Objectives: Contribute to prevention and relief of poverty through actively engaging in fundraising, mainly in support of the Chitambo School of Nursing and Hospital, through for example, provision of nurse training scholarships for particularly disadvantaged students, and improved accommodation and subsistence for hospital patients relatives, but also in support of other institutions (church, schools, orphanage, local businesses etc.), as possible Contribute to the advancement of education through supporting the Chitambo School of Nursing with equipment (books, teaching aids etc) and sponsorship of some basic and advanced nurse training Contribute to the advancement of health, in the Chitambo District, particularly through up-skilling of local health workforce by provision of nurse training scholarships for students and teaching staff Contributing to the saving of lives through assistance with locally identified clinical needs, such as ambulance maintenance and upkeep in order to promote rapid transfer of patients to hospital, from remote, rural areas Contribute to advancement of community development, at Chitambo, through working together to identify and address local health, education, business and other needs and encouraging community-driven solutions

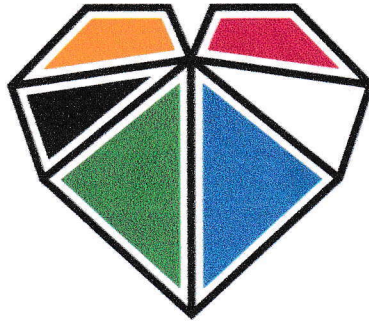

Recruitment and appointment of Trustees

All of the Association's trustees are appointed during the year.

Governing document

The Association is a charitable incorporated organisation and the purposes and administration arrangements are set out in our constitution.

Charitable purposes

Our purposes, as recorded in our constitution, are the prevention or relief of poverty, the advancement of education, the advancement of health, the saving of lives, the advancement of citizenship or community development.

Activities and achievements – Chairperson's report

Activities

Our main activities since April 2024 have included:

1) *Health care projects supported in Zambia by restricted and unrestricted charity funds:*

1.1 *Projects supported in Zambia, by restricted funds:*

- *Nurse Training Scholarships for financially disadvantaged students:* FoCH has supported 15 students since 2015, each through their full 3-year Nursing Diplomas. 12 have completed training and, of these, 10 have graduated and one is in the process of doing so. FoCH is supporting his registration and graduation fees. One student from the 2020 to 2023 cohort, is re-sitting finals for a 2nd time, supported by FoCH. Most of our graduates have obtained government posts.

4 new students were selected for FoCH Scholarships in January 2024. 3 entered at 1st year and one, who was struggling financially, was supported for his final year. He has now completed, registered and will graduate in September 2025.

Our 3 current (2024 to 2026) students are in 2nd year and doing well. One is supported by new donors who recently came on board. FoCH purchased 4 robust refurbished Dell Tablet PCs for the students, from Genesis Office Systems in Lusaka, Zambia (June 2024: £2,595), to facilitate their studies. In January 2025, we paid £2,473 in 2nd year Tuition and Other Fees, and monthly upkeep for these students.

- *Oxygen Pipeline Appeal:* This project, part-funded by FoCH and part by First Aid Africa (FAA), was successfully completed and piped oxygen is now available at the bedside, and in the operating theatre.

The oxygen generator itself, initiated by FoCH and funded by Scottish Government, via FAA, is now fully operational, under the care of a well trained local staff member. The project is yet to be commissioned, for complex reasons, and FoCH has been in discussion with Scottish Government about this.

Commemorative plaques, honouring donors, were procured at a cost of 8,500 Kwachas (approximately £236).

FoCH still holds a surplus of £3,753, restricted to oxygen project activities.

- Mothers Waiting Shelter (MWS) project: This multi-way collaboration, between the Whanganui Rotary Club; FoCH, UK; The Swanson Family Charity, Scotland; and Chitambo Hospital, has gone very well. 2024/25 has seen the main construction phase, by the Zambian company, MKP Building Contractors Ltd.

The total cost of the building contract was £34,285.62, less 10% retention fee, to be paid 8 months after completion of the construction.

Payments were in 3 phases:

- April 2024: Advance payment for purchase of materials: £11,347
- September 2024: At roofing level: £10,333
- December 2024: Final payment, on completion of the construction: £12,606

Equipping of the MWS cost approximately £7101 and was ongoing between October and December 2024. Purchases of mostly locally made furnishings included:

- 20 locally made metal bunk beds: £3,263
 - 40 mattresses: £1,877
 - Locally made curtains: £246
 - Curtain rods: £48
 - Locally made furniture (Cupboards, lockers and chairs): £1,535
 - Fire extinguishers: £133
- A further £595 was paid in transport costs (vehicle hire, fuel, travel and subsistence etc) for getting these goods to Chitambo, from Lusaka, the capital, and elsewhere..

