What the charity does: Orkney Nature Festival is set up to promote the understanding, appreciation, and conservation of Orkney's natural environment and wildlife for the benefit of the public. We do this by organising an annual programme of nature-based events, walks, talks, workshops, educational activities, and community engagement opportunities that encourage people of all ages to connect with nature. Through partnerships with local organisations, volunteers, land managers, and environmental specialists, we help increase awareness of Orkney's biodiversity, support environmental education, and inspire positive action for the protection and enjoyment of the natural heritage of Orkney.

Objectives: (a) The advancement of education around nature and conservation in Orkney, to improve accessibility to the outdoors, and appreciation and protection for wildlife in the community. (c) The advancement of environmental protection or improvement throughout Orkney by encouraging people to engage with and develop a deeper understanding of their natural environment and the impact they have on it, as well as connecting people with other local charities that also share this aim.

Foreword from the Chair

This reporting period, covering 20 November 2024 to 30 November 2025, marks a significant stage in the development of Orkney Nature Festival as our first year as an OSCR registered Charity. The Festival continues to provide a platform for people to connect with Orkney's exceptional natural environment, while celebrating the deep links between nature, culture, science and community.

Over the year, the Festival has delivered a varied and inclusive programme that has engaged residents and visitors alike. Activities have supported learning, creativity and environmental awareness, while encouraging people of all ages to explore the outdoors and develop a stronger sense of stewardship for the natural world.

The Trustees are grateful to the many speakers, artists, partners and supporters whose enthusiasm and generosity have made the Festival possible. Despite ongoing challenges faced by the voluntary sector, including funding pressures and limited capacity, the organisation has continued to grow in confidence and ambition.

As we look to the future, Orkney Nature Festival remains committed to delivering public benefit through accessible, environmentally responsible events that celebrate Orkney's nature and inspire positive action to protect it.

Objectives and Activities

Orkney Nature Festival exists to celebrate, explore and protect Orkney's natural environment through events, education and community engagement. Our charitable purposes, as set out in our constitution, are:

1. **The advancement of education** around nature and conservation in Orkney, to improve accessibility to the outdoors and to foster appreciation and protection for wildlife within the community.
2. **The advancement of the arts, heritage, culture and science** through deeper appreciation of Orkney's natural heritage, and engagement with local artists, historians and natural scientists.
3. **The advancement of environmental protection and improvement** throughout Orkney by encouraging people to engage with, and develop a deeper understanding of, their natural environment and the impacts they have upon it, and by connecting people with other local charities and organisations that share these aims.

During the reporting period, the Trustees have ensured that all Festival activity delivered clear public benefit and directly furthered these charitable purposes.

Our activities during the year can be grouped into the following key areas:

- Delivery of the annual Orkney Nature Festival programme
- Education, learning and community engagement
- Arts, culture and heritage engagement rooted in nature
- Partnerships and collaboration
- Organisational development and governance

Festival Programme and Events

The Orkney Nature Festival took place in May and featured a varied programme of talks, walks, workshops, exhibitions and family-friendly activities. Events were delivered across multiple locations, both indoors and outdoors, and aimed to appeal to a wide range of ages and interests.

Highlights from the programme included:

- A wildlife of Orkney talk by Raymond Besant
- Guided walks and wildlife watching hosted by organisations and individuals such as the RSPB, Tim Dean, Species on the Edge, Wild Orkney Walks, Orkney Field Club, SeaSearch Scotland to mention but a few.
- Creative Events hosted by No25/ Orkney Creative Hub, Westside Cinema, Moonshine Candle Makers and Robin Palmer Ceramics.
- As ever, many of the events above were family friendly but some highlights from the family programme included Rockpooling and the Shoogly Pencil Club. With the Island Games being hosted in Orkney 2025 we hosted a brilliant event in schools from all of the islands attending the games giving them the opportunity to share posters about the amazing native wildlife where they live. Attendance levels were encouraging, with strong local participation alongside visitors to Orkney. Feedback from participants indicated high levels of satisfaction and a strong appreciation for the breadth and quality of the programme.

Education and Community Engagement

Education and engagement remain central to the Festival's mission. During the year, activities were designed to:

- Increase understanding of Orkney's wildlife, landscapes and seascapes
- Promote environmental awareness and climate literacy
- Encourage active participation in nature and the outdoors

The Festival worked with schools, community groups and partner organisations to deliver accessible and inclusive opportunities for learning. Particular emphasis was placed on informal learning, storytelling, and direct experiences in nature.

With the International Island Games 2025 taking place in the Orkney Islands, we used this as an opportunity to tap into the buzz around the community, and expand the reach of the Orkney Nature Festival beyond the island's shores. A collaborative project was launched, in which all students in schools within one of the Islands who was going to be represented at the International Island Games was asked to create a poster celebrating native flora and fauna species. There were submissions from 12 different island nations (Åland, Falkland Islands, Faroe Islands, Gozo, Guernsey, Isle of Man, Isle of Wight, Jersey, Orkney, Saaremaa, Shetland and the Western Isles), totalling over 300 different posters. These were collated on a specially created website, which was launched during the Orkney Nature Festival 2025 (over 2,500 page views have been recorded on this).

Throughout the International Island Games 2025 (12-18th July 2025), an exhibition of some of these submissions from each island was created in a window on the High Street of Kirkwall, allowing even more people to view the works.



