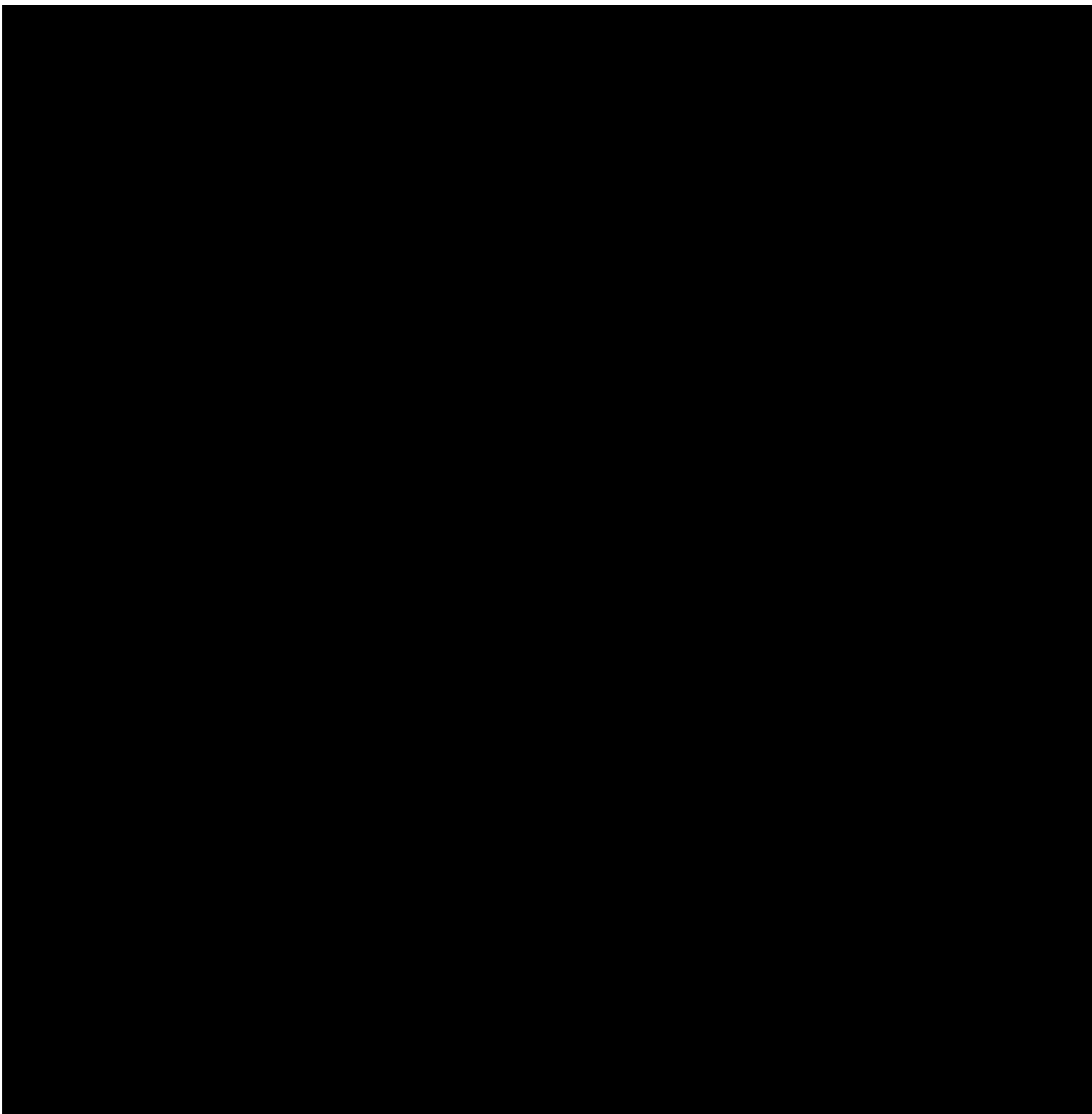
Those who know me may know me to be quiet or shy, however one thing I learned about myself is that I can be outgoing, and confident, and that has since brought me a new self image.