At the end of the financial year (March 2025), the construction and furnishing of the MWS was all but completed and plans for commissioning the building were underway. Due to the generosity of many donors and the selection of excellent, cost-effective contractors, the project came in under budget so that the remaining balance of restricted funds in the MWS account was still £17,409.

Plans are underway for using the underspend to build a separate cooking shelter, covered walk-way, and for installation of donated solar geysers, to enable hot water to the 2 MWS bathrooms. £285 was paid to transport the donated geysers to Chitambo (September 2024), for assessment by the local engineering team.

- Maternity Unit Renovations (MUR) Project: Building on the successful MWS project, this project was launched in December 2024, with receipt of £8,096 from the Groningen City Council in the Netherlands. This donation was facilitated by one of our International Board members, based in the Netherlands, who was invited to speak at an annual Christmas dinner at which FoCH was selected for the charitable award. That award is supplemented by another private donation (£816) from the Netherlands (February 2025) and another unrestricted Christmas donation of £981, from Scottish donors (December 2024), making a total of at least £9,885 available to the MUR project.

With the advice of the Chitambo Hospital Board, the money is allocated to renovating the whole maternity unit, including the labour ward, pre-term baby ward and main pre and post natal ward. Renovation includes painting, decorating, re-tiling floors and

bathrooms, replacing ceiling tiles, and upgrading the showers and toilets. A contractor was identified and paid 50% of the costs (£2,249) to commence the work in March 2025. The remaining 50% will be paid on completion of the renovations. The remaining funds (around £5,387) is, on request, allocated to equipping the maternity unit, including providing an incubator, resuscitation unit, hospital viewing lamp, and 2 new delivery beds.

Together with the MWS, this project is contributing to substantial improvement of maternity services at Chitambo.

1.2 Projects supported, in Zambia, by unrestricted funds

- Ambulance maintenance funds: In March 2024, £1,000 was sent for annual maintenance of the Chitambo Centenary ambulance, donated by FoCH and other Scottish partners in 2008. This was a topup for funds sent in 2023, which had not fully been spent. This vehicle is ageing but has been kept going by the skilled maintenance of the local ambulance crew. However, evidence suggests that it has hardly moved since March 2004. This is partly due to lack of licencing. Chitambo partners are unable to re-licence it and FoCH is debating whether to invest further in maintenance of this vehicle.
- Staff Development Scholarships:
3 staff development scholarships have been supported so far:
 - Theatre Nurse: A senior theatre nurse successfully completed a BSc Nursing Degree and is due to graduate in May 2025. FoCH funded completion of the research component of his course:£202 (November 2024). £200 was paid towards graduation costs (March 2025).
 - Radiography Technician: A Chitambo Radiography Technician is now in the 4th year of his 5-year Radiography degree and is progressing well. Yearly tuition of £928 was paid in October 2024.
 - Medical Officer: A senior Medical Officer completed FoCH-funded refresher training in maternity care (£1,333) and provided a detailed training report (June 2024).
- Annual Non-Communicable Diseases Awareness Event: (2024): On request, FoCH funded a Chitambo team to participate in this annual sports tournament, to raise awareness of prevention of NCDs, at Chipata, Eastern Province, Zambia: £242 (June 2024).

2) Activities in Scotland/UK, supported by unrestricted charity funds

- Annual insurance premium: £160 was paid to Keegan and Pennykidd Insurance Brokers.(May 2024)
- Scotland's International Development Alliance (SIDA) annual membership fee: £90 was paid to SIDA (April 2024)
- Penicuik Storehouse Stall costs:
 - Purchase of Zambian crafts: £200 (May 2024)
- Miscellaneous:
 - SIDA Spring Conference Exhibition Stand: £100 (April 2024)

3) Fundraising activities to raise the above funds

The above health and other projects are supported by regular, and one-off donations and fundraising activities:

i) Donations:

- *Regular donations:* 12 donors are supporting us with regular (monthly or yearly) donations amounting to **£3,560**
- *One-off donations:* We also received **£42,686** in *one-off* donations since 1st April 2024, of which **£31,449 was restricted to the MWS project and £9,889 to the MUR project.**
- *Membership fees:* 3 members paid £10 each in annual membership fees: **£30.**

Together, donations raised a total of **£46,246**

ii) Fundraising activities

- MWS Crowdfunding Appeal: This Appeal officially closed in May 2023, but continued to receive donations during 2024: **£1,318**
- Penicuik Storehouse Stall raised: **£1,882**
- Penicuik Street Fair Stalls
 - Penicuik in the Park (May 2024): **£175**
 - Summer Street Fair: **£350**
 - Christmas Street Fair raised: **£392**
- Pottery sales: **£290**
- Book royalties (Livingstone's Hospital) raised: **£6**

Together, these fundraising activities raised a total of **£4,413**

i) Board recruitment:

2 new members joined our International Board during the year, one from the Netherlands and one in New Zealand. Both have strong connections with Chitambo

Our Zambian Board is making good progress on building its capacity and has appointed 4 new members this year, including the District Chief, Area Councillor, a Nurse Tutor, and a Registered Nurse. The latter 2 constitute the Secretariat. The Zambian Board is working on appointing a local business person as well.

ii) Capacity Building:

Of our 16 Board members, over half are based in Zambia. We are striving to transfer the balance of organisational power to them, including building their capacity for this role. We are still striving to identify funding for this activity.

iii) Education/Learning: FoCH members continue to participate in Scotland's International Development Alliance (SIDA) training programmes and conferences. The FoCH UK Chair has also registered with SCVO, for information about their charity training programmes.

In April 2024, FoCH presented a paper on 'Transferring the balance of power' at the SIDA Spring Conference, Edinburgh, and also to provide an exhibition stand at a cost of £100 to FoCH. We sold a few Zambian crafts to other conference delegates at this event.

Future directions

i) Priorities (April 2025 to March 2026):

Our main focus, in the coming year, is to:

1. Provide continued support for nurse training and staff development scholarships
2. Decide on whether to continue funding maintenance of the Chitambo Centenary Ambulance, which is ageing.
3. Complete building and equipping of the Chitambo Mother's Waiting Shelter (MWS)
4. Complete renovation and equipping of the Maternity Unit
5. Continue our organisational development including:
 - Seeking grant funding for capacity building of our organisation, particularly at the Zambian end, including hiring a Programme Co-ordinator to help manage all in-country FoCH projects
 - Strengthening our Funding Strategy to match our Organisational Strategy
 - Increasing our paying membership and regular monthly donor pool

ii) Planned fundraising events (2024/2025):

UK

- Participating in Penicuik Street Fairs (August and Christmas 2024)
- Zambian Cultural Evening (March 2025)
- Penicuik Storehouse stall (ongoing)

Zambia

- Offers of further fundraising events by a Zambian-based member.
- Regular consignments of Zambian crafts for sale on our Penicuik Storehouse stall, mostly paid through Zambian fundraising events.

Key Risks and Going Concern

Our key risks include:

- The loss of key volunteers: This is mitigated by our continuous efforts to attract new members.

Finance

The income for the year was **£50,776** and we made payments of **£56,702**, leaving us with a deficit of **£5,926**

Trustee remuneration and expenses

The trustees did not receive any remuneration during this period.

Reserves

We started the year with a bank balance of **£42,246**.
At 31/03/24 we held cash at bank of **£36,320**.

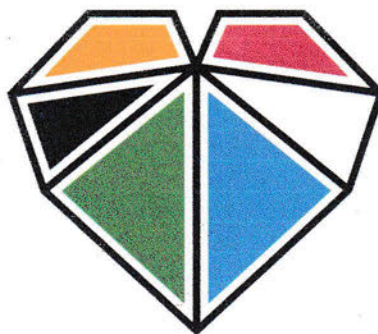




Charitable purposes

Our purposes, as recorded in our constitution, are the prevention or relief of poverty, the advancement of education, the advancement of health, the saving of lives, the advancement of citizenship or community development.

