What the charity does: We provide information, support and advice to ethnic minority deaf people and their families. We embed equality and human-rights principles across our services, including welfare rights and Deaf Relay Interpreting. Our board includes one hearing member, never exceeding ethnic minority Deaf members, to ensure inclusion and diverse perspectives.

Beneficiaries: 'People with disabilities or health problems', 'People with a particular ethnic or racial origin'

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Who we are...

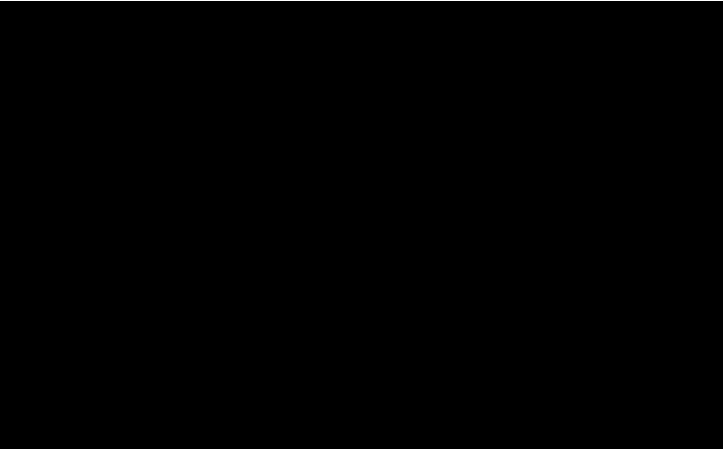
Originally set up in 1998 as Glasgow Asian Deaf Club (GADC) to provide support for Deaf Asian people and their families, the community quickly grew. As more people Deaf people from other ethnic minorities started to attend the bi-weekly social club, so did the need for advocacy and support for those who were unable to get advice and information from mainstream services.

To represent the multi-cultures at the Club, in 2017 GADC became the Scottish Ethnic Minority Deaf Club SCIO, and from a small room in Pollokshield's Community Centre the journey to grow the organisation began and as we started to seek ways to be able to provide the bespoke services that would be of benefit to the members of the community. Member led, Big Lottery funded the roles of a Project Manager and Development Worker from the community and from community consultations, we began to access funding to deliver wellbeing workshops, British Sign Language classes, organise social events and offer advice and information with full access to communication by providing BSL Interpreters and Deaf Relay Interpreters.

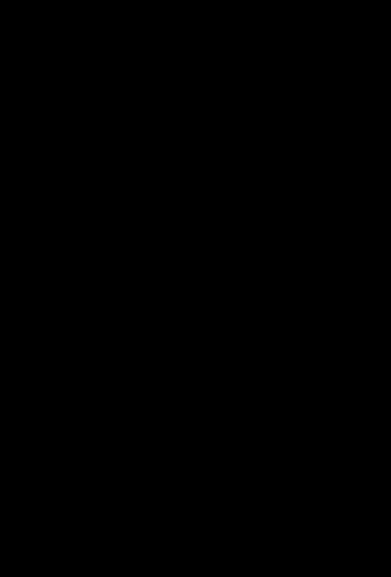
In November 2022, due to the many services being provided such as employability, welfare rights, confidence building workshops, volunteering and the continued advocacy and support, SEMDC became the Scottish Ethnic Minority Deaf **Charity** as it had become much more than a Club.

All members are Deaf and from an ethnic minority, all Trustees are members with lived experience. The members are regularly involved in community consultations and provide feedback on the projects and services throughout and bringing new ideas all the time, allowing us to monitor and evaluate service delivery and plan for future project delivery.

As the organisation grows, we hope to continue to grow our membership, reaching out to other areas of Scotland and have a presence within local authorities and partner organisations, raising awareness of our deaf and cultural identity.

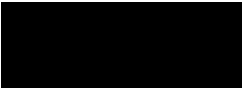
"The year 2023 – 2024 has been very inspiring as we welcomed two Trustees onto the Board, who bring a wealth of experience and a new energy to the team.

Various pots of funding enabled us to continue to provide advocacy and support for community members in regards to accessing advice and information on health-related topics and welfare rights.

Our Deaf Relay Interpreting service is being requested more frequently by the NHS, Police Scotland and legal services ensuring our members have full access to communication regardless of their level of British Sign Language and can make major decisions for themselves.

From humble beginnings of one member of staff in a tiny room in Pollokshield's Community Centre, to a team of 8 members of staff, with lived experience, we now are in a city centre building which is accessible for members across Scotland to attend our many projects and services.