Like the rest of the Scout Group the Beaver Colonies have had a successful year taking part in lots of outdoor activities as well as meetings in the hall. We have managed to remain outdoors as much as possible and completed a wide variety of challenges, learned lots of new skills and taken part in fun adventurous activities.

Our numbers have decreased this year to the lowest level for a long time with many of the older ones moving on to Cubs. We have 15 beavers on a Monday and 12 on a Tuesday. The cubs enjoy working as part of their sixes to earn points throughout the term for their six, where they were able to choose the theme and name of their six.




Thursday Cubs Annual Report

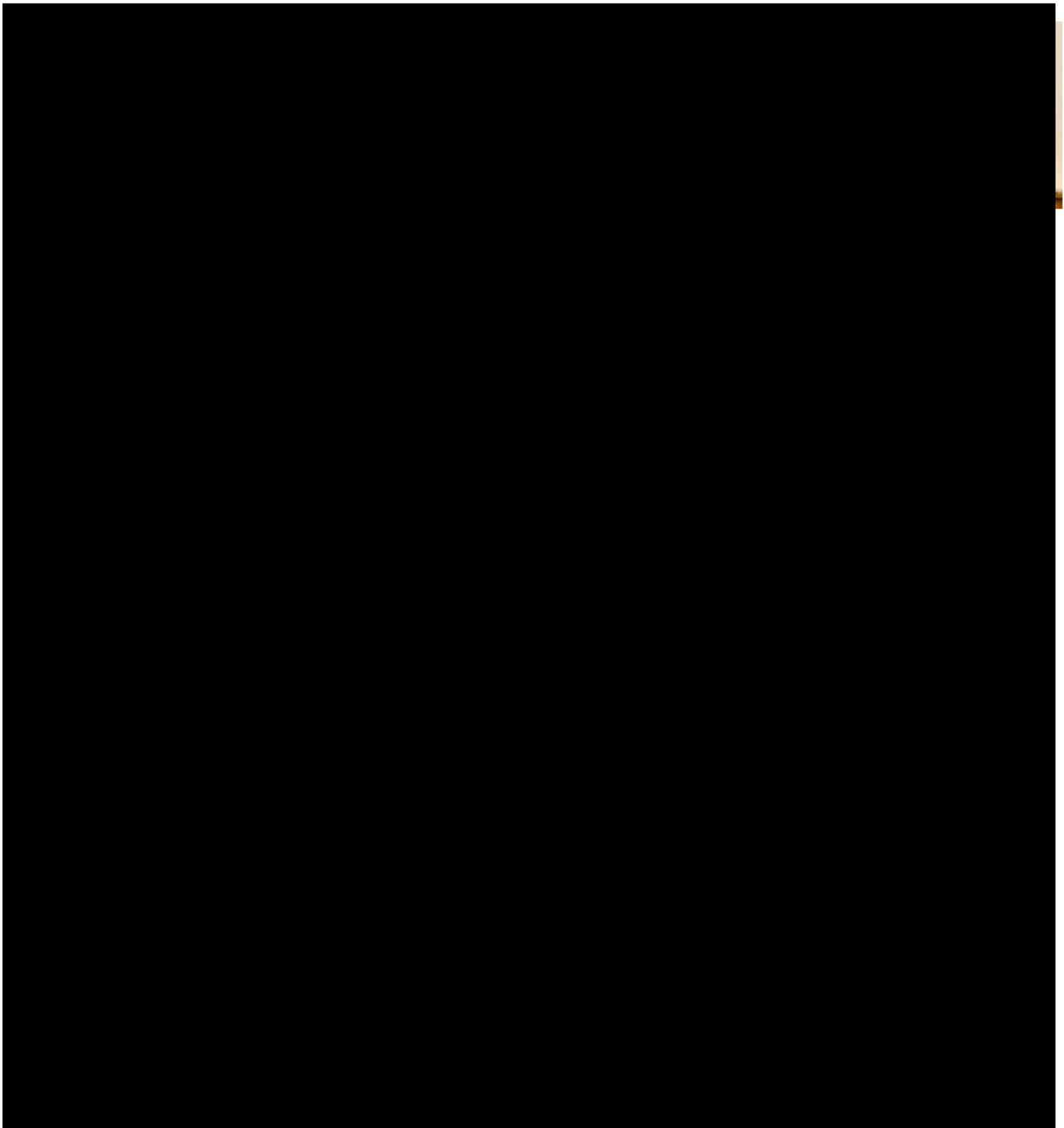

Throughout the year, both troops have been working on similar badges and activities, with most sessions run separately on their respective nights, and a few joint events along the way.

We are especially proud to share that four Scouts from the Friday Troop and three Scouts from the Thursday troop have achieved the Chief Scout Gold Award. This marks the culmination of four years of consistent effort and commitment and is listed among the activities below.

Badge Work	Badge Design	Description of Badge Work
Air Activities 1 and 2		<p>Staged Activity Badge. Stage1 and 2 completed.</p> <p>Badge involved making a paper airplane and testing this for flight. Scouts had to research different types of planes and explain this to the rest of the troop. They learned the phonetic alphabet and spelt their names. They also learned to identify six airlines from their markings and had to identify different parts of a plane. Scouts learned about how different weather affected air activities. Scouts had to build a model of a Spitfire (Airfix model) and paint it. A visit to Dundee Airport has been arranged to finish this badge off.</p>
Thistle Award		<p>Scouts Thistle Award Badge. Scouts Completed this award 27/09/24.</p> <p>The Thistle Awards provide a focus on Scotland's people, and culture — whilst being fun and challenging for young people. Scouts have to complete 10 tasks for this badge. This is hoped to be completed later this year, and some of the activities already completed involved holding a Burns night evening in the hall, holding a Highland Games night at the House Grounds, taking part in Jott (an organised walk through Angus), learning about Charles McIntosh (and making an inspired card by paper folding and leaving a happy message inside for someone).</p>