Activities and achievements – Chairperson’s report

Activities

Our main activities since April 2022 have included:

1) *Health care projects supported in Zambia by restricted and unrestricted charity funds:*

1.1 *Projects supported in Zambia, by restricted funds:*

- *Nurse Training Scholarships for financially disadvantaged students:* 11 supported students have completed our training scholarships since 2015, and 9 have graduated. Most of these have obtained government posts. Of our 3 outgoing (2020 to 2023) students, one passed her finals and is now registered as a nurse. FoCH paid her registration costs (£100). One student failed his mock finals and was deferred to the next exam (May 2024). One failed 1 course and must resit his finals. FoCH will be absorbing these resit costs from general funds.

Selection of further students for FoCH Scholarships is underway.

- *Oxygen Pipeline Appeal:* This project, part-funded by FoCH and part by First Aid Africa (FAA), was successfully completed and piped oxygen is now available at the bedside, and in the operating theatre.

The oxygen generator itself, initiated by FoCH and funded by Scottish Government, via FAA, is now fully operational, under the care of a well trained local staff member. There are a few snagging to be completed on the shelter which houses the plant, before official commissioning by the Ministry of Health (MOH) can take place.

FoCH still holds a surplus of £3,753, restricted to oxygen project activities.

- *Mothers Waiting Shelter (MWS) project:* This multi-way collaboration, between the Whanganui Rotary Club; FoCH, UK; The Swanson Family Charity, Scotland; and Chitambo Hospital, is going very well.

A successful Crowdfunding Appeal, together with large donations from 2 other organisations (the Whanganui Rotary Club, North Island, New Zealand, and the Swanson Family Charity, Scotland), completed the fundraising phase of the project. In January 2024, we engaged the services of a skilled Procurement Officer at the Zambian Ministry of Health, to guide us through the tendering process. She visited Chitambo twice, firstly to preside over a site visit for prospective contractors (5th February 2024) and then for the bid opening and evaluation meeting for those 5 contractors who had submitted bids (8th March 2024). Following evaluation, MKP Contractors Limited was selected as the winning bidder. FoCH funded the Procurement Officer’s travel expenses, and those of the Chair of the Zambian Board, for attendance at those vital meetings (£272 and £384 respectively).

At the end of the financial year (March 2024), the balance of restricted funds for the MWS was £27,432.

1.2 Projects supported, in Zambia, by unrestricted funds

- Ambulance maintenance funds: In March 2024, £1,000 was sent for annual maintenance of the Chitambo Centenary ambulance, donated by FoCH and other Scottish partners in 2008. This was a topup for funds sent in 2023, which had not fully been spent. This vehicle is ageing but being kept going by the skilled maintenance of the local ambulance crew.
- Staff Development Scholarships:
3 staff development scholarships have been supported so far:
 - Theatre Nurse: A senior theatre nurse successfully completed a BSc Nursing Degree and will graduate following submission of the research component of the course. FoCH funded him to attend an annual Theatre Nurses' Conference (August 2023). In October 2023, we provided a further £140 topup to his annual fees, when his university increased the fees to include the research component.
 - Radiography Technician: A Chitambo Radiography Technician is now in the 4th year of his 5-year Radiography degree and is progressing well. Yearly tuition fees (£724) were paid in October 2023. On request, we also made a contribution to a new smart phone to enable easier internet access when working from home (£54).
 - Medical Officer: A senior Medical Officer requested assistance to undertake refresher training in maternity care; general surgery and orthopaedics. £1,333 was granted in March 2024, for maternity care, with a view to supporting further training in the future. A report will be provided on completion of the training.

2) Activities in Scotland/UK, supported by unrestricted charity funds

- Annual insurance premium: £156 was paid to Keegan and Pennykidd Insurance Brokers.
- Scotland's International Development Alliance (SIDA) annual membership fee: £90 was paid to SIDA.
- Penicuik Storehouse Stall costs:
 - 50% commission on stall goods: £95
- Miscellaneous:
 - Contribution to FoCH 10th Anniversary celebration: £50

3) Fundraising activities to raise the above funds

The above health and other projects are supported by regular, and one-off donations and fundraising activities:

i) Donations:

- Regular donations: 12 donors are supporting us with regular (monthly or yearly) donations amounting to **£3,561**
- One-off donations: We also received **£21,703** in one-off donations since 1st April 2023, of which **£18,920 was restricted to the MWS project.**
- Membership fees: 3 members paid £10 each in annual membership fees: **£30.**

Together, donations raised a total of **£25,294.**

ii) Fundraising activities

- Crowdfunding Appeal for Mother's Waiting Shelter (Spring 2023) raised: **£7,979**