2024 – 2025 hopes to be a fruitful year for the organisation, as we continue to develop opportunities for our members to learn and grow, as we focus on partnership working across all sectors of society"



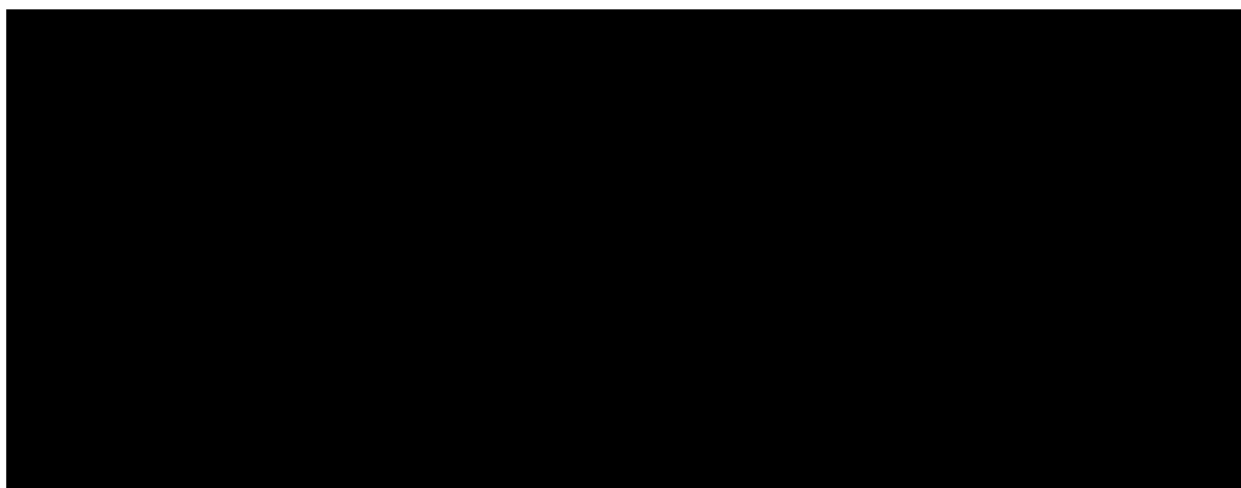

Projects and Services

The Rising Phoenix – *The National Lottery & Postcode Lottery*

The bi-weekly Club is the backbone of the organisation, and it is here members meet socially to develop meaningful friendships and gain access to advice and information otherwise not available to them through mainstream services. We have 95 members who come from all over Scotland when possible and with BSL being our preferred language, there are no barriers to communication at the Club.

As we entered year 3 of funding, we were delighted to secure another 3 years from the Improving Lives Fund in February 2023, becoming **The Soaring Phoenix**, allowing us to continue to provide advocacy and support to the members of the community and also continue with the bi-weekly club.



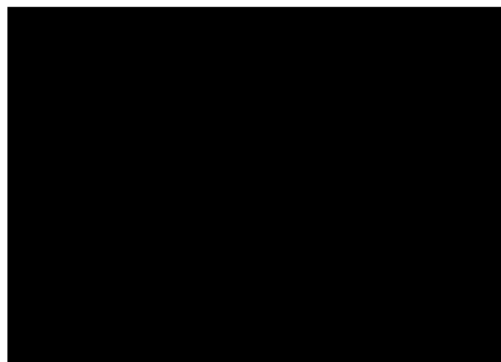

Community Consultation in partnership with the British Deaf Association

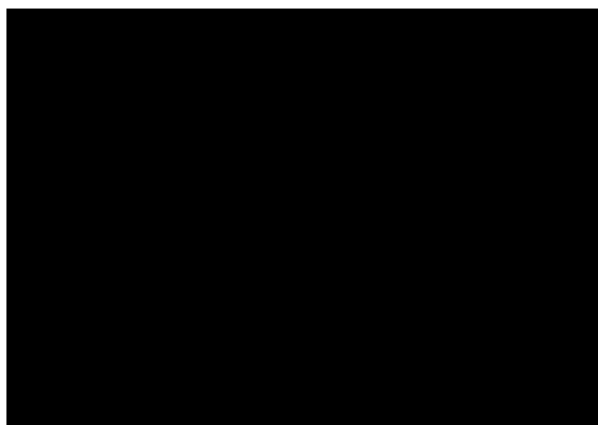

Deaf CAN – Scottish Government

Our employability programme entered year 3 which encompasses welfare rights, allows members to focus on pursuing career goals, enter education and training and gain a fuller understanding of the UK benefits system. Members receive 1:1 support or can attend group workshops to improve their knowledge or enhance their skills. Working in partnership with local colleges, members attended Math classes, many for in a learning environment for the first time in their lives.

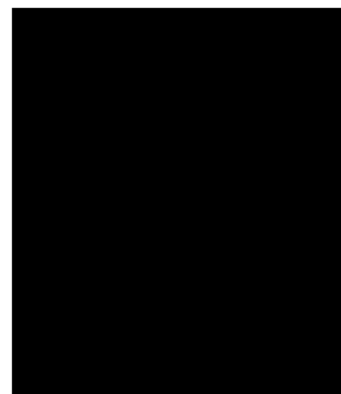
In this year, **45** members accessed bespoke support from the **Deaf CAN** team, reports showing that **85%** of participants had a greater understanding of their welfare rights and **70%** were more involved in things that were important to them.