Chef		<p>Activity Badge.</p> <p>This award involved the Scouts planning and producing a tasty menu for the Scout troop after they come back after a long day of activities. This like where to shop, dietary needs and hygiene in preparing meal and clearing up afterwards.</p>

Personal Challenge		Chief Scout Challenge Badge. This award is personal to the scouts so we have had scouts running games, tidying their rooms, learning sign language and doing the couch to 5K to name a few.	
Skills Challenge		Chief Scout Challenge Badge. This involved the scouts taking part in learning new skills such as sewing on a badge as well as improving on skills they currently had such as timed team games and helping out at home.	
Expedition Challenge		Chief Scout Challenge Badge. In March the older scouts went on an expedition from Carnoustie Scout Hall to Arbroath Scout Hall that they planned by themselves. They had to work to budget and plan the menu, kit list, route/timings, risk assessment and activities for a one night camp.	
Chief Scout Award		Chief Scout Challenge Badge. (Gold) This is the highest award in the scout section and Scouts must complete the following 9 Challenge Awards. <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. World Challenge 2. Skills Challenge 3. Creative Challenge 4. Outdoors Challenge 5. Adventure Challenge 6. Expedition Challenge 7. Teamwork Challenge 8. Team Leader Challenge 9. Personal Challenge Award. 	

ACTIVITIES

It's been another busy and exciting year, with lots going on since last May's AGM!

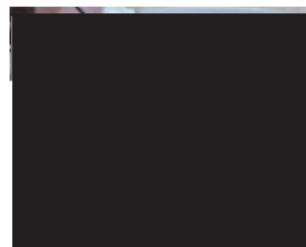
Both Scout troops kicked things off with some creative beach art, using whatever materials they could find lying around on the shore. Craven also hosted a magic night for a smaller group of Scouts while the others were away at the family camp — a fun and memorable evening for those who stayed behind.

