Constitution To comply with new guidance from the Scout Association the group adopted an updated constitution and a new governance structure at the 2024 AGM.

Trustee recruitment and appointment

From 2015 to 2024 the full Scout Group Committee were the charity trustees. In August 2024 to comply with Scout Association POR and the new constitution a new Trustee Board was appointed to oversee governance. Following the changes two former trustees are part of the new Group Scout Council.

The role of the trustees is to ensure that the charity

- is well managed and has sufficient resources (funds, people, property and equipment) for the delivery of a high quality programme
- complies with the charity's governing document and the law
- manages its finances and resources responsibly and has appropriate budgets in place
- has effective administration in place to support the work of the Trustee Board
- has an appropriate risk register and safeguarding procedures in place

Trustees are initially appointed for a three-year term of office after which they can be reappointed by the Group Scout Council but will serve no more than nine years before taking a break of three years. Trustee Boards need to have a minimum of five and a maximum of twelve members. The aim to have at least one trustee under the age of twenty five.

Day to day management of the Group is now undertaken by a committee appointed by the Group Scout Council.

Charitable purposes and main activities

The purpose of the Scout Association is to promote the development of young people in achieving their full physical, social and spiritual potential

Achievements and Activities in the 202/25 academic year.

Prudent budgeting and a grant from Foundation Scotland to offset joining costs has enabled the Group to avoid increasing subscriptions for a further year at a time of financial pressure for many families. The numbers of young people engaging in Scouting activities has continued to increase.

This year the Group has been able to utilise the land at Uillean, which was purchased in 2023, for outdoor activities. Volunteers have helped to clear the land and carry out basic repairs to the building on site to make it watertight. The change of use planning application has been approved enabling the building to be used for storage. Following several successful grant applications and generous donations from supporters plans are being developed for the installation of composting toilets. To enable camping on site this year welfare facilities have been hired from a local provider. The land has been well used and enjoyed by all the sections from Squirrels to Explorers

The 19th Argyll has been busy this year and we are very grateful to all the volunteers who have made the following activities possible –

- Squirrels – the young people had input into the programme themselves and chose science and navigation themes as a focus but they also grew plants, participated in a litter pick and worked at Ardrishaig Community Garden. In June they had an adventure day at Uillean and worked on navigation skills and shelter building. The term ended with a beach barbecue at which a further 4 Chief Scout acorn awards were presented
- Beavers –a joint camp with the cubs at Ormsary saw 24 young people involved with 20 staying overnight. The camp had a CSI theme with a cuddly toy being kidnapped leaving the section to track down the culprits.
- Cubs – the joint camp had a traditional campfire, singing and even some sleep as some members spent their first night away from home. In May members of the cubs and beavers took part in the John Logan and Louise Holmes Fun Day in Inveraray. Over 100 young people participated with 20 staying over. Like most sections summer evenings were spent outdoors with community work involving litter picks and building bug hotels.
- Scouts – In February the Scouts had their first sub zero camp at Uillean . A sleepover at the Glasgow Science Centre was a highlight in March followed by the annual Snowdrop Challenge with 1st Oban Scouts. In April 17 Scouts attended an Adventure Camp at Strathallan Castle.
- Community activities included a beach clean at Duntrune where significant amounts of marine waste were removed. The activity was much appreciated by the landowner and partner organisations including Heart of Argyll Wildlife and Kilmory Shinty delivered sessions along with the Coastguard. This was an informative session with rescue, drowning and hypothermia discussed. The end of term barbecue saw new leaders invested and two leaders presented with their wood badges.
- Explorers – the highlight for a group of Explorers was the expedition to Galicia, Spain in October 2024 to walk the Camino de Santiago to Compostela. Training had started in March, with route, transport and accommodation planning as well as team building exercises throughout the year.
- In July 6 leaders, 17 Explorers and 4 Scouts joined participants from other Argyll Explorer Units and Groups to attend the Norwegian Jamboree. There were a total of 10,000 participants from countries ranging from Hong Kong, Sweden, Canada as well as 9,000 Norwegian Scouts. This was an exciting opportunity for Argyll participants to meet scouts from around the world and to become good friends with our hosts from the Drammen area of Norway.

Platinum, Silver and Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Awards continue to be presented each year.

Training Both current and newly recruited Leaders continue to participate in a variety of training. Past investment in training enables the Group to offer a wide variety of events and activities.

Policy on reserves An informal reserve of £3000 was originally agreed by the committee on 25 August 2015 and had remained unchanged until 2025. With the purchase of Uilleann it was considered prudent for this to be increased to £5000 to ensure funds were available to cover insurance and any emergency repairs.

Details of any surplus

The surplus generated this financial year reflects the funds held in reserves for developing Uilleann and payments for camps where expenses have not yet been claimed and paid. All these monies together with the £5000 reserve referred to above are ringfenced in a separate interest earning account. All fundraising receipts and grant/donations are held in the reserves account to ensure they are used for development of the Group and not for operating expenses. Operating expenses for the group are all covered from the general account. In 2024 a small bursary fund was established which is used to assist any parents struggling to meet subscriptions, the costs of camps or trips.

Donated facilities and services Over 100 young people benefitted from outdoor activities. These were facilitated by Leaders assisted by parents and committee members.

All leaders, committee members and parents are volunteers.

Constitution The Scout Group constitution was adapted from the Scout Association POR constitution and approved by the Scout Group Committee on 25 August 2015. To comply with new guidance from the Scout Association the group will adopt an updated constitution and a new governance structure at the 2024 AGM.