- Penicuik Storehouse Stall raised: **£2,331**
- Penicuik Street Fair Stalls
 - Spring Street Fair (2023) raised: **£316**
 - Christmas Street Fair raised: **£249**
- Book royalties (Livingstone's Hospital) raised: **£3**
- Gift aid: **£3,061**

Together, these fundraising activities raised a total of **£13,902**

Total Income: £39,233

Organisational development:

i) Board recruitment:

Our **Zambian Board** is striving to build its capacity and has so far appointed 3 new members including a Nurse Tutor, Registered Nurse, and local Community Councillor.

ii) Capacity Building:

Half of our 12-strong Board is based in Zambia. We are striving to transfer the balance of organisational power to them, including building their capacity for this role. We have not yet identified funding for this activity.

iii) Education/Learning: FoCH members continue to participate in Scotland's International Development Alliance (SIDA) training programmes and conferences. The FoCH UK Chair has also registered with SCVO, for information about their charity training programmes.

FoCH is invited to present a paper on 'Transferring the balance of power' at the SIDA Spring Conference, Edinburgh (16/04/24), and also to provide an exhibition stand at a cost of £100 to FoCH. We can sell some Zambian crafts to other conference delegates.

Future directions

i) Priorities (April 2024 to March 2025):

Our main focus, in the coming year, is to:

1. Provide continued support for nurse training and staff development scholarships
2. Continue to contribute to ambulance maintenance, as indicated
3. Complete building and equipping of the Chitambo Mother's Waiting Shelter (MWS)
4. Continue our organisational development including:
 - Seeking grant funding for capacity building of our organisation, particularly at the Zambian end, including hiring a Programme Co-ordinator to help manage all in-country FoCH projects
 - Strengthening our Funding Strategy to match our Organisational Strategy
 - Increasing our paying membership and regular monthly donor pool

ii) Planned fundraising events (2024/2025):

UK

- Participating in Penicuik Street Fairs (August and Christmas 2024)
- Zambian Cultural Evening (March 2025)
- Penicuik Storehouse stall (ongoing)

Zambia

- Offers of further fundraising events by a Zambian-based member.

- Regular consignments of Zambian crafts for sale on our Penicuik Storehouse stall, mostly paid through Zambian fundraising events.

Key Risks and Going Concern

Our key risks include:

- The loss of key volunteers: This is mitigated by our continuous efforts to attract new members.

Finance

The income for the year was **£39,233** and we made payments of **£5,974**, leaving us with a surplus of **£33,259**

Trustee remuneration and expenses

The trustees did not receive any remuneration during this period.

Reserves

We started the year with a bank balance of **£8,987**.

At 31/03/24 we held cash at bank of **£42,246**.

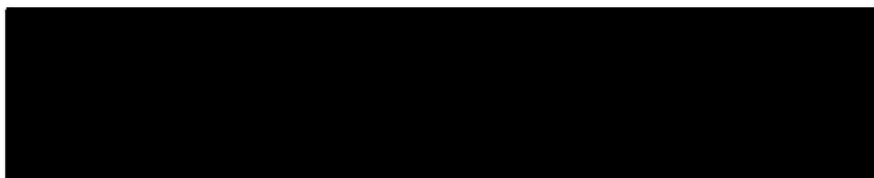

1 Basis of accounting

2 Nature and purpose of funds

Restricted funds may only be used for specific purposes. During the year there was a net increase in these funds of £24,959 (2022/3:£740), comprising £2,063 for nurses training (2022/3:£nil) plus £23819 for the mothers' shelter (2022/3:£1,526).

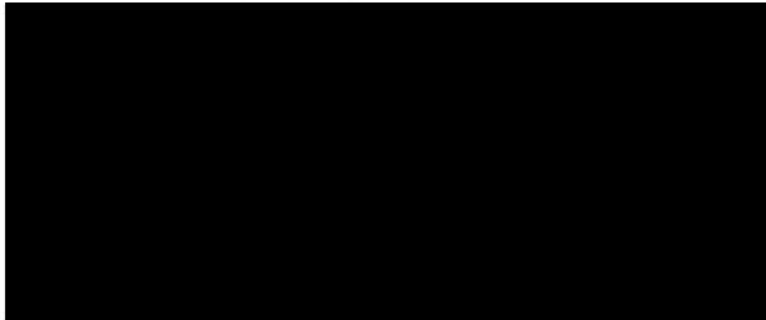