Partnerships and Collaboration

Collaboration is essential to the success of Orkney Nature Festival. During the reporting period, we worked with a wide range of partners, including:

- Local environmental and conservation organisations
- Artists, writers and creative practitioners
- Researchers and educators
- Community groups and venues

These partnerships enhanced the Festival programme, avoided duplication of effort, and helped strengthen the wider environmental network within Orkney.

This year the Orkney Nature Festival partnered with 28 different organisations to deliver 50 events throughout the festival.

Fundraising and Financial Support

Income during the year was generated through a combination of:

- Ticketed events
- Sale of branded goods
- In-kind support

The Trustees are grateful to all supporters whose contributions made the Festival possible. In-kind support, including venue use, speaker time and volunteer input, continues to be a vital part of the Festival's delivery.

Governance, Structure and Management

Orkney Nature Festival is governed by a Board of Trustees who are responsible for the strategic direction and oversight of the charity. The Board met regularly during the year to review activities, finances and risk.

The charity operates under a constitution and maintains appropriate policies, including:

- Financial management
- Conflicts of interest
- Safeguarding
- Health and safety
- Confidentiality
- Environmental
- Financial management
- Recruitment

The Festival is entirely volunteer-led, with Trustees and volunteers contributing significant time and expertise.

Achievements and Performance

Key achievements during the reporting period include:

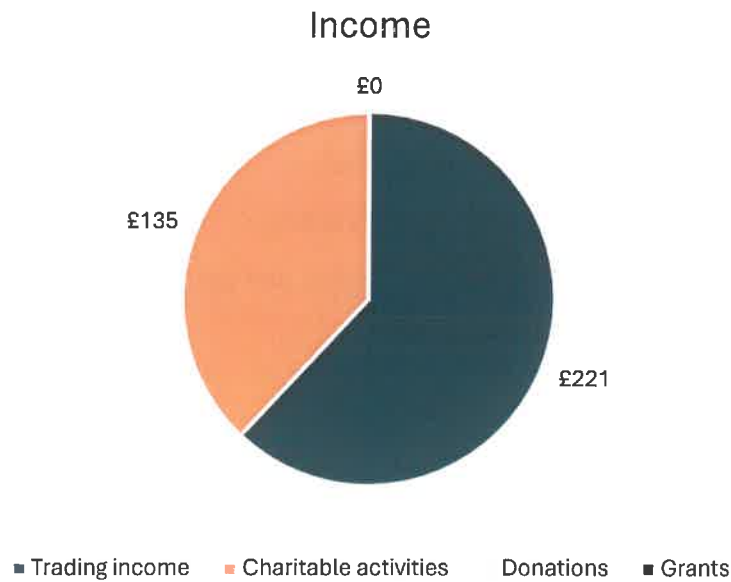
- Successful delivery of the annual Orkney Nature Festival

Financial Review

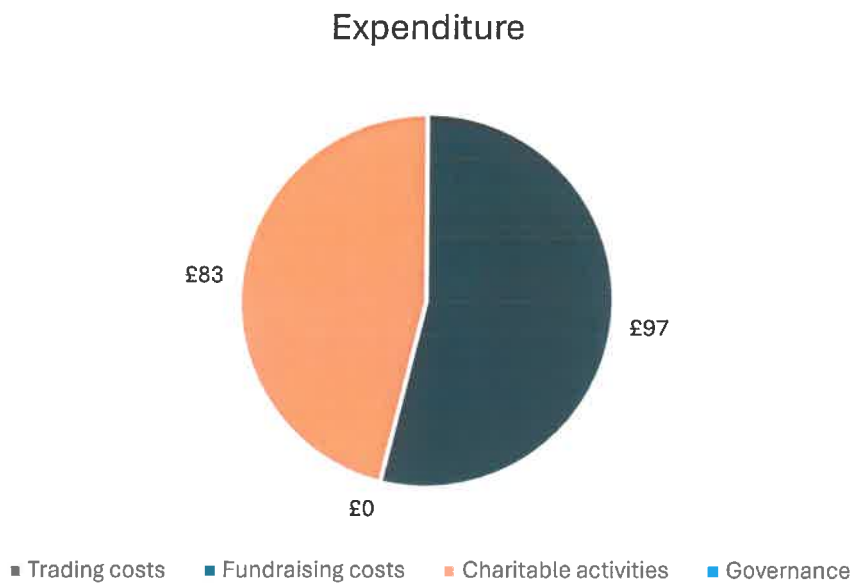
The Trustees have continued to manage the charity's finances prudently. Expenditure during the year focused on direct Festival delivery, including event costs, marketing, insurance and administration.

The charity ended the reporting period in a stable financial position, enabling planning for future Festivals while maintaining a cautious approach in light of wider economic uncertainty.

Below are the excerpts from our financial statement submitted to OSCR. In the 2024-2025 period we received income from two main sources, an event that we hosted during the 2025 festival and through the sale of merchandise, some of which was through 59 Degrees North where they sell clothing to merchandise on our behalf. The second was direct sales of calendars that we produced late in 2025.



Our expenditure was split across charitable activities such as paying for venue hire and website upkeep costs. The expenditure in the trading costs was relating to the initial purchase of the printed calendars that we were then able to sell.



Reserves Policy

The Trustees aim to maintain reserves sufficient to meet short-term commitments and provide resilience against unforeseen costs. Given the event-based nature of the charity, reserves are kept under regular review.

Plans for the Future

In the coming year, Orkney Nature Festival aims to:

- Continue developing a high-quality, inclusive Festival programme
- Expand educational and outreach activities
- Strengthen long-term funding and sustainability
- Deepen engagement with local communities and partners
