The trustees present their Trustees' Annual Report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2025.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005.

In this report the trustees of The Lauren Currie Twilight Foundation present a summary of its purpose, governance, activities, achievements and finances for the financial year 31 March 2025.

The report and accounts are presented in a form which complies with the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 and OSCR requirements.

Principal Activity

Their principal activity is the advancement of health through raising awareness of vasculitis, supporting affected individuals and families, and funding medical research into the condition.

Mission, Objectives and Strategy

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the Year Ended 31st March 2025.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES; STRATEGIES THAT CONTRIBUTE TO THE ACHIEVEMENT OF THE STATED OBJECTIVES

The purposes of the Charity are listed in bold and strategies for achieving stated objectives are listed below each purpose.

Overview and Summary

The Lauren Currie Twilight Foundation (LCTF) stands as a testament to the memory of Lauren Currie, a vibrant and caring 15-year-old, who tragically succumbed to Vasculitis, specifically the rare variant, Granulomatosis with Polyangiitis (GPA). Founded and registered as a charity in October 2010, LCTF emerged from the depths of loss, reflecting Lauren's compassionate nature. Her diagnosis of vasculitis, discovered posthumously, underscored the challenges associated with detecting this rare disease. LCTF, shaped by Lauren's spirit, is dedicated to supporting patients grappling with vasculitis through the fulfilment of the charity's overarching aims. As ongoing research into Vasculitis continues, the foundation recognises the constraints posed by the rarity of the disease, limiting both awareness and research funding. The crucial role played by charities like LCTF becomes evident, as researchers depend on such organisations to partially fund vital research initiatives in the UK.

Purpose One- The advancement of health and the saving of lives by raising public awareness of Vasculitis and in particular, Granulomatosis with Polyangiitis (formerly known as Wegener's Granulomatosis).

The Lauren Currie Twilight Foundation has successfully executed a public awareness campaign, employing press, radio, and internet platforms to illuminate the complexities of vasculitis. Collaborating with renowned press outlets, impactful stories and information about the disease reached a broad audience, fostering heightened awareness. The strategic partnership with Capital Radio and Bauer Radio amplified our reach, with over 600,000 listeners exposed to our message about vasculitis. Simultaneously, our targeted internet and social media advertising campaigns on Google, Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter effectively engaged newly diagnosed patients seeking information. The response was good, with increased inquiries and engagement, showcasing the campaign's tangible impact. As we reflect on these achievements, we recognize the need for sustained efforts, diverse outreach strategies, and continuous evaluation for future campaigns. The Lauren Currie Twilight Foundation remains dedicated to illuminating the path forward in vasculitis awareness, support, and research.

Purpose two- The relief of those in need who suffer from Vasculitis or care for those who suffer from Vasculitis or those in need by reason of age, ill-health and disability generally or those suffering financial hardship or other disadvantage because of Vasculitis by supporting Vasculitis group meetings in Scotland and elsewhere.

The charity has supported and funded patient support groups in Aberdeen, Edinburgh and Glasgow. The groups meet with attendance ranging from 30-60 patients per meeting. At support events, the patients have the opportunity to listen to keynote speakers, gain updates on the charity, obtain guidance and information, and act as a source of networking. A core aim of such groups is the removal of isolation and this aim has been delivered. The charity launched the first online patient support centre within the charity website in April 2013. The patient support centre provides a range of commissioned self-management support products and services such as factsheets on vasculitis and treatments, diet and anxiety booklets, anxiety talk therapies, relaxation and sleep therapies, guidance webinars, assistance alarms and the Twilight Cabin for respite breaks. The charity also operates an online private group via Facebook and has

continued to grow throughout the financial year and now has over 2,000 likes.

The Contribution of Volunteers

The successful development of the Lauren Currie Twilight Foundation is founded on the dedication and commitment of a wide range of volunteers, including the entire Board of Trustees. Their collective contribution has been instrumental to the establishment and continued growth of the Trust, and the Foundation would not be where it is today without their time, expertise, and commitment. The Trustees wish to formally acknowledge and thank all volunteers for their ongoing support throughout the year.

