Recruitment, appointment and resignation of Trustees

John Miskelly stepped down as a Trustee on 20 December 2025.

Charitable purposes

The Purposes are the advancement of religion, specifically the Christian faith, primarily in Cupar, and also throughout Scotland and the rest of the world, by all means consistent with: The Christian Bible; and The Declaration of Principle; and The Statement of Foundation Values; including, without prejudice to the foregoing generality, worship, ministry, mission, witness, prayer, fellowship, networking, education, community service and the provision of activities and facilities for the community, and the relief of poverty and other social needs, including the support of individuals and other charitable organisations and agencies involved in any or all of these.

Activities and achievements

The church has continued to experience God's blessing through the ministry of Rev Dr Yeshwanth Vemana. He achieved his doctorate at St Andrews University in July 2025 with formal graduation taking place on 3rd December. His appointment as minister changed from part-time to full-time as of 1st September with the appropriate Sponsor License and then T2 Minister of Religion Visa being obtained.

Throughout the year Sunday worship services were maintained and on the Sundays that Yeshwanth was not preaching we were blessed by a great variety of people providing pulpit supply. We have welcomed Dr Tyler Hoagland and family into the congregation with Tyler leading the Praise Team using guitar. This team continues to greatly enhance the congregational worship.

Inter-church activities have continued with the church participating in the World Day of Prayer, the Easter Holy Week inter-church services, Good Friday 'walk with the Cross' and the 'top of Hill of Tarvit' Easter Sunday early morning service.

Services have been conducted on Wednesday afternoons in the Care Homes in the town. On most of these occasions a musician from the congregation has been available to accompany the singing. These services are done on a rota basis with the other town churches.

The Thursday evening Bible Study in the manse and Tuesday afternoon meeting in the home of two members continue to provide opportunity for fellowship and spiritual development. The church premises are opened once a month to coincide with the Saturday Farmer's Market. This provides a welcome space with refreshments and an opportunity to engage people with the message of the Christian faith and invite them to church activities.

The Craft group meets each Thursday and produces knitted goods for sending to needy people via Blythswood Care. Also on Thursdays the hall is used by the Inspire Theatre Workshops group, aiding Child Development through Performing Arts classes.

Activities and achievements – cont.

Of note during the year was the starting of "Toastie Tuesdays". This provides an economical lunch for secondary school children in the church hall on Tuesdays during term time. It is run by Young Life International who provide expertise using their own staff and trained volunteers from the local churches. This is well received by around 100 Bell-Baxter students and good relationships are being formed.

In October "Caledonian Collective" provided a team of volunteers from churches in the USA who spent two days landscaping our garden area. This has made the area much more useable and good fellowship was enjoyed with the volunteers.

The congregation is increasing with new families and individuals attending. Ministry to the children is facilitated by a regular children's talk during the first part of the Sunday service. The children then go to the hall for Junior Church which follows the same syllabus. Junior Church is staffed on a rota basis by volunteers who have been disclosure checked.

The church continued its policy of tithing its income to provide donations to 'good causes'. A number of external charitable organisations were supported financially during the year. The congregation responded to the 'Blythswood Care' Christmas Shoebox appeal by the donation a good quantity of filled boxes.

Trustee remuneration and expenses

Rev Dr Yeshwanth Vemana received a salary of £17,821 and expenses of £200 as a consequence of his employment by the church during 2025. The church contributed £2,654 towards his pension scheme. These figures are in line with the recommendations from the Baptist Union of Scotland.

Reserves

At the year end the church had a deficit for the year of £9,380 (2024 – surplus of £16,722).

The Visa cost included the cost of obtaining a Sponsor Licence for the Church and the cost of obtaining a T2 Minister of Religion Visa for Rev. Dr Yeshwanth Vemana, under which he and his family have leave to remain in the UK for three years.

The Church's two boilers were both replaced in February 2025. The cost was funded largely through donations and a Listed Places of Worship Grant to cover the VAT element.

At the year end the Church held restricted funds of £12,901 (2024 - £12,576) and unrestricted funds £37,924 (2024 - £47,629).

The current reserves are sufficient for continuing our current activities.

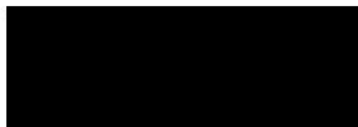
