What the charity does: We are set up to provide for relief of poverty and hunger. Our principle service is the provision of Food Parcels to those referred to us by a number of local authority agencies. We employ 3 full time workers that organise the daily routines, coordinate with referral agencies and work with our volunteers to ensure that we have the necessary supplies to maintain our services. In addition to providing food parcels, we also operate a weekly lunch club for the elderly in our community. This entails the cooking of food on the premises, and the organisation of transport from home to club and back. In providing these services we are supported by the Local Authority who provide funds for food and food vouchers

Objectives: The organisation's purposes are: The prevention or relief of poverty. The relief of those in need by reason of age, ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage.

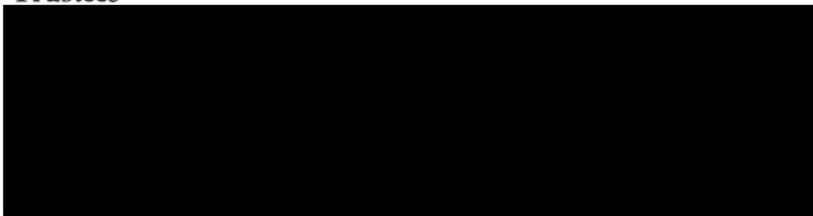

Status of Charity and Governing Document

Midlothian Foodbank (SCIO) is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) (SC048580). It was registered in its current legal form on 26 July 2018. Prior to that date Midlothian Foodbank was run under the governance of Gorebridge Parish Church (SC004673). The assets of Midlothian Foodbank were transferred from Gorebridge Parish Church to the SCIO on 1st September 2018. It has a single tier structure and as such the Trustees are the members of the charity.

Recruitment and appointment of Trustees

The Board, which generally meets monthly, are the charity's Trustees. Trustees are appointed at the annual general meeting which is held in May. Trustees are expected to serve for a term of three years, after which they may be reappointed for a further term of three years, up to a maximum of three consecutive terms. A charity Trustee who has served for three consecutive terms may not be reappointed for a fourth consecutive term but may be reappointed after an interval of at least one year. There must be a minimum of four and a maximum of seven Trustees.

The day-to-day management of the Foodbank is overseen by a Steering Group who report to the Trustees. Members of the steering group include the Trustees, the Foodbank Manager, and representatives from local Churches, Midlothian Council and Mayfield and Easthouses Development Trust.

Charitable purpose

The prevention or relief of poverty in the county of Midlothian, by providing emergency food parcels to individuals and families in need, by reason of age, ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage.

Objectives and activities

Midlothian Foodbank was set up by Gorebridge Parish Church in 2013 to give assistance to families and individuals in crisis by providing emergency food support. It is part of the Trussell Trust network of foodbanks and operates under its guidelines. In July 2018 Midlothian Foodbank (SCIO) became a separate charity. Since opening in 2013 it has supported over 3,000 Midlothian residents a year. The Foodbank helps people access support to address the underlying cause of food poverty.

The Foodbank has a network of over 50 referring agencies and partners including health care professionals, social workers, teachers, homeless support agencies and housing associations. Our main operation is centred at Gorebridge Parish Church and we have satellites at Newbattle Parish Church and Mayfield and Easthouses Development Trust.

Objectives and activities (continued)

The people of Midlothian generously support the foodbank's work, donating on average 15 tonnes of food every year via supermarket and other collection events. We have a pool of over 30 volunteers who support the collection events and a smaller team of 6 volunteers who are involved on a daily basis at our centre in Gorebridge. Some of our partners also hold emergency food parcels which can be distributed to families unable to get to Gorebridge.

A key aim of the Foodbank is to help take people out of food poverty. We run a project called Growth Matters. This project provides hot nutritious meals to people in isolation, or people who are in homelessness, poverty or recovery situations. We have a Citizen's adviser at a weekly lunch who is able to help clients with debt and benefits advice and help them maximise their income.

In partnership with Midlothian Children and Families we provide food support for families vulnerable to food poverty over the difficult weeks of the summer holiday.

There is an ongoing partnership between the Foodbank and Bethany Christian Trust to provide recovery support for people with drug and alcohol related issues in Midlothian.

We employ a full-time Foodbank Manager, a full-time Assistant Manager, and a part-time Warehouse Operative.

Achievements and performance

In the period from March 2024 to February 2025 Midlothian Foodbank has continued to serve and provide emergency food to the people of Midlothian. During this period 13,216 (2024 - 7,346) people were given food parcels, including 6,422 adults (2024 - 3,867) and 6,794 children 51% (2024 - 3,479 - 43%). This represents a 79% increase on the previous year. The increase is due to increasing demand over the summer holiday and Christmas period. Overall food parcel provision is curtailed to the extent that restricted funding is often limited by grant providers.