Although the charity works constructively with a number of Government Agencies, it does not receive direct government funding. The Foundation is instead sustained through the generosity of individual and corporate supporters, alongside income generated from merchandise sales and fundraising events organised by the charity. This model reflects the community-led ethos of the Foundation and highlights the essential role played by volunteers and supporters in furthering its charitable objectives.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Review of Performance

Participation

The Lauren Currie Twilight Foundation is committed to ensuring its resources are accessible to all. Its regularly updated website provides comprehensive access to guidance, support services, information, and networking opportunities for individuals affected by vasculitis. The Foundation recognises the importance of building a strong, inclusive community and promoting shared support.

Supported by the dedication of its volunteers, the Foundation encourages open participation throughout the year, creating opportunities for individuals to connect, share experiences, and contribute to the development of information, awareness, and guidance relating to vasculitis. This collaborative approach strengthens the support network within the vasculitis community and reflects the Foundation's ongoing commitment to improving the wellbeing, understanding, and empowerment of those affected by the condition.

Summary of Main Achievements

Fundraising:

The charity's work is made possible through the continued commitment of commercial partners, individual donors, and income generated via online sales. Financial support is secured through a broad and imaginative programme of fundraising activity, ranging from sponsored endurance challenges and Kiltwalks to corporate matched-funding schemes, social events and long-term Charity of the Year partnerships.

The enthusiasm and determination shown by those who give their time, resources, and support play a vital role in maintaining the charity's ability to deliver its services to people affected by vasculitis. These collective efforts demonstrate a strong sense of shared purpose, with individuals and organisations working together through inclusive and engaging initiatives to create positive impact.

A highlight of the fundraising calendar was the Black and Red Ball, the charity's principal annual event. With attendance of around 220 guests, the evening generated a net income of £25,000, providing a substantial contribution towards the charity's ongoing commitments and future development.

Education:

The charity recognises the important contribution of the Scottish Systemic Vasculitis Network in advancing the standard of care for people living with systemic vasculitis in Scotland. Through regular engagement with healthcare professionals, the charity continues to support and contribute to the network's work.

As a partner involved since the network's establishment, the charity remains committed to collaborative working to improve the quality, consistency, and coordination of care across the region. This partnership is further strengthened by the involvement of the Chair of the SSVN, who has spoken at patient support group meetings, helping to foster dialogue between clinicians and patients and to enhance understanding of clinical care pathways.

Research:

Support Initiatives:

Patient Stories Page

The charity maintains an online space dedicated to sharing lived experiences of vasculitis. This growing collection of personal accounts offers individuals the opportunity to reflect on their journey while helping others feel less alone following diagnosis. By reading and contributing stories, patients can find reassurance, mutual understanding, and emotional support through shared experience.

Wellbeing Pages

Alongside its structured wellbeing courses, the charity promotes a range of self-help resources available through its website, including the Stress Free Me page. This section provides practical information on sleep, nutrition, mindfulness, yoga, and relaxation techniques, developed with input from trusted professionals associated with the charity. In addition, the charity funds access to an Employee Assistance Programme (EAP), which offers confidential advice on wellbeing, financial matters, and employment law for those facing work-related challenges.

Counselling Services

Recognising the psychological impact of living with vasculitis, the charity offers access to counselling support via telephone and online appointments. Increasing uptake of this service reflects the ongoing need for emotional and mental health support among patients. Counselling support is also available through the EAP, ensuring patients can access help in a way that suits their individual circumstances.

Vasculitis Volunteers

A dedicated group of trained volunteers provides direct support by answering enquiries and maintaining regular contact with individuals newly diagnosed or experiencing isolation. Their role is vital in offering reassurance, information, and a listening ear, helping patients feel supported and connected.

Office Accommodation

The charity operates from a purpose-funded office in East Kilbride, made possible through generous business contributions. This space acts as a central point for coordination, information, and patient contact. Overseen by a volunteer operations manager, the office supports the charity's day-to-day activities and strengthens its ability to respond to patient needs.

Support Groups

In-person patient support groups continued to operate in Glasgow, Aberdeen, and Edinburgh, providing valuable opportunities for peer connection. These sessions allow individuals to share experiences and build relationships with others who understand the challenges of vasculitis. The groups are further enhanced by the involvement of healthcare professionals who volunteer their time to deliver informative talks and answer patient questions.