Following on from year 1 and year 2 which raised awareness of mental health issues, Year 3 focussed on peer led workshops, to enable the members to put their learning into practice. 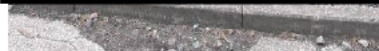
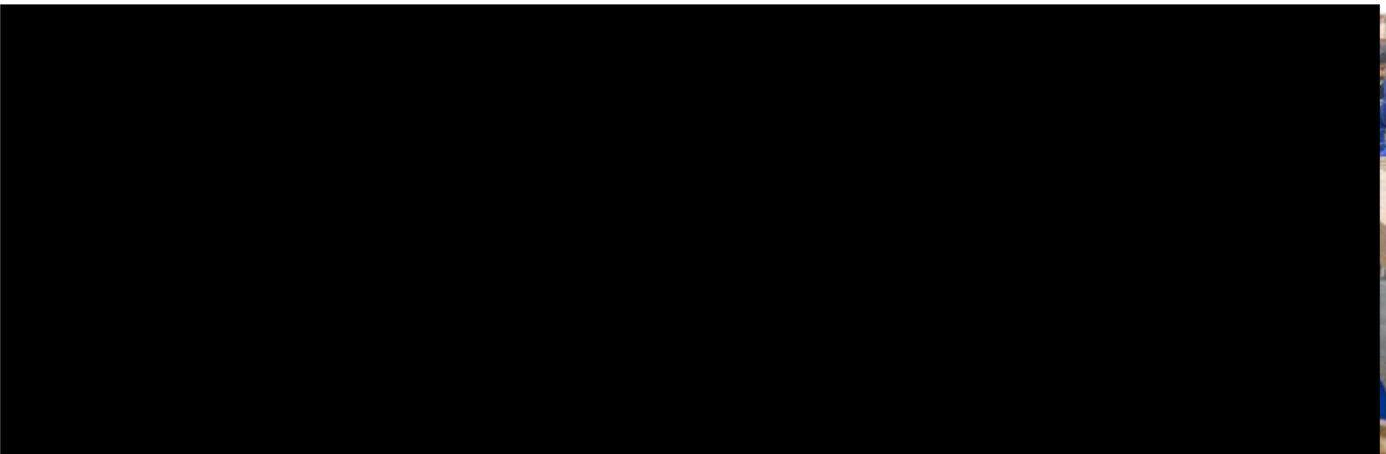

Grand Central Station Tour

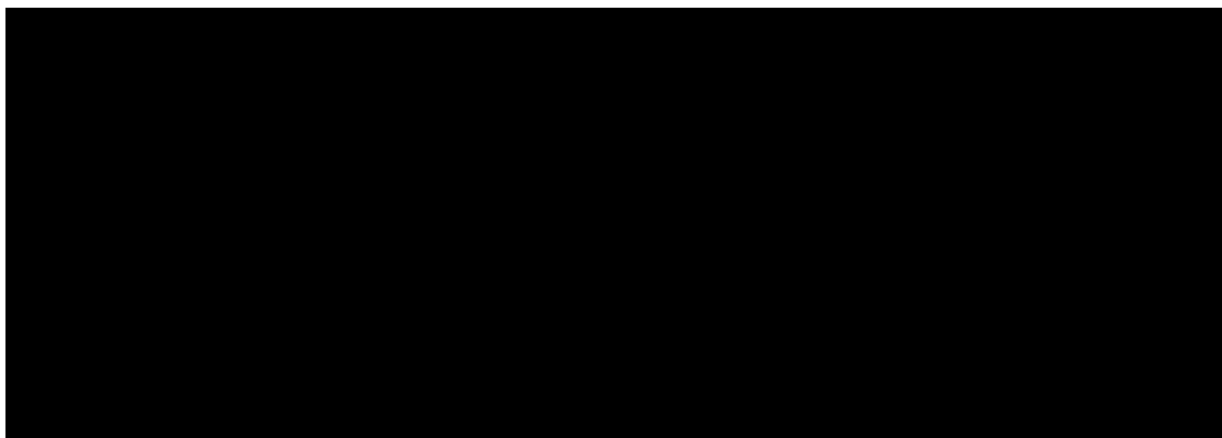

In this last year we have been able to pilot a women's group, starting with a SEMDC Sewing Circle – funded by Impact Funding's Winter Wellbeing Fund and then the Volant Trust to provide wellbeing workshops. **8** women participated overall.

In our final year of funding from Robertson Trust – Small Grants, we were able to manage the cost-of-living crisis, contribute to shortfalls in staff salaries and provide essential staff training. Additionally, we rolled out Human Rights training to staff and volunteers, and provided BSL Level I *Signature* accredited for 2 staff members and 8 members of the community.

Future Plans...

- ✚ Imperative to the continuation of the organisation, we will be applying to Roberston Trust large grants to be able to continue to provide essential advice and information on Welfare Rights.
- ✚ Hopeful of a continuation of our employability programme, funded by Scottish Government, we await information on next steps in regards to the Equality and Human Rights Fund.
- ✚ Community feedback: From a community consultation, demand is high for bespoke BSL Classes, with a BSL Level I class that started in August 2024 to end in March 2025, we will be looking for funding to progress successful candidates to BSL Level II.
- ✚ A review of our constitution is planned to ensure we are fully reflecting the work we do and services we provide. As more members are wanting to know more about their rights, and staff are trained on Human Rights First Approach.
