Structure Governance & Management

Constitution

The Charity is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO). It is governed by its constitution which was granted charitable status by OSCR on 1st February 2024.

Appointment of Trustees

The Trustees are elected by members at the Annual General Meeting. There will be a maximum of 12 Trustees and a minimum of 3. Trustees can remain in position for a maximum of six years (except the Chair who can serve for 9 years), they are not eligible for election again until a further year has elapsed.

Management

The Trustees of The Flow Country Partnership are responsible for providing strategic direction and ensuring effective governance. The day-to-day operations and management are overseen by the Flow Country Partnership Manager and Management Committee.

Objectives & Activities

Charitable Purposes

The organisation's purposes are to promote the protection, conservation, and enhancement, for the benefit of the public, of the area within the Counties of Caithness and Sutherland, known as The Flow Country, on account of its outstanding peatland ecosystems and biodiversity, and in particular (but without limitation) to undertake the following:

- a) the advancement of environmental protection or improvement, by promotion and implementation of sustainable land management that maintains and enhances the habitats and species, and (but not limited to) carrying out and supporting the objectives set out in the Management Strategy for the Peatlands of Caithness and Sutherland.
- b) the advancement of education, by education of the public in respect of the area's significance and values, including its special wildlife, carbon store, landscape character, water environment, historical and cultural values, and through promotion of the value of the area as an exemplar and inspiration for others working on peatland management and restoration.
- c) the advancement of citizenship or community development, within the area and its communities by promotion of sustainable development of communities and the economy, based on The Flow Country's outstanding natural values.

Main Activities

The Flow Country Partnership has established workstreams that cover the core activities of the charity. Each workstream reports on progress to the Management Committee on a monthly basis, enabling rapid progress against the core objectives, with key decisions escalated to the Board of Trustees.

During 2025-26 the workstreams covered:

Peatland Restoration

The workstream was tasked with delivering the Facility for Investment Ready Nature in Scotland (FIRNS) funded Flow Country Green Finance Initiative. This has included the development and submission of Peatland ACTION and Peatland Code applications for two of the three project sites (Achentoul and Armadale). Key activities have included mapping, field-based ground-truthing, liaison with landowners and relevant stakeholders, and oversight of the tendering process and subsequent on-the-ground project delivery.

In parallel, development work has progressed on the third project site at Borgie Common Grazings, alongside efforts to build a pipeline of future projects beyond FIRNS. Pipeline development has been a core priority for the Flow Country Partnership, supporting long-term sustainability and creating ongoing opportunities for peatland restoration across the Flow Country region.

Strategic Action Funding was secured from Peatland ACTION for 2025-26, with further funding confirmed for 2026-27.

World Heritage Site

The workstream was tasked with managing and delivering projects in relation to The Flow Country World Heritage Site (WHS). These tasks have included updating the Management Plan post-inscription including undertaking a Strategic Environmental Assessment, responding to planning applications for developments within and adjacent to the Site boundary, drafting a Monitoring Plan to support WHS periodic reporting requirements and producing a Sustainable Tourism Strategy for the WHS and the wider Flow Country. The WHS's Steering Group was also reformed post inscription to guide the delivery of practical actions for the WHS.

Investment and Flow Country Restoration Limited (FCRL)

The workstream was tasked with leading on discussion with prospective investors, identifying bridging finance options and developing the relevant and appropriate financial model for different investments portfolio. It also managed the FCRL operations in relation to restoration on the ground (e.g. payment to contractors), working closely with the Peatland Restoration workstream.

Communications

The workstream was tasked with leading on all external facing communication including press, media, social media, public engagement and outreach. The workstream works closely with all other workstreams and with key external partners and agencies.

Fundraising

The workstream was tasked with mapping priority, needs (staffing, resources) and costs, identifying suitable calls for funding and sponsorship opportunities and initiating discussions with funders and prospective sponsors. This also included securing funding to deliver specific activities and engaging in the early stages of application process (e.g. Expression of Interest).

An Expression of Interest was submitted to the Endangered Landscapes & Seascapes Fund in January but was unsuccessful due to the high quantity & quality of applications to this international fund. Funding was secured from NatureScot to deliver The Flow Country World Heritage Site Management Plan SEA, brown gateway signs, Sustainable Tourism Strategy & project development work to feed into future funding applications.