From August through April, Scouts worked steadily on their Air Activities Badge (Stages 1 and 2). This took several evenings to complete but was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone involved. Later in the year, they spent more time working toward various Challenge Badges, all counting towards the prestigious Chief Scout Gold Award.

One standout evening was a pool night in Arbroath (not the swimming kind!), where Scouts had a great time playing pool and darts. They also had a fun joint evening with the Squirrels, where they showed leadership by running campfire songs — sausages and all! It's safe to say the Squirrels loved every minute (This also contributed to the Chief Scout Gold Award by fulfilling both the Teamwork and Team Leader Challenge requirements.).

Scouts also took part in our first Masked Singer event — loads of fun, even if some of the singing was... let's just say "memorable"! More recently, they began working on the Athletics Badge, with a beach session including shot put (using a cricket ball), long jump, and a patrol relay race. All results were timed and measured, with plans to repeat the activities later in the year to track progress. Upcoming events include the discus (using a Frisbee), 100m sprint, and a blindfold-assisted race — six main events in total, plus three additional categories needed to earn the badge.

Another highlight was our Dragon's Den evening last term. Scouts came up with invention ideas, presented this to the troop and the winning proposal idea (a woggle with a built-in compass and whistle) was sent to Portsmouth Scouts on another evening when the Scouts wrote postcards to send to this Group. Portsmouth Scouts turned it into a real product using 3D printing in various colours! They returned the woggles along with postcards and neckies from their Group to Carnoustie, inspiring our Scouts to create and edit their own video as our response.

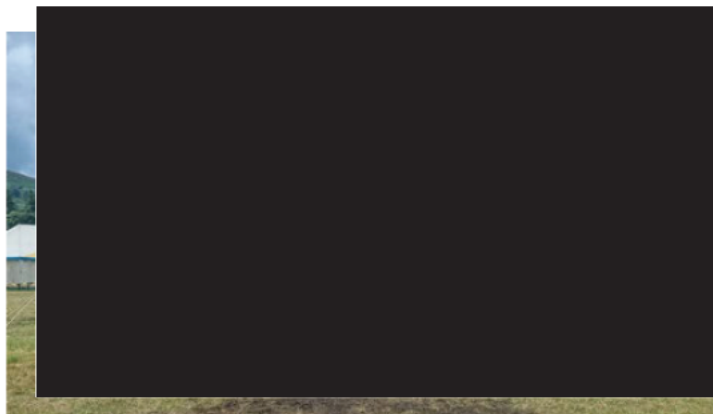


Most recently, Scouts have been working on building bee hotels, a project scheduled to wrap up just before this year's AGM.

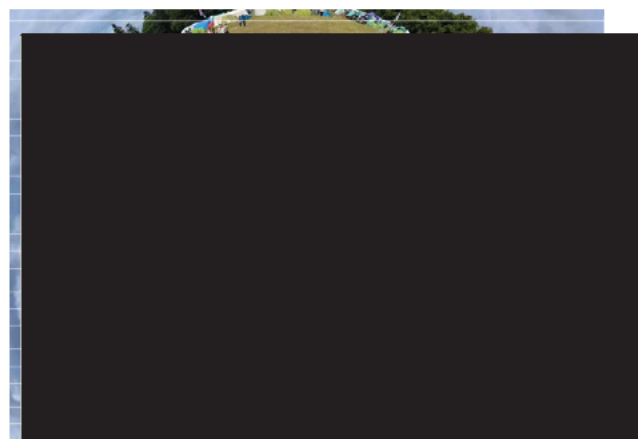

We took part in JOTT with a hike from the Law in Dundee to Monifieth, Barrwood Summer Camp, kayaking at Willowgate, Cally Rally in Inverness, Carnoustie Panto and skiing and winter activities at Sub Zero National Camp at Auchengillan.