Trustee recruitment and appointment

Since 25 August 2015 the full Scout Group Committee have been the charity trustees. This will change in August 2024 to comply with Scout Association POR and a new Trustee Board will be appointed to oversee governance. The day to day management of the Group will be undertaken by a committee appointed by the Group Scout Council

Charitable purposes and main activities

The purpose of the Scout Association is to promote the development of young people in achieving their full physical, social and spiritual potential

Achievements and Activities in the 2023/24 academic year.

Prudent budgeting and generous donations from parents during the Covid pandemic had enabled the Group to avoid increasing subscriptions for a number of years at a time of financial pressure for many families so the numbers of young people engaging in Scouting activities continued to increase. A small increase in subscriptions in 2023 enabled the group to end the year in a strong financial position. Numbers of members in the Group continue to grow.

One of the highlights of the year was the completion of the purchase of the land at Uillean. Work has already begun on clearing the land and a change of use planning application has been submitted to enable an old building on the site to be used for storage. The next milestone will be the installation of composting toilets so camping can go ahead on the site without the additional cost of hiring in welfare facilities. A generous donation from a supporter has been received and other grant applications are being submitted.

Each of the sections had another exciting year and we are very grateful to all the volunteers who made this possible –

- Squirrels – The new Squirrels section, now in its second year, had 15-16 members who earned a total of 228 badges. 5 Squirrels earned their Acorn Chief Scout's Award. Lots of craft activities included making paper planes and helicopters and building dens. Visits were made to the beach and to Kilmartin Museum. A St Andrew's Night celebration was held. The Group went shopping and then made pizzas and pancakes.
- Beavers – 18 Beavers were very active during the year with more girls than boys for the first time ever. 211 badges were awarded including 6 Bronze Chief Scout Awards and 4 Scottish Beaver Thistle Awards. There was an exciting sleepover at the Glasgow Science Centre, a camp at Ormsary and a visit to Gigha. Photography, tent pitching and using power tools to build bug houses were included in a wide range of activities.
- Cubs – The Cubs currently have 20 members and although 15 members moved up to Scouts during the year numbers for the coming year are expected to remain around 20-25. 10 Cubs joined the Glasgow Science Centre Sleepover. An under canvas camp in Inveraray provided many Cubs with their first experience of sleeping in a tent. All attendees earned at least one badge. 8 Chief Scout Awards were added to a total of 218 badges over the past year. This included teamwork, hikes, first aid, backwoods cooking and local knowledge.

- **Scouts** – An average of 30 Scouts attended each week and a full range of activities meant that 310 badges were awarded including 10 Gold Chief Scout Awards. Scouts were offered 8 different residential experiences which were all well attended. Camps included the National Scout Adventure Camp, a trip to JNi Scout Group in Paisley and a joint camp with 16th Argyll at Southend. A Camp on Gigha included completing a community project with the Gigha Ranger. Three camps are already scheduled for next year.
- **Explorers** – After their amazing trip to Nepal in 2023 Explorers started back in September with 24 Explorers and 4 Leaders. They attended a well organised camp with Campbeltown Scouts and Explorers at Southend Village Hall in September, and enjoyed hiking and outdoor cooking. A number of Explorers attended Lapwing Lodge at the end of September for selection to Blair Atholl International Jamborette and six Explorers were successful- the largest group ever to attend from the 19th. These six Explorers attended five training camps throughout the year, camping in some quite extreme weather conditions and learning all the skills required for a traditional 12-day camp in patrol tents, earning their Zodiac camping.
An eventful Bronze Duke of Edinburgh and Platinum Chief Scout expedition was run at the end of October. The route had to be changed at the last minute due to the severe flooding and landslides. Four Explorers achieved their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award and a further seven achieved the expedition element of the Platinum Chief Scout Award at this stage.
The Explorers organised activity evenings for the Scouts to explore how Christmas and Easter are celebrated around the world, which also achieved some of the requirements for the Platinum Chief Scout Award.
Six Explorers have signed up to complete a ten-day Explorer Belt expedition in Galicia, Spain in October 2024. Their training started in March, with route, transport and accommodation planning as well as team building exercises.
The Group hope to be able to award at least four Diamond Chief Scout Awards and Silver Duke of Edinburgh Awards next year.

Training Both current and newly recruited Leaders will continue to participate in a variety of training. Past investment in training enables the Group to offer a variety of events and activities.

Policy on reserves An informal reserve of £3000 was originally agreed by the committee on 25 August 2015 and remains unchanged after review. This ensures the Group will always have sufficient funds to pay the annual capitation fees and insurance. The Group has no other mandatory outgoings.

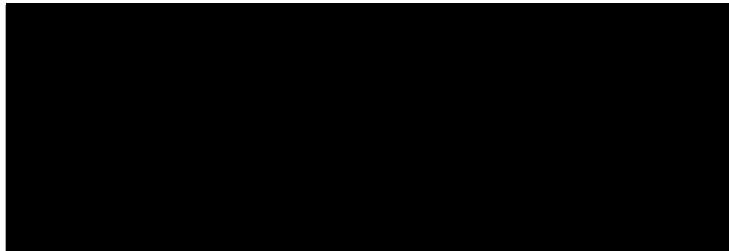

All these monies together with the £3000 reserve referred to above are ringfenced in a separate interest earning account. Operating expenses for the group are all covered from the general account.

Donated facilities and services Around 100 young people benefitted from outdoor activities. These were facilitated by Scout Leaders assisted by parents and committee members.

All leaders, committee members and parents are volunteers.