This workstream works closely with the Peatland Restoration, World Heritage Site and Investment workstreams.

Achievements & Performance

The Flow Country Partnership has continued to make good progress over the past year, with work focused on peatland restoration delivery, project development, and longer-term planning for the Flow Country Partnership and the World Heritage Site.

Phase 2 of restoration work at Armadale Farm commenced in August 2025 and was completed by October 2025, with restoration at the site now complete.

Alongside delivery work, the development of a wider project pipeline has remained a core priority, with further restoration projects progressing through planning and application stages. To support this, a Peatland Restoration Offer leaflet has been produced, highlighting the support the Flow Country Partnership can provide to landowners interested in peatland restoration. Engagement events are planned later in the year to support its launch and encourage further participation.

Organisational capacity has also strengthened over the period. The Flow Country Partnership currently comprises six staff (5 FTE) and one intern employed across partner organisations, supporting delivery across restoration, communications, engagement, and World Heritage Site co-ordination.

Governance structures for the World Heritage Site have been re-established and strengthened. The WHS Steering Group reconvened in September 2025 and now meets quarterly, supported by a Management Group as well as Tourism, Communication, Funding and Planning Working Groups.

A Sustainable Tourism Strategy is currently being developed with consultancy support and has been informed by community consultations held in late 2025 and spring 2026. Publication of the strategy is expected in June 2026.

Progress has also been made on strategic planning and funding. The WHS Management Plan is being updated, although its adoption as a material planning consideration has been delayed until August 2026 due to the requirement for a Strategic Environmental Assessment. Planning applications at various stages have also been reviewed and responded to on behalf of the Partnership to help protect the Site's Outstanding Universal Value.

Additional funding has been secured to support delivery of the WHS Management Plan SEA, gateway signage, the Sustainable Tourism Strategy, and further project development work.

To support long-term sustainability, the Flow Country Partnership has been developing a five-year business plan setting out its investment model, project pipeline, financial projections, and organisational structure. A Peatland Restoration Offer booklet and associated marketing strategy have also been prepared to support future pipeline growth during 2026.

Local engagement has also been strong, with the Flow Country Partnership attending school events, including careers and science fairs, as well as wider community events. Further peatland education activity, including school visits and site visits, are planned for later in the year.

Finally, partnership working and profile-raising activities have continued to build momentum. A Memorandum of Understanding was signed with the Caithness Broch Project to support delivery of the Big Broch Build; while fundraising efforts have been supported through activities such as Prof. Roxane Andersen's remarkable 100km traverse of the Flow Country on World Heritage Day, a significant achievement that helped raise both funds and the profile of the Partnership.

Financial Review

The charity continues to receive significant in-kind contributions from partner organisations, including NatureScot, RSPB Scotland, North Highland Initiative, The Highland Council, Highlands and Islands Enterprise, and the University of the Highlands and Islands Environmental Research Institute. This support includes the provision of staff, funding for events, and coverage of associated operational costs.

North Highland Initiative has continued to act as the grant holder for the Facility for Investment Ready Nature in Scotland (FIRNS), which enabled delivery of the Flow Country Green Finance Initiative and supported two key roles, the Peatland Restoration Officer (1.0 FTE) and Project Officer (0.8 FTE), until March 2025.

Funding was secured from Peatland ACTION's Strategic Partnership Fund from March 2025 to support core costs associated with peatland restoration delivery, including salary costs for two staff members (Peatland Restoration Officer and FCP Project Officer) employed through North Highland Initiative, with funding paid directly to the Flow Country Partnership.

In addition, The Highland Council hosts the Flow Country Partnership Manager (1.0 FTE) and World Heritage Site Co-ordinator (1.0 FTE), while RSPB employs a Peatland Restoration Officer (0.8 FTE), a Peatland Communications and Engagement Officer (0.4 FTE), and a Peatland Restoration Intern (1.0 FTE, funded by Peatland ACTION).

Ongoing financial management support has been provided by North Highland Initiative.