Most of our explorers are also young leaders supporting all other sections at the Group. 8 of our explorers attended the Blair Atholl Jamborette in the summer. [REDACTED]

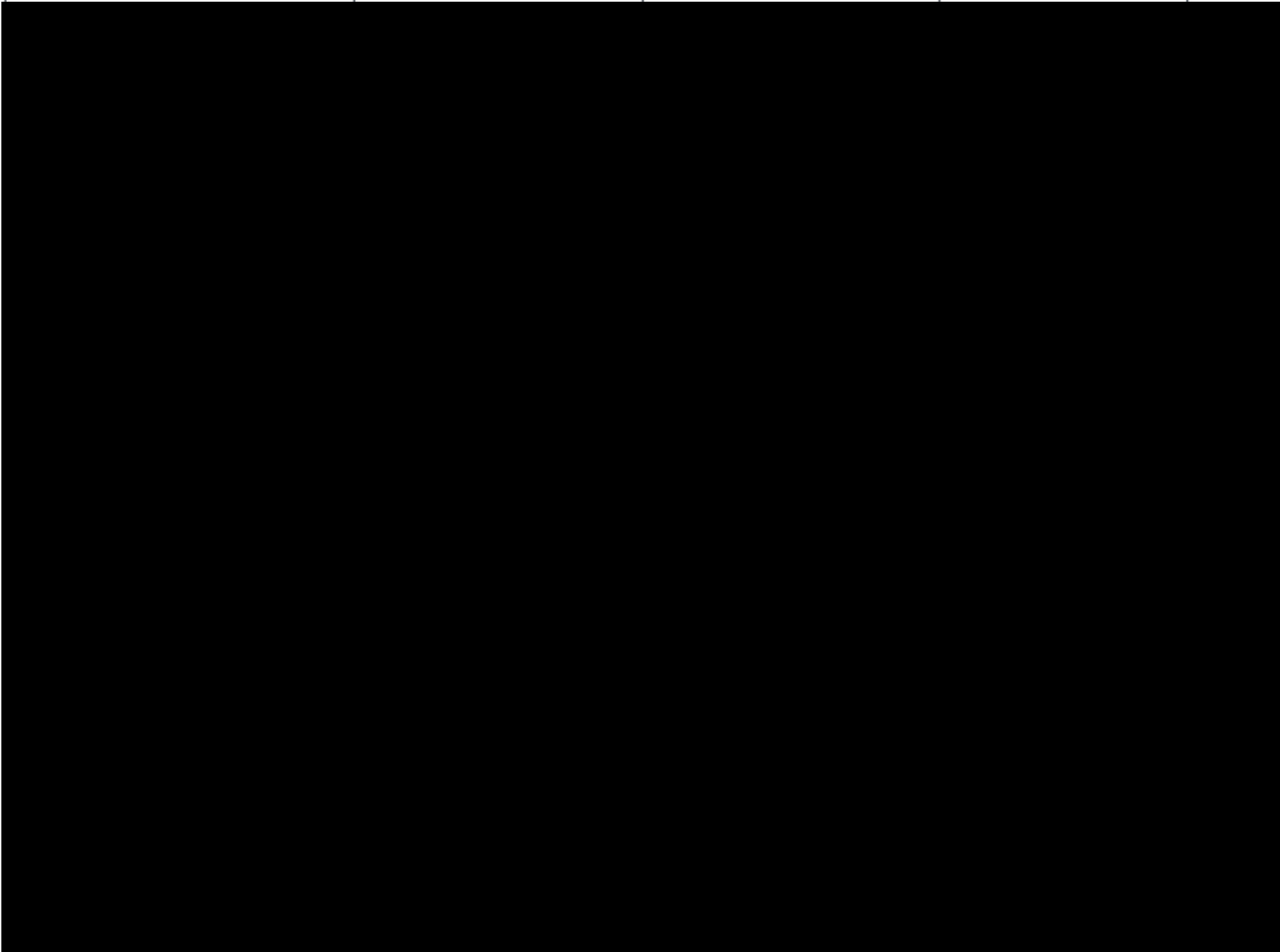

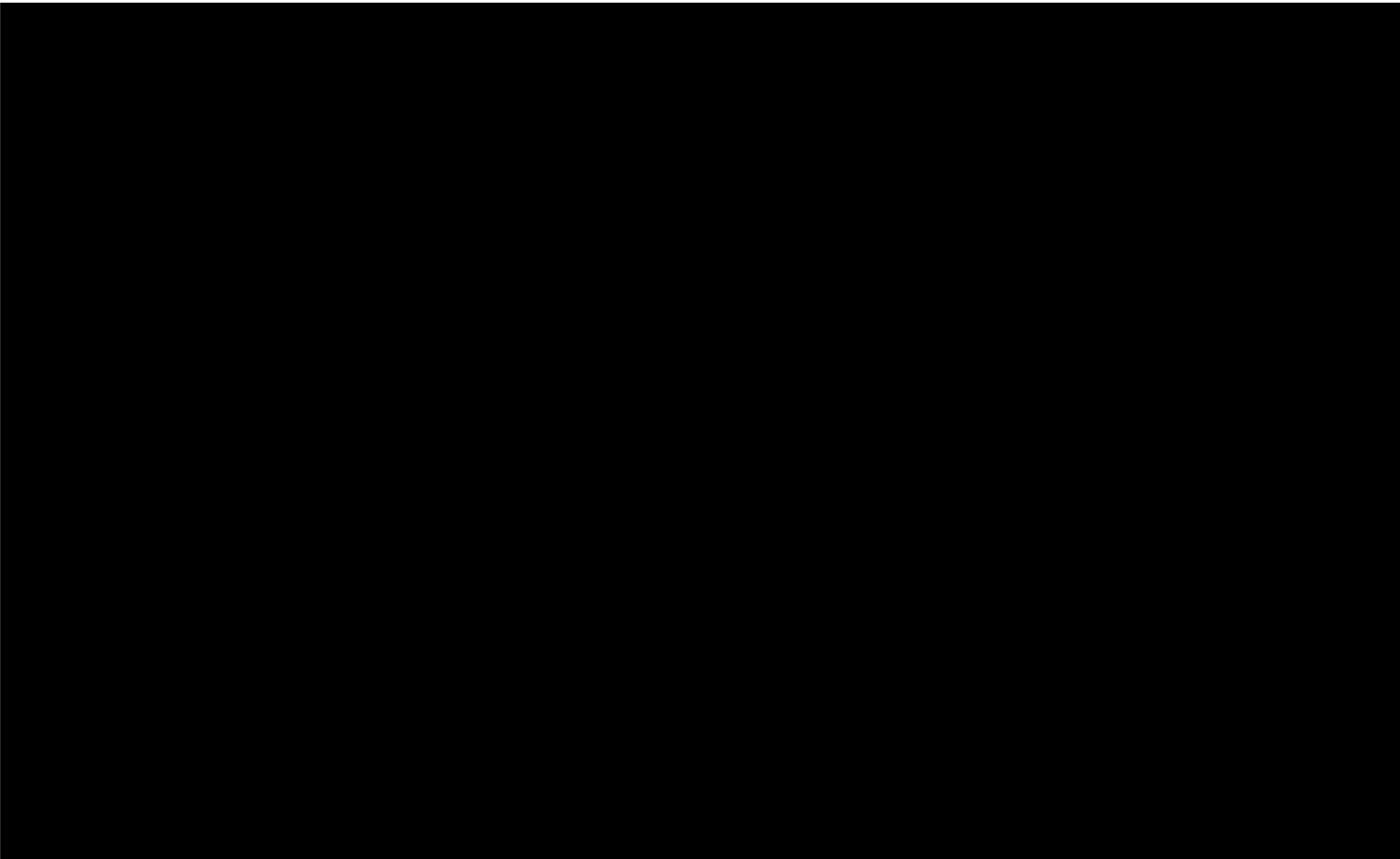

The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.