Financial review

Principal funding sources

Midlothian Foodbank has benefited from the generosity of grant funders, regular supporters, schools and local organisations, without whose support we would not be able to provide food and alleviate poverty.

Grant Funding

During the period to 28th February 2025, our fundraising team have been successful in securing over £180,000 of funding from the undernoted organisations:

The funding received, current and future, offers a sound platform, providing financial stability into 2024/25. This funding covers staff salaries, core costs and an adviser from Dalkeith CAB who attends the weekly community lunch.

Other Funders

We regularly hold food drives in local Tesco supermarkets where customers buy an extra item or two and donate it at the Foodbank collection point in store. Tesco have an agreement with the Trussell Trust to make a financial donation equivalent to 20% of the value of the food donated. This year we received £1,065 (2024: £4,724).

The Foodbank also benefits from regular donations from around 40 supporters. During the period under review, they accounted for £18,628 (2024: 20,340). We also received a further £2,954 (2024: £2,176) in gift aid during the year.

In addition to our regular supporters, we continue to receive many one-off donations, totalling over £19,970 (2024: £20,325).

The regular and one-off donations reduced by 7% from 2024. In addition, we note that food donations via supermarket trolley collections and food drives are less than in prior years. We anticipate this trend to continue as economic pressures on households and overall consumer confidence is lower than in prior years.

Expenditure

The major expenditure incurred relates to Salaries, HMRC and Pensions, and rental of premises. The staff costs currently met by our grant funders. Other items of expenditure are met from other donations (regular and one-off). Total staff costs in the period totalled £85,997 (2024: £86,067), with rental of premises totalling £9,000 (2024: £9,000). We were grateful to a Lottery for All grant of £2,500 to assist with rent during 2024.

Results for the year

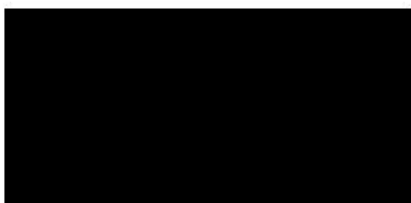
The Financial statements for the period are set out on pages 5 to 9. Per the Receipts and Payments Account on page 5, the charity reported a deficit of £21,305 (2024: deficit £951).

Reserves

The Trustees receive a monthly budget report highlighting the current (RAG) status. Red = < 3 months funding; Amber = < 6 months funding; Green = > 6 months funding. At the end of the current accounting period, the RAG status was green with seven months funding available. Per the Statement of Balances on page 6, the General Fund as at 28 February 2025 amounted to £12,912 (2024: £17,968) which reflects the challenges we face. Restricted Funds as at 28 February 2025 amounted to £10,316 (2024: £26,565). Total funds held at 28 February 2025 amounted to £23,228 (2024: £45,533).

The fundraising team worked hard during the year to 28 February 2025 and continue to seek funding. Since the year end have procured restricted funding to secure the salary costs through until September/October 2025. Given the increasing demand for grant funding, and the constraints on other agencies and local authorities, we are also seeking to building our base of micro-funds.

Report of the Independent Examiner to the Trustees for the year to 28 February 2025

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year to 28 February 2025 which are set out on pages 5 to 8.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The charity Trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

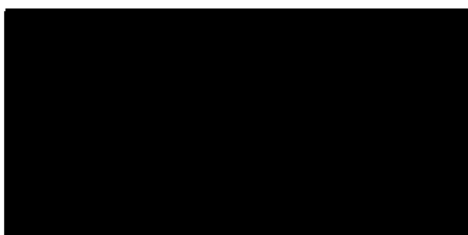

Explanation of funds

The Salaries and pension fund represents grants received to support the cost of employing the Foodbank manager and staff.

The Growth Matters fund represents money received for the Growth Matters project which aims to help families and individuals develop life skills to make healthy eating choices while working within limited budgets.

The Gorebridge Parish Lunch Club fund represents funds generated in support of the lunch club.

The Midlothian Food Fund represents monies given by Midlothian Council to buy food to support individuals and families as a result of the COVID-19 lockdowns and economic disruption.

The TyneEsk - MVA food fund represents funds received from MVA (Midlothian Voluntary Aid) for the provision of food

The Trussell Trust equipment fund represents monies given to purchase a storage container, a dehumidifier and the installation of an alarm system.

The Trussel Trust CAB worker fund represents money received for the salary of a CAB worker.

The Lottery for All Rents fund represents money given by The Lottery for All to help with funding the Foodbank's rent