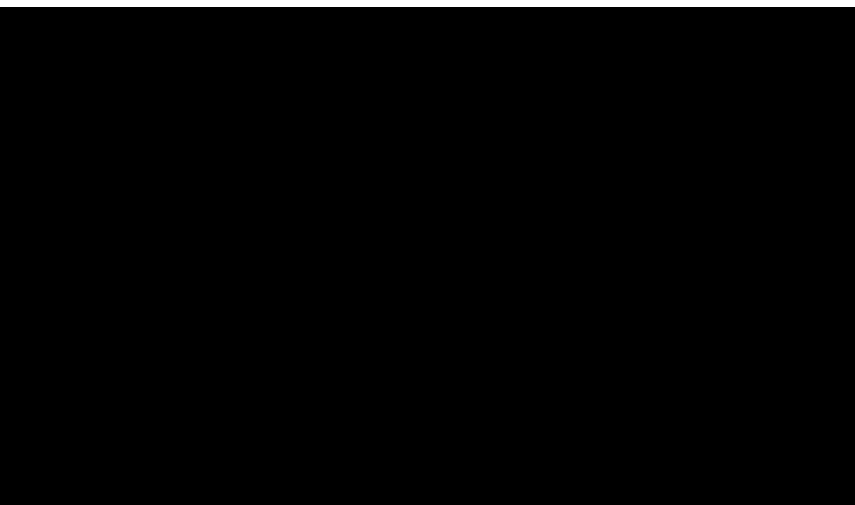

Each workstream reports on progress to the Management Committee on a fortnightly basis, enabling rapid progress against the core objectives, with key decisions escalated to the board of Trustees.

During 2024-25 the workstreams covered:

Green Finance Initiative

The workstream was tasked with the delivery of the Facilitating Investment Readiness for Nature Based Solutions (FIRNS) funded project *Flow Country Green Finance Initiative*. This included developing and delivering Peatland ACTION and Peatland CODE applications for 2 of the 3 projects sites (Achentoul, Armadale), including mapping, field-based ground truthing, liaison with landowners and other relevant stakeholders (e.g. Peatland ACTION officer), overseeing the tendering process and the project delivery on the ground. It also involved scoping out and developing the third project (Borgie Common Grazings) and a pipeline of future projects beyond FIRNS.

World Heritage Site

The workstream was tasked with providing IUCN with all required supplementary information ahead of their final recommendation, representing the property at key events, attending the inscription ceremony, developing the management plan post-inscription and liaising with other workstreams to manage communication, funding, staffing and forward planning.

Investment and Flow Country Restoration Limited (FCRL)

The workstream was tasked with leading on discussion with prospective investors, identifying bridging finance options and developing the relevant and appropriate financial model for different investments portfolio, managing the FCRL operations in relation to restoration on the ground (e.g. payment to contractors). This workstreams works closely with the Green Finance Initiative workstream.

Communications

The workstream was tasked with leading on all external facing communication including press, media, social media, public engagement and outreach. This also included a revamp of the [website](#) to reflect the UNESCO World Heritage Site inscription. The workstream works closely with all other workstreams and with key external partners and agencies.

Fundraising

The workstream was tasked with mapping priority, needs (staffing, resources) and costs, identifying suitable calls for funding and sponsorship opportunities and initiating discussions with funders and prospective sponsors. This also included securing funding to deliver specific activities and engaging in the early stages of application process (e.g. Expression of Interest). This workstream works closely with the Green Finance Initiative, World Heritage Site and Investment workstreams.

Administration

The workstream was tasked with enabling The Flow Country Partnership to function, for example by supporting bank account creation, HMRC registration, creating sharepoint workspace, organising email addresses, note-taking during management meetings. The workstreams works closely with all workstreams.

Achievements & Performance

March 2024:

Successfully completed and submitted the response to the IUCN's request for supplementary information by the World Heritage Site workstream team. Submission was completed on time, ensuring continued progress in the nomination process. The 40-page document included:

- A global comparison of the bird assemblages and Sphagna in the Flow Country.
- A comprehensive list of all recorded species in the Flow Country World Heritage Site property and their Global Red List status.
- Additional maps and details on protection inside and outside the boundary.

April 2024:

Represented the Flow Country at a high-profile UNESCO event in Paris, strengthening international engagement and visibility.

May – June 2024:

Successfully completed the Peatland ACTION and Peatland CODE application and tendering process, securing necessary approvals for restoration work.