Online Wellbeing Assistance Programme

To broaden access to support, the charity invested in an online wellbeing platform offering guidance across a wide range of issues, including mental health, employment, legal rights, relationships, addiction, and family life. Living with a chronic condition such as vasculitis can place pressure on many areas of daily life, particularly work, finances, and personal relationships. This service provides free, easily accessible information aimed at reducing stress and improving overall wellbeing.

The Twilight Cabin

The Twilight Cabin offers a much-valued respite opportunity for individuals living with vasculitis and their families. Many patients experience financial strain due to reduced earning capacity, higher insurance costs, and limited travel options. Situated in Dalavich, overlooking Loch Awe, the fully equipped three-bedroom cabin accommodates up to six people and provides a calm, restorative environment.

Funding covers all core costs, including lease, utilities, cleaning, and maintenance, with a local facilities management company kindly supporting repairs. Stays are booked via the charity's website and reviewed by a trustee. Due to demand, patients are eligible for one stay per year. The cabin remains a central element of the charity's wellbeing

provision, supporting both physical and emotional recovery.

Awareness:

Vasculitis Awareness Month was observed in May, with the charity delivering an online awareness campaign using bespoke social media graphics and banners. These materials were shared widely, enabling supporters and partner organisations to help amplify key messages and raise understanding of vasculitis.

The Black and Red Ball continues to play an important role in increasing awareness alongside its fundraising purpose. The charity's patron, [REDACTED], supports the event each year and, when unable to attend in person, prov

At the end of the financial year the charity has assets of £37,030 (2024 - £33,900) and liabilities of £0.00 (2024 - £0.00). The net assets of the charity have increased by £3,130.

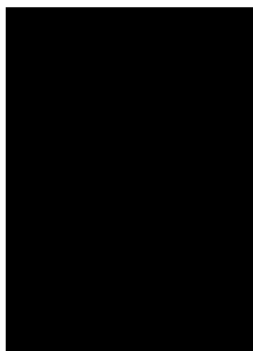
Reserves Position and Policy

The trustees who served throughout the financial year, except as noted, were as follows:



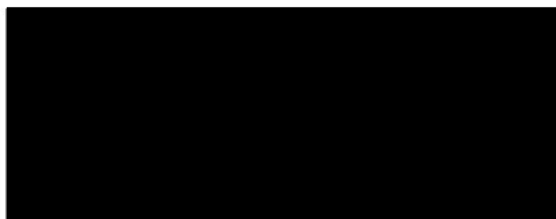
In accordance with the Constitution, the trustees retire by rotation and, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election.

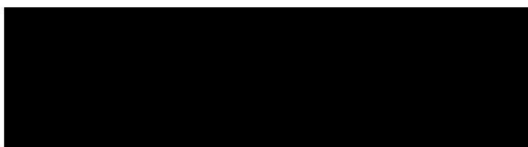

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

for the financial year ended 31 March 2025

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The Lauren Currie Twilight Foundation is a charity registered in Scotland (SC041934). The registered office and principal address is Westpoint House, 5 Redwood Place, East Kilbride, G74 5PB, United Kingdom.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared on a receipts and payments basis in accordance with the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. They consist of a Statement of Receipts and Payments and a Statement of Balances, together with supporting notes and schedules. The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

Fund accounting

The following are the categories of funds maintained:

Restricted funds

Restricted funds represent income received which can only be used for particular purposes, as specified by the donors. Such purposes are within the overall objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds relate to donations received for Cabin lease (£11,964) and insurance for Cabin (£1,700) and were fully applied during the year.

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds consist of General and Designated funds.

- General funds represent amounts which are expendable at the discretion of the board, in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.
- Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that the board has, at its discretion, set aside for particular purposes. These designations have an administrative purpose only, and do not legally restrict the board's discretion to apply the fund.

Receipts

All receipts are included in the Statement of Receipts and Payments when received by the charity.

Payments

Payments are included in the Statement of Receipts and Payments when paid. Payments are analysed under headings that reflect the nature of the expenditure. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to a heading, they are apportioned on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand comprises cash on deposit at banks requiring less than three months notice of withdrawal.

Taxation and deferred taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.
