ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The past year has been filled with progress, achievement, and community spirit - proof of what can be accomplished when people come together to care for their local environment.

It was a strong year for funding to support our project. In addition to a three-year National Lottery Community Led Fund awarded to support us from December 2023 to December 2026, this year we were successful in being awarded an additional three-year fund by the National Lottery Heritage Fund from July 2024 to July 2027. These funds allowed the recruitment of a full-time community engagement ranger, a part-time project coordinator and a part-time estate ranger, this allowed us to significantly increase community engagement and estate development work this year.

Despite some challenges along the way, 2024-2025 has been a remarkable year for our group, with several exciting "firsts," new partnerships, and outstanding volunteer contributions that have strengthened our work in conservation, education, and wellbeing across the Douglas Support Estate.

Achievements

One of our "firsts" was the launch of our community growing project. A huge thank you to our trustees and dedicated volunteers who installed our 60-foot community polytunnel - one of the few to survive the storms of last January! Through the hard work of our group and its volunteers, we were able to provide free, healthy produce to over 100 local residents, as well as make regular donations of fresh salad and vegetables to a local food bank and a community café. This project has truly shown how growing together can strengthen both our community and our connection to nature.

Another exciting "first" this year was the installation of our very own bee hives in partnership with a local beekeeper from the Lanarkshire Bee Society. In addition to supporting local biodiversity, the honey produced by the bees went on to win "Best Tasting Honey in Lanarkshire" in the Lanarkshire Bee Society Competition.

This year also saw the installation of a community cabin in Tombs Park, which has quickly become a popular hub for our community visitors. We would like to thank our skilled volunteers and rangers who transformed what was once an anti-vandal steel box into a warm and welcoming woodland retreat. Thanks to funding from Lanarkshire's Disability Forum, this year we have been able to start a free outdoor tea/coffee morning every Saturday and Sunday at the community cabin.

We were delighted to receive a report from Paths for All, showing that the path tracker on the route from Viewpark into the Glen recorded 20,390 visits between January and December 2024. This is a fantastic reflection of how valued and well-used the Glen has become by our community - that's over twenty thousand healthy, nature-filled walks!

As always, we love delivering activities that bring people together - whether for conservation, wellbeing, or education. This year, with the support of our ranger team and project coordinator, we successfully delivered 96 activities to 625 participants. The feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, with many new faces now becoming regular visitors in the Glen and volunteers for our project.

Partnerships and Collaboration

We've also worked hard to strengthen partnerships with other community groups and charities. This year we were delighted to collaborate with:

Hope for Autism - who now visit the estate weekly for bushcraft sessions.

Airdrie 2nd Scouts and Baillieston Scouts who visit the estate several times a year to volunteer and carry outdoor activities.

Viewpark Family Centre who visit the estate several times a year for planned activities with our ranger team.

The Conservation Volunteers (TCV) who now use the estate as a location to carry out citizen science activities.

Climate Action Lanarkshire who are supporting us to carry our climate action activities.

New College Lanarkshire students for whom we provided 25 unpaid work experience placements to support their learning and help them on their path to being the conservation workers of the future.

These partnerships have helped expand our reach and bring new energy, ideas, and opportunities into the Glen.

Challenges and Reflections

Like many small charities, we faced some challenges this year - particularly at the beginning of the year when we struggled to maintaining volunteer numbers and secure the funding needed to sustain our growing list of projects. However, these experiences reminded us of the importance of being flexible, listening to our community, and planning carefully to make the best use of our resources.

What remains constant for our project is the dedication, enthusiasm, and passion of everyone involved - our voluntary trustees, our volunteers, staff, supporters, and community partners - who make everything we do possible.

FUTURE PLANS

As we look to the future, our priorities for the year ahead include:

Creating more community rest and picnic areas to encourage local people to spend time in nature.

Continuing our woodland management programme, including invasive species control.

Developing a new woodland area to reduce M8 motorway visibility and noise.

Expanding our partnership with New college Lanarkshire and increase the number of work offered to local young people wanting to work in conservation.

Expanding our Duke of Edinburgh Programme to become a Young Rangers Programme which will include volunteering opportunities to support young people gain their Duke of Edinburgh and Saltire Awards, in addition to gaining work skill and experience.

Improving estate paths and signage.

Continuing to expand our community activity programme to include more wellbeing activities to support local people struggling with mental health.

Strengthening our fundraising efforts to support long-term sustainability.

Continue developing a partnership with Scot Roads who have recently offered to donate a 100-tree orchard for our estate to support our local community.

Above all, we remain fully committed to protecting the Glen for future generations, ensuring it continues to be a place of nature, learning, and community pride.

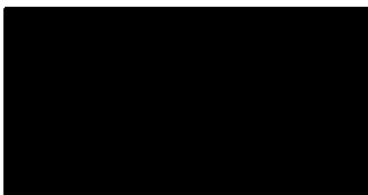

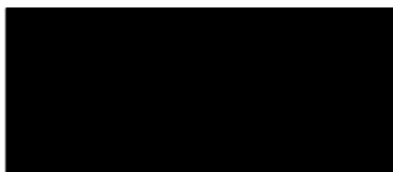

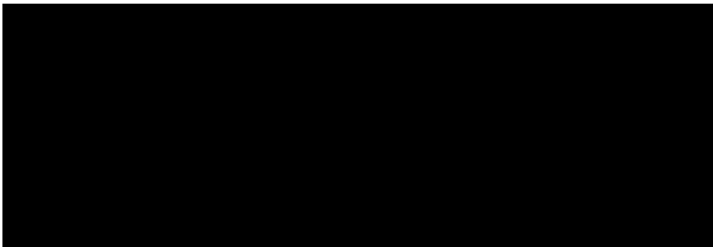

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery - 20% on cost
Computer equipment - 25% on reducing balance

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