July 2024:

The Flow Country is officially inscribed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site under Criterion (ix) 46th session of the World Heritage Committee held in New Delhi. The nomination dossier was commended for its high quality, with no recommendations issued - a rare achievement in World Heritage Site designations.

The Flow Country becomes the first and only peatland globally to receive this prestigious recognition.

Hosted a historic visit from His Majesty the King, who met with Trustees, staff and the local community at Forsinard Flows National Nature Reserve, including the official unveiling of the UNESCO World Heritage Site plaque.

Secured funding for two pilot restoration sites: Achentoul and Armadale, enabling critical peatland restoration work.

August 2024:

Restoration work begins at the Armadale pilot site, marking the start of the first major restoration effort post-UNESCO designation.

September 2024:

Successfully launched the first edition of a short peatland restoration course for contractors, held at Forsinard. The training included classroom and field-based elements and trained a cohort of seven participants in peatland restoration principles, techniques, project management, mapping, tendering, monitoring, and engaging with external agencies. The course also included an optional local course to secure an ATV driving ticket, enhancing practical skills for fieldwork.

October 2024:

Restoration work begins at the Achentoul pilot site while the first phase of restoration is completed at Armadale.

Submitted an Expression of Interest to the National Lottery Heritage Fund (NLHF) for future funding opportunities.

November 2024:

The Flow Country Partnership wins the prestigious Nature of Scotland's Award 2024 for Nature and Climate Action, recognising excellence in conservation and climate resilience efforts.

Trustee [REDACTED] secured a small grant to support a series of community events for the World Heritage Site and the Green Finance Initiative, fostering local engagement and education on peatland conservation.

December 2024:

Hosted a successful demonstration day at the Armadale pilot site for local landowners, showcasing restoration techniques and benefits.

Organised a community-focused event at Lyth Arts Centre to launch the World Heritage Site, featuring a screening of the film When Fish Begin to Crawl.

January – February 2025:

Celebrated The Flow Country's UNESCO inscription with the world-first orchestral performance of When Fish Begin to Crawl featuring the Royal Scottish National Orchestra, at Eden Court, Inverness and Glasgow Royal Concert Hall - selling out both venues!

Financial Review

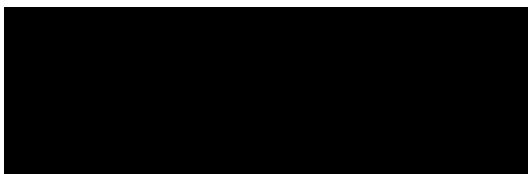
Prior to the establishment of the Charity, partner organisations including NatureScot, RSPB Scotland, North Highland Initiative, The Highland Council, Highlands and Islands Enterprise, and the University of the Highlands and Islands Environmental Research Institute hosted the projects by employing staff, funding events, and covering other costs. This in-kind support will continue until February

2026, allowing the Charity time to develop its own income stream and transition to using its own bank account.

North Highland Initiative acted as the grant holder for The Facility for Investment Ready Nature in Scotland (FIRNS), a grant that enabled the Flow Country Green Finance Initiative to proceed and fund two key roles: Peatland Restoration Officer and Project Officer. Additionally, The Highland Council hosts the World Heritage Site Project Coordinator.

This in-kind support will continue until February 2026, allowing the Charity time to develop its own income stream and transition to using its own bank account.

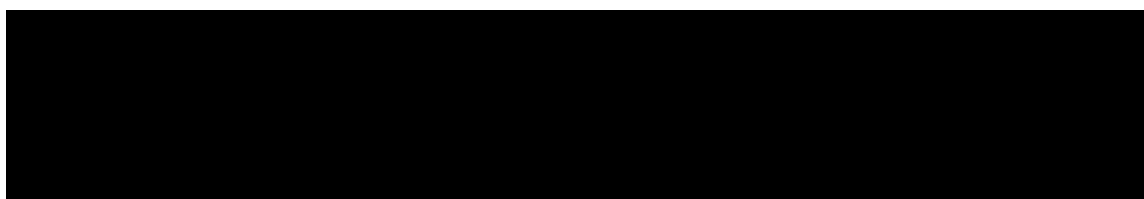
